

Big Lake Twp. met last Wednesday to discuss development, CARES Act, a CUP for personal storage, an acknowledgment of a new newspaper and the res-

ignation of Bob Hofer. **Development**

Big Lake Community Development Director Hanna Klimmek gave an update on business and residential progress as of late. Most of Wednesday's discussion centered on housing units being developed for Big Lake that are titled, "affordable housing".

Klimmek first talked about single-family building permits and the amount applied for so far in 2020 (24). She said two applications are still in review.

Klimmek spoke about the Crossings, Phase II where 38 affordable township rental units are being developed by Duffy Development. She mentioned the Station Street Apartments, Phase I & II which will include 70 market rate rental units being developed by Kuepers, Inc. Sandhill Villas is a 12-unit, single-family development project being developed by Troy Siemers.

Klimmek spoke about the Marketplace Crossings Phases of I & II where 120 market rate and affordable rental units are being developed by CommonBond. She also mentioned the Big Lake Station where 125 affordable rental units for families and 55+ residents could live which is being developed by Aeon.

Finally, she mentioned Avalon Estates where 108

Bog removal costs debated at Clearwater Twp. meeting

During Clearwater Twp.'s recent meeting, an update on the removal of the bog turned into a debate concerning costs and who would be paying them.

At the end of the first day of removal, Mares Contracting, the company hired for the job, had used up most of the \$3,500 the township had approved. Some of the lake's residents asked them to return and finish the next day, stating they would pick up the remainder of the cost.

Supervisor Rose Thelen explained she had approached a few people who lived on the lake and asked if they would be willing to split the remainder. They agreed, however, their bill came in at \$3,900, much higher than they thought

"I'd like to submit as a possibility that the township give a little more," she said.

Supervisor Scott Miller said he was disappointed at the way the beach looked after the removal, and stated the township set a price and it should have stopped there.

"Personally, I don't think we should spend any more," he said. "We still have the pile to remove and need to fix and clean the beach.'

Residents in attendance brought up a number of viewpoints, including that there would be no bog without the beaver, an issue that still hadn't been addressed.

"Historically, the township hasn't been involved in beaver removal," said Langenbacher. "If we go down that road I believe we'll be

opening up another can of worms. Typically, the lake association gets together and solves the problem." (Nixon Lake doesn't currently have a lake association)

Another attendee said he has property on Sugar Lake, and when they had problems with a bog there the residents of the lake took care of it themselves; they didn't ask anyone else to do it. They also installed a Clemson lake leveler on their own, which is a device that allows water to flow through beaver dams and plugged culverts.

"I think we were pretty generous with the \$3,500, said Miller. "Everyone knew what the limit was. Unfortunately, it went beyond that."

"Maybe we shouldn't have done it," he continued. "Maybe it's a learning experience for everyone. However, a lot of families use it, it's a good community activity and I think it was worth it to pre-

people would consider signing up for a volunteer cleanup crew; a number agreed, including Blayne Leuthard, who said he would bring his tractor for the heavier work. July 18 was chosen for the volunteer cleanup day.

Because the township can only raise funds through levies, another group of residents took it upon themselves to start a fundraiser, with Bekah Kanable volunteering to create a GoFundMe page to raise money for cleanup, restoration, and removal of the dried bog material. (To donate, go to gofundme.com/f/cleanup-nixon-lake)

To keep the community safe, and because people were launching their boats off the beach and tearing it up even more, a motion carried to close Nixon Lake access to boats and vehicle traffic during the restoration.

Other Business

The board reviewed the most recent fire contract to come through from the City of Clearwater. The biggest issues revealed were (1) the city is asking for a two-year contract and the township believes oneyear had been agreed upon, (2) at their discretion, the city can impose fees on people who receive emergency services but there's no mention of sharing the fees or providing the

townships with details, and (3) regarding the fire advisory committee, the contract states if the contract is extended beyond 2022 the townships can then have a seat on it.

"That's a problem," said Thelen. "My understanding was we would be involved immediately."

A decision was made to delay signing until recent questions were answered and Twp. Attorney Michael Couri made his recommendation.

Clerk Jean Just recapped the township's recent cleanup day, stating 176 people came through, leaving behind 131 appliances, 153 tires, 122 electronics, 66 mattresses/furniture, and 20.46 tons of scrap.

The next Clearwater Twp. meeting will be Aug. 3 at 7:30 p.m.

Campaign signs not permitted on highway ROWs

As political campaigns get underway for November elections, the Minnesota Department of Transportation (MnDOT) reminds campaigners that state law prohibits placement of private signs on highway right-of-ways in Minnesota.

