

The Pancoasts, in addition to being avid climbers, also like to work at a church camp called Christikon in Montana. Mike's daughters Anna and Laura are currently


volunteering at the camp. Olsen is not there this year, but has participated for the past five years, and is working with another camp this summer, Holden Village.

allow this year," said Vrchota. "If time does not allow [holding Heritage Days] we will have a big comeback next year."

Although an organization's name may be on the IRS's auto-revocation list, it doesn't necessarily mean it's currently revoked, as the problem may have already been remedied or is in the process of being remedied. An organization can maintain its tax-exempt status if it follows IRS's rules affecting private benefit/inurement, lobbying, political campaign activity, unrelated business income, annual reporting obligation, and operation in accordance with stated exempt purpose(s).

Heritage Days updates will be posted over the next few weeks as more information becomes available.

"Please remember everyone is human and mistakes happen," said Vrchota. "We are diligently working to have this remedied as soon as possible."




school and was an avid sports fan, especially rooting for the Vikings and Twins. He was a complete news junkie and was always up-to-date on happenings around the world.

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Mosquito spraying back on Clearwater City Council's agenda

During their June meeting the Clearwater City Council again discussed the subject of mosquito spraying after it was submitted as an agenda item by resi-

City Administrator Annita Smythe began by reviewing the previous actions taken by the council when previously discussing the issue, including reviewing numerous materials and studies about the Permethrin product used previously and an organic product called Merus.

She informed residents present about the results of their Facebook survey (which overwhelmingly came back in favor of spraying) and the benefits and costs of the program, all of which had been discussed at previous meet-

At the time, the vote to not renew the mosquito spraying contract failed with a 2-2 split vote as the council was short a member following the resignation of Council Member Richard

Multiple residents spoke up urging the council to reconsider spraying this year, the majority of which said that this year was the first time in many that they

were unable to enjoy summer outdoors due to mosquitos. A Facebook petition signed by 252 residents in support of spraying was presented to the council.

Multiple residents also spoke up asking the council not to spray this year because (a) there didn't appear to be much evidence that it worked, (b) concerns about the toxicity of the chemicals used, (c) concerns regarding liability for the city, and (d) budget concerns. A question was also asked about why mosquito control was the responsibility of the city.

After more discussion on costs, Mayor Andrea Lawrence noted that a new council member or a member who was opposed would need to bring the issue back up for reconsideration as the council had already voted on it.

Smythe informed the council that if reinstated, the vender would need to rework the city back into their schedule and couldn't guarantee days or times. She also stated the city wouldn't be able to adjust billing for the more expensive Merus (2.5 times the cost of Permethrin) until after the July meeting due to ordinance adoption stat-

A motion carried unanimously to restart spraying

using Merus and to either merge Clearwater Estates into the contract (they have their own) or allow them to opt out.

During their July meeting, a motion carried amending the fee schedule, with an increase due to the reinstatement of mosquito spraying, this time with the more expensive organic product. A second increase came from the addition of a sewer surcharge that was added by the Sewer Authority to cover operating costs.

Other Issues

Smythe informed the council the only quote received to date on the chip seal project came in well over budget, requiring Main St. to be removed from it. The project is still \$20,000 over budget, however, additional quotes are still expected. A motion carried authorizing the project to proceed with the

lowest quote. A motion carried authorizing paving the parking lot at El Dorado Park and the parking lot near the Lions Park building. T.O. Plastics will be asked to share the cost of the Lions Park parking lot paving as their trucks use the area as

A motion carried approving the Smith St. overlay project.

A motion carried au-

thorizing the new hockey rink concrete project to proceed with the lowest quote.

Concerns of the Park Commission about the Spring Street Park mural, which was painted by a St. Cloud University student, were brought forth. The Park Commission stated the changes they requested to the mural proposal weren't included in the final product and asked the student to repaint that portion

The student explained she hadn't understood the proposed changes were agreed upon by the entire board and said she would repaint it if desired but there would be an additional cost. After discussion a motion carried to leave the mural as-is.

A motion carried to hire a part-time intern for 20 hours per week at \$18 an hour for eight to 10 weeks to assist staff.

The next Clearwater City Council meeting will be August 15 at 7 p.m. so as not to conflict with the primary election.