In addition, state law says that signs may not be placed on private land without the consent of the land-

Violation of the law, Minnesota Statute 160.27. is a misdemeanor. Civil penalties may also apply if the placement of such material contributes to a motor vehicle crash, creates injury to a person, or causes damage to a motor vehicle that runs off the road.

In addition, the Minnesota Outdoor Advertising Control Act prohibits placing advertising devices on public utility poles, trees and shrubs and by painting or drawing on rocks or natural features.

MnDOT workers will take down any private signs located on the state highway right-of-way and transport them to the nearest maintenance truck station. County, city and township employees administer these laws on their roads.

For information regarding the proper placement of campaign signs, right-of-way boundaries, or where to find removed materials, visit www.mndot. gov/govrel/rw_signs. html, or contact your local MnDOT St. Cloud office at 320-223-6500, or Baxter office at 218-828-5700.

When placing signs off the right-of-way, the best way to avoid an emergency or unintentionally striking an underground facility is to call 811 before digging, according to the Minnesota Department of Public Safety. Go to the Gopher State One Call website at www.gopherstateonecall. org, and request that underground utilities be marked near the area of the digging.

Also called the Striped Gopher or Leopard Ground Squirrel, it sometimes has other regional names. No matter what you call them, they are a short-legged, ground squirrel that has, as its name implies, 13 alternating brown and tan lines or stripes on its back and sides. The dark stripe often has small tan spots creating a row of spots running the length of the body. This patterning of spots and stripes has led to another common name, the "Federation Squirrel", because of its pattern of "Stars and Stripes". They have a short well furred tail that is often hard to see because it's usually hidden in the veg-

These adorable squirrels' range across a huge area of the U.S. from Ohio

and Michigan in the east to Montana in the west and up north into Canada. They also range down the center of the country, right down to the Texas coast. All together they cover nearly 20 states and three Canadian provinces. We have two groups

of squirrels in North America. The more familiar Tree Squirrels, such as the Eastern Gray Squirrel and Red Squirrel. And the Ground Squirrels, such as Chipmunks and Prairie Dogs. Ground squirrels are very different from the more familiar tree squirrels. Unlike their tree-climbing cousins, the ground squirrels, such as the Thirteen-lined Ground Squirrel lead a subterranean life rarely leaving terra firma. They live in underground tunnels and dens and rarely come out unless there is favorable weather conditions. Living underground has many advantages such as fewer predators, shelter from the weather and a labyrinth of tunnels to retreat to when presented with danger.

The Thirteen-lined Ground Squirrel is often very tame and can be easily approached. They are a diurnal animal which simply means that they are most active during the daylight hours and usually only on sunny days. Cloudy, wet, and cold days are usually spent underground. They are also true hibernators--sleeping from late August until mid April. Without a doubt they spend more time underground than they do above ground, which leads me to think, would they be more aptly named "underground squirrels"? But that's just one naturalist's opinion.

They are sometimes confused with the Eastern

Chipmunk. The Thirteen-lined Ground Squirrel is larger, about 6-7 inches and has smaller ears and of course don't forget the thirteen stripes or lines on its back is a dead give-away. Their tail is about one-third the length of their body. Compared to the Eastern Chipmunk which is only 3-4 inches long and has only three stripes. To accommodate its

life scurrying through narrow tunnels, the Thirteen-lined Ground Squirrel has short powerful legs for digging, and short ears. Since it's protected from the weather by living underground it doesn't have to snuggle up to a fat bushy tail like the Gray Squirrel.

Due to their long hibernation they only have enough time for one litter of young each summer. It's not uncommon for a mother to give birth to seven to 10 young. The high birth rate might make up for the single litter. The young emerge from the underground den between four and six weeks of age. And since they are gregarious animals the young will stay together and later will be digging tunnels near their parents.

Their genus name (Spermophilus) is Latin and means "seed lover" or "seed eater" and describes its preference for eating seeds. The only problem is they often will eat a wide variety of foods such as insects, mice, voles, lizards, toads, and even eggs of ground nesting birds. The term used to describe this wide variety of diet is called omnivore.

I was able to capture some stunning images of the thirteen-lined Ground Squirrel before he scurried back into his underground tunnel. I was happy that I retrieved my camera spent some quality time with one of my old friends. Until next time...

Question: I have heard speeding over 100 MPH has increased, what is the State Patrol doing about this problem?

Answer: The Minnesota State Patrol, along with law enforcement agencies across the state, are currently conducting enhanced speed enforcement on the roadways through July 19.