I-94 Road Construction **Nears End**

The last step in the project is completing the three lanes in both directions between Monticello and Hasty. Last Thursday, the Minnesota Dept. of Transportation announced that the current schedule for ending the headto-head traffic in both directions on the westbound lanes of I-94 is scheduled to be completed by Sat., Aug. 13.

Work between St. Michael and Albertville is expected to be completed by the end of July.

While other factors can be in play that will cause delays, those who drive that segment of road can be happy that project that began in 2019 is scheduled to be completed within the next 30 days.



As we approach the August work period, our office continues its work to address some of the most important issues facing our country. We have supported legislation to reduce the price of fuel, address the lawlessness at our southern border, and improve the safety of our schools and communities. We are also working to tackle an issue of growing concern: food security.

Defending our Food Security

Over the past few months, many of us have experienced empty shelves and shortages on necessities. Like so many of the challenges our country is facing today, we must rely on resources produced here

It is crucial that we can rely on our agricultural resources for generations to come. That is why it is so alarming that over the last decade, foreign entities have been buying up American farmland. Between 2010 and 2020, Chinese ownership of our farmland has surged significantly, from 13,720 acres to 352,140 acres.

America's food security is our national security-and we must understand the identities and intentions of those purchasing American agriculture

land. This week, we sent a letter to Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack urging him to clarify the transparency and reporting standards required of foreign entities seeking to acquire U.S. farmland.

Earlier this year, I also served as an original cosponsor of Representative Dan Newhouse's Prohibition of Agricultural Land for the People's Republic of China Act to stop the purchase of important resources by our nation's ri-

Foreign investment in our country is a critical component of our economy. However, an overreliance on foreign nations when it comes to our food production can present serious national security concerns for the United States.

Last year, the media published information about the social studies standards after the public comment period. Earlier this year, it was the ethnomathematics version of the math standards. Now it's the newly added Standard 8 on racism to the teacher licensure standard. The public comment period on licensure ended in June. The administrative law judge, not the Legislature, rules on these standards in late August. They will be required from elementary through collegial teacher preparation programs. The Minnesota Professional Educator Licensing and Standards Board (PELSB) content in Standard 8 comes from Illinois and Washington standards. Minnesota voters should follow the lead of Virginia (state) voters last year who stood with politicians supporting parents and children and rejected those who told parents that the schools, not the parents, should decide what is taught. Parents are swing voters looking for academic excellence, not progressive policies (CRT/ DEI/SEL/gender identity). Government-funded school enrollment is plummeting-students of informed parents and frustrated teachers who find their ideological and moral standards challenged. The Seventh Amendment's right to a jury trial is only implicated in civil suits between two individuals when two conditions

First, in a situation where the relief sought exceeds \$20.

And second, when the claim against the other person is of the type that would have been recognized under the common law in England in 1791 (the year in which the Bill of Rights was ratified). The second condition was articulated by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1898 in the Thompson v. Utah decision, when the Court used this "fixed historical test" to determine what claims fall under the Seventh Amend-

ment's protections. Additionally, suits in common law are those that provide a monetary relief, like a claim for damages after a car accident or damages from a breach of contract. The Seventh Amendment does not apply, however, to claims for equitable relief like an injunction or a temporary restraining order, which affect a person's legal right to do something. They also do not apply to criminal trials, since the Fifth and Sixth Amendments discussed earlier protect a criminal defendant's trial rights. In addition, the \$20 "value in controversy" re-

quirement has been strictly

interpreted ever since the

Seventh Amendment's ratification in 1791. It is a fixed dollar amount that has not changed with the times or

inflation. The last clause of the Seventh Amendment, which also only pertains to civil suits, protects a jury's autonomy by preventing a judge or a reviewing court from overturning a factual determination made by a jury. However, there are exceptions to this, such as when evidence is improperly admitted into the trial. The remedy for a breach of this right is generally that a new jury will rehear the case. A lower court decision can be appealed resulting in upholding a decision

or reversing it. While the Seventh Amendment does not get the same attention as some of the earlier amendments in the Bill of Rights, the right to a jury trial in many civil cases is a staple in our

American legal heritage. Next week, I will discuss the Eight Amendment's prohibition against excessive bail and fines as well as cruel and unusual punishments.

In a civil trial, one private party – the plaintiff – is suing the other private party – the defendant – for a wrong committed by the defendant that caused some sort of harm. Each must prove their case but by a preponderance of evidence, which is a lower bar to reach than criminal trials. Civil trials can include judgements of money for costs like attorneys, costs from the wrongdoing or pain and suffering, loss of

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

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New cheerleading program open to local students

The Big Lake area has a new cheerleading program open to students age 10-18. The Minnesota Jets is a new cheer program that was recently formed by former coaches of the Big Lake Cheerleading team. This new team will not affiliated with the Big Lake School system, and will be open to students from around the area, such as Monticello, Elk River, and other neighboring cities.

The Big Lake School Board recently chose to dissolve their popular competitive cheer team, which has traveled to nationals for the past two years. This decision follows discussion and disagreement on how the program should move forward.

Cheerleading Coach, and School Board Member, Derek Nelson explained that competitive cheer is not an MSHSL sport, so there was not much guidance or precedent on how to move the program forward, nor was there an official league for the sport. Therefore, decisions were being made without established precedent, and, inevitably, disagreements arose between parents, coaches, and students on how to move forward with the quickly growing team. Big Lake will be keep-

ing its sideline cheer program, which used to be the umbrella program for the competitive cheer team, despite vast differences between the two.

"It's like if the football team decided to run lacrosse," Nelson said. "They're very different sports."

The school board decision came as a disappointment to many of the cheerleaders on the team. However, as a team, the students and the coaches

worked quickly to form "Minnesota Jets." This youth program, existing independently of the school, will be the new area cheerleading team, which comes with a lot of positives, according to Coach Nelson and Minnesota Jets Director Annette Balken. Firstly, students of schools from around the area may join, and, in fact, new students

from Elk River, Monticello, and other neighboring towns have already done so. The program can also welcome younger students. Students as young as 10 are officially welcomed, although Balken and Nelson said younger students may be admitted, with the understanding that they may be ineligible to compete until they are older. It

also seems that the program will be more cost-effective being run independently. The team will be able to focus on different styles of cheerleading, incorporating more tumbling, for example. Finally, the students will have the opportunity to potentially compete at more out-of-state competitions and national competitions.

Part of the reason the Minnesota Jets got off the ground so quickly, within 30 days, was so the students could look forward to a (mostly) normal season this year. A skills camp will take place today (Saturday, July 30), and regular practice will begin this fall. A lot of the cheerleaders have transferred to the Minnesota Jets program and are excited to start.

Ashley Balken, one of the students who has joined the Minnesota Jets, says she's very excited to get back to practicing and competing, and that she loves the new uniforms.

The Minnesota Jets plans to practice on Thursdays, enabling any of the students who want to participate in sideline the ability to do so. The coaches hope to be supportive of the school program going forward, and have enjoyed support from the school in turn, during their one month of existence, with the school allowing the program to rent and use school facilities.

Following the tradition of the school cheer program, the cheerleaders will still be out in the community, both to fundraise for team expenses, by working a shift, as a team, at Culver's and bagging grocerieis at Cub Foods, and to volunteer with local organizations, such as with Spud Fest and the Lions Club, as they have done in the past. Unfortunately, their popular haunted house will be put on hold this year as the team becomes established,

though they may offer another yet-to-be-determined Halloween-themed event according to Nelson.





ECONOMIC CONDITION AND OUTLOOK

Sherburne County continues to grow both from a population and a tax base perspective. The population increased .27% from the previous year of 98,811 to 99,074, making Sherburne County the 12th largest County in Minnesota. Countywide residential values have increased approximately 7.3% for taxes payable in 2022, bringing the average residential value to \$292,500. New home permits are up slightly (4.18%) compared to the same period in 2020. The County continues to see a number of solar farms (known as Community Solar Gardens under Minnesota Statutes) that have developed primarily during the 2017-2021 timeframe. Additionally, commercial and industrial new construction, as well as permits for renovations ns of existing properties and facilities, are ticking upward. County staff continues to lo innovative solutions to control expenses and increase revenues while maintaining services to our residents. A number of indicators contribute to continued growth and financial stability of the County. The fol-