The extra enforcement will target speeding violations as well as aggressive driving

From April 1 – May 21, the Minnesota State Patrol pulled over 232 drivers traveling more than 100 mph. That's compared with 93 drivers during the same time period last year, a 149 percent increase. Of the 232 drivers, 179 were 30-years-old or younger.

Overall fatal crashes and fatalities from March 16 - May 31 increased over last year despite reduced traffic. While a crash can have more than one contributing factor, speed was the most frequently cited factor. Preliminary reports show speed has already contributed to 36 motorists dying on Minnesota roads in 2020, compared with 27 at this time last year. Speeding is not an innocent crime — it puts every motorist on the road at risk:

· Greater potential for loss of vehicle control

- Increased stopping distance
- Less time available for driver response for crash avoidance

• Increased crash severity — the faster the speed, the more violent the crash

Remember that fines double when traveling 20 or more mph over the limit, and if you are traveling in excess of 100 mph, you can lose your license for up to six months.

You can avoid a ticket — and a crash — if you simply buckle up, drive at safe speeds, pay attention and always drive sober. Help us drive Minnesota Toward Zero Deaths.





Emergency powers must stop

This week we voted to remove Gov. Walz's emergency powers for the second time.

The Governor called the Senate back to the Capitol Monday for a second special session. In response, we passed a resolution to end the Governor's peacetime emergency powers initially enacted to prepare the state for the COVID-19 pandemic. If the House also passes the resolution, it would put an end to the state's longest peacetime emergency in history. Walz first put the state under emergency powers March

While this week testing and positive cases increased, it is more important to note that our ICU/Hospitalization rates have greatly decreased and our deaths are now in the low single digits. The percent of positive tests per hundred thousand are dropping as well. These facts demonstrate that emergency powers are no longer needed. Minnesotans are quite capable of



continuing their own protective measures.

This pandemic is not historic and unprecedented, but Gov. Walz's emergency powers response is. It is like the fire department staying onsite until the house is rebuilt. I have heard from my constituents that they feel like they are being treated like children micromanaged by Gov. Walz. The Governor needs to relinquish his emergency powers and restore the balance between the branches of government. He initially used his emergency powers to prepare our state for

the projected surge of COVID-19 cases, but he has taken it too far. For months he has arbitrarily controlled the reopening of our state, keeping some businesses closed while others opened. Now as we face the upcoming school year, it is past time to reestablish local control and allow each school district to decide how they want to proceed next year.

Gov. Walz cannot and has not represented our whole state with his metro-focused, one-sizefits-all MN approach.

I will continue to contest the extension of his powers on behalf of the communities I represent. We are made up counties and towns of different sizes, not just one big city. We need to get back to the legislative process, so every member has the opportunity to properly represent their communities. It is time to trust the people of Minnesota and let them exercise their freedom and personal responsibility.

units for 55+ (patio homes, twin homes, apartments) are being developed by Avalon Homes.

Supervisors Larry Alfords, Norm Leslie and Bruce Aubol expressed their concerns for all the "affordable housing" units and how that might affect surrounding property values. They also hinted at the concern over the potential for poorly maintained structures, homelessness, increased crime and traffic, and negative changes to neighborhood character-

Klimmek reassured the supervisors that the units being developed will be well maintained, will not adversely affect property values and will eventually offer opportunities for commercial developers to come to the area. She also mentioned the need for affordable — or any housing since the vacancy rate is at 0% in Big Lake and most of Sherburne County.

Klimmek proceeded to update the board on commercial and industrial progress including the new Minnco Credit Union, the expansion of the WWTF, new construction for Nystrom & Associates and the new business arrival of Great River Federal Credit Union, which hopes to begin construction of their new building off Co. Rd. 43 and Hwy. 10 soon.

Klimmek highlighted permit activity in Big Lake for the month of June which included 393 permits so far

for 2020 for single-family, multi-family, commercial,

remodels, mechanical,

plumbing, zoning, land al-

terations and fire permits.

In comparison, Klimmek said Big Lake has seen 40 more permits processed than in 2019 and \$109,000+ more fees collected in the month of June than in 2019.

Klimmek finished by noting the city had been working on community branding and identity until COVID-19 halted that project until a future date. She noted the city is looking for a someone to fill the city planner position and that Midcontinent (Midco) is constructing within Big Lake Twp. She also said the city is continuing to do their best to support the business community during this unprecedented time.

CARES Act

The board noted a meeting is scheduled for July 22 at 7 p.m. at Sherburne County to discuss the CARES ACT and the County Assn. of Twps. The board decided to send Treasurer Ken Warneke as representative. **CUP Permit**

Mike Walberg was on-hand to discuss a CUP application to construct a 30'x40' personal storage unit on property he owns in the township. Walberg's CUP was needed since the land is vacant and no housing structure on the parcel means the county will not

Walberg assured the board he plans to build a home on the property next summer. The board agreed to allow for the CUP and send the proper forms to the county for approval.