Due to its relatively dense population outside of - and yet in close proximity to - the Twin Cities metropolitan area, Sherburne County is attractive to businesses that seek affordable land and labor costs to expand their operations. Businesses are continuing to choose Sherburne County because of the growing population, available and educated workforce, and access to major highways and the railroad. Commuter rail service continues to provide ridership via the Northstar Corridor rail line and its related bus connector, which began operation in November of 2009, linking Big Lake to downtown Minneapolis, with stops in Elk River, Anoka, Ramsey, Coon Rapids, Fridley and Target Field (Minneapolis). Ridership was greatly impacted by business shutdowns and restrictions caused by the COVID 19 pandemic. Ridership on the train in 2020 was at 152,455, compared to 50,433 in 2021 an 66.9% decrease. People from the St. Cloud area can catch the commuter coach, the "Northstar Link", which includes a stop in Becker, to the Big Lake station to catch the Northstar train to Minneapolis. This form of transportation has been a great service for Sherburne County residents to utilize in today's economy.

LONG-TERM FINANCIAL PLANNING

The County Board annually sets goals to establish key priorities. The budget process includes direction to department heads to document savings to be achieved during the year to address any anticipated revenue shortages from the State. The County Board encourages Department Heads to continue to look for ways to re-engineer work processes and services, and/or find alternate methods of cost reduction or revenue enhancement. The County annually updates the Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan, prepared by the Administration department, with inputs from all County departments. The County developed a long-term financial plan and, in 2018, a dashboard was created to allow the County to input "what if" assumptions that can be altered to determine how the assumption would affect the County's budget. The County has purchased the OpenGov budget platform software to increase budgeting efficiency and enhance transparency with the public. The software was utilized and implemented for the 2021 Countywidebudget and is available to County residents 24 hours a day on the County's website.

MAJOR INITIATIVES

Public Works Department and Regional Rail Fund - The County Board approve allocating some of the adopted local option sales tax to Northstar costs, thus reducing the Regional Rail Authority levy to \$0 again for 2022 - the net effect of both county levies, therefore is a 4.95% increase. Put another way, the average residential homesteaded property in Sherburne County will see a \$8.00 increase/month. For 2022, the average valued residential home increased from \$272,500 to \$292,500 in Sherburne County. Providing quality services in a fiscally responsible manner continues to be the mission of Sherburne County. Streamlining business processes through technology improvements is a consistent theme for County Elected leaders and staff. The County Board is now utilizing web-x meetings for residents to be able to listen and/or become active participants in the County Board, County EDA, and Planning Commission meetings. This meeting platform is also utilized to keep our employees and residents safe throughout the ongoing pandemic as they worked or conducted significant business remotely with Sherburne County staff. This is a trend that will likely continue into the future. In addition, the County has automated the homestead process in the Assessor's office and the foster home service agreement and payment voucher process in HHS. We have also created an appointment system for Driver's License and Recorder's departments greatly reducing the wait times for residents. Enhanced online service portals are currently under development for the County's permitting, planning and zoning functions. Sherburne County will continue to look for ways to make conducting business more effective for County residents.



Interacting with fair goers each day was the Dr. Street Magic Show and Al-



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EVs have a ways to go

(The following article was approved for publishing in the Patriot by the Western Journal Editor. This is an informational piece for those interested in possibly investing in an electric vehicle in the coming months or renting one for a trip. Rachel Wolfe is a consumer trends reporter for the Wall Street Journal)

Electric vehicles are supposed to be the next big thing. So, why did one Wall Street Journal reporter, after taking a road trip with one, say that the fumes of expensive gasoline "never smelled so sweet"?

In a piece published by the Western Journal last month, Rachel Wolfe described charging a Kia EV6 for more time than she spent sleeping during a trek from New Orleans to Chicago.

Wolfe's opening statement, which should serve as a portent to anyone who thinks the charging infrastructure or the capabilities of electric vehicles are there yet: "I thought it would be fun.' Spoiler alert: It was not.

Despite the fact that the EV6 is a hot new vehicle and the fact Wolfe had made several long trips in her (relatively) antediluvian 2008 Volkswagen Jetta, the experience turned into a nightmare of public-charging infrastructure frustrations and waiting

This on the heels of President Joe Biden's speech about the catastrophic gas prices that his policies have caused. He bragged about the pain of high energy prices as part of "an incredible transition" to an impractical utopian scheme, where renewable energy powers the

world. The goal is for 50 percent of car sales to be electric by 2030. In 2021, four and a half percent of car sales were electric.

Wolfe wrote that she "plotted a meticulous route" using an app that showed public chargers along the 2,000-mile round-trip route. Most of the chargers, however, were only Level 2, which means they would take eight hours for a full

charge. Fast chargers can get the car to 80 percent of its full charge in roughly a half-hour

— "Longer than stopping for gas — but good for a bite or bathroom break," Wolfe

"Over four days, we spent \$175 on charging. We estimated the equivalent cost for gas in a Kia Forte would have been \$275, based on the AAA average national gas price for May 19. That \$100 savings cost us many hours in waiting time," she wrote.

Over the trip, she noted that the vehicle had lower range than advertised, charge stations had slower speeds than advertised, many had problematic cords and plenty of the country had almost no fast-charging stations at all.

Take, for instance, what happened when Wolfe and her traveling partner couldn't find the wall-mounted charger at a Kia dealership in Meridian, Mississippi, during the first day of the journey — an experience that perfectly encapsulated "When I ask a mechanic

working on an SUV a few feet away for help, he says he doesn't know anything about the machine and points us inside. At the front desk, the receptionist asks if we've checked with a technician and sends us back outside," she wrote. Not many people use

the charger, the mechanic tells us when we return. We soon see why. Once up and running, our dashboard tells us a full charge, from 18% to 100%, will take three-plus

'It turns out not all 'fast chargers' live up to the name," Wolfe noted.

gest variable, according to State of Charge, is how many kilowatts a unit can churn out in an hour. To be considered 'fast,' a charger must be capable of about 24 kW. The fastest chargers can pump out up to 350. Our charger in Meridian claims to meet that standard, but it has trouble cracking 20.

And while the worst, Wolfe wrote, it never became "all smooth sailing."

"At one point we find ourselves wandering through a Kroger, sopping wet, in search of coffee after wrestling with a particularly finicky charger in the rain. By this point, not once have we managed to back in close enough to reach the pump, or gotten the stiff cord hooked around the right way on the

first try," she wrote. In one instance, Wolfe and her traveling companion had to turn off the cooling system and radio in a rainstorm while reducing the rate of the windshield wipers to make it to a charging station while running "on electric

"At zero miles, we fly screeching into a gas-station parking lot. A trash can goes flying and lands with a clatter to greet us. Dinner is beef jerky, our plans to dine at a kitschy beauty shop-turnedrestaurant in Memphis long gone," she wrote.

Overall, Wolfe wrote, she spent 16 hours sleeping during the trip — compared to 18 hours waiting to charge spread over 14 charges.

"The following week, I

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fill up my Jetta at a local Shell station. Gas is up to \$4.08 a gallon," she concluded. "I inhale deeply. Fumes never smelled so sweet." **Summing Up**

It's not just the inconvenience or the charging networks that are problems, either — although that certainly is a problem. EVs cost significantly more than internal-combustion vehicles, for one thing. The average price of a new electric vehicle was \$64,685, according to the Kelley Blue Book. As the New York Post noted in April, that's "nearly 2.5 times the average price of a new compact car (\$26,196), almost twice the average cost of a new compact SUV (\$33,732), and 52% more expensive than the average

sports car (\$42,555)." Beyond that, there's convenience. Even when charging stations are available, that doesn't mean they work. In the deep-blue California Bay Area, over 25 percent weren't fully functioning, according to a recent

Then there are the fires (if not explosions) or the reports tires on EVs wear out more quickly. And then there's the environmental damage caused by mining for the components electric cars need.

It all adds up to a "solution" that's a problem all on its own. Gas fumes never smelled so good, indeed.

Post Script

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"Would I do this drive again in an electric car?" Wolfe questioned on her Twitter page. "Not anytime soon. But I'm excited about the government's \$5b investment in fast charging infrastructure and hopeful about the future of EVs, especially for local driving."