Resignation Supervisor Robert

Hofer advised the board he wanted to resign due to health issues and the board approved. Hofer had been re-elected in 2019 to serve a four-year term and the board elected to discuss the vacancy at the next meeting. They also appointed Dean Brenteson as vice chair.

Elk River man pleads guilty to screw throwing

An Elk River man has pleaded guilty to throwing thousands of screws onto Sherburne County roads last year.

Sixty-three-year-old Jeffrey Scot Caouette has agreed to a plea agreement where he pleaded guilty to a felony count of 1st-degree criminal damage to property. A second count of the same charge will be dismissed at sentencing.

According to the criminal complaint, Caouette told investigators he was in

a romantic relationship that had ended and he believed his ex-girlfriend was seeing someone new. Caouette was arrested

last August after a caller reported seeing a vehicle near Zimmerman Terrace Park that matched the description of a vehicle Big Lake police had identified as being involved in numerous incidents including the dispersing of screws on

Caouette was stopped at Fremont Avenue and 10th Street in Zimmerman just minutes after the caller reported the sighting, according to Sherburne County Sheriff Joel Brott. Caouette admitted having screws in his vehicle and produced a five-pound box of screws. During questioning he admitted to throwing screws on various roadways numerous times. Big Lake police said

they had as many as 200 reports of tires being damaged by screws or of screws being found on the roads in the prior two months leading up to the arrest according to BL Police Chief Joel Scharf.

Brott said his department also received dozens of similar calls. **Bad Turns To Good** In the aftermath of the

screw tossing debacle, Jeff and Laura Jones, owners of Sand Dunes Auto Repair in Orrock decided to offer free repairs of tires punctured from the screws Caouette tossed on area roads.

With the offer, the Joneses were fielding about five or so appointments a day for the repairs. Their good deed encouraged several area citizens to volunteer to walk the streets where the screws were strewn to pick them up off the road.

Federal and state aid programs available for farmers

You've likely seen that both the Minnesota State Legislature and the U.S. Congress passed financial relief laws in response to the COVID-19 situation. But what do they mean financially for farmers and other agricultural small business owners? This article offers a short summary of some of the recent legislation.

Federal Programs

The Families FIRST Act requires all employers to offer paid sick time for eligible absences related to COVID-19. Farmers are not exempt from this requirement.

The CARES Act created the Payroll Protection Program (PPP), which can cover 2.5 months of payroll or owner's compensation for small businesses. This includes most self-employed farmers (with or without additional employees). The application period runs through Aug. 8. Additional laws included more PPP forgivable loan funding and made agricultural enterprises eligible for another Small Business Administration program, Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs and EIDL

The CARES Act also created partial funding for the United States Department of Agriculture's Coronavirus Food Assistance Program (CFAP). Producers whose products saw price declines or who had increased marketing costs earlier this year because of COVID-19 are eligible. Most crops and livestock (but no poultry), milk, many specialty crops, and wool qualify for payments. Eligibility is generally for losses incurred between Jan. 15 and April 15. To see if you qualify and get help preparing an application, call or email your local Farm Service Agency office. Or, you can apply online at farmers. gov/cfap. The application period runs through Aug.

Minnesota Programs Like the federal government, Minnesota also enacted several provisions to help farmers. For example, Minnesota's Rural Finance Authority has additional low interest loans available to help farmers during this time. The Minnesota Department of Agriculture has several other programs, too. The AGRI Safe at the Farmer's Market Cost Share and AGRI Safe at the Farm Cost Share

provide financial assistance to farmer's markets and direct-to-consumer farms to purchase equipment and supplies to keep markets, vendors, and customers safe and operational.

County Accessing Over \$11 Million

Commissioners approve COVID-19 response plans

The Sherburne County Board of Commissioners met Tuesday morning with a myriad of decisions related to the Covid pandemic on the agenda. With the action taken, application for funds will start being accessible to businesses and individuals within weeks.

Assistant County Administrator Dan Weber detailed for the board the \$11,667,800 in CARES Act funding available to the county and also noted that another \$5.85 million in funding is available for cities and townships within Sherburne County. The county is planning a July 22 meeting with area townships to help them plan for accessing the funding at a

Sherburne County was one of the first in Minnesota to submit the necessary paperwork and was also one of the first to receive the funds, which arrived last

Despite the substantial amount of funding available, the big caveat is that there is a limited amount of time for the county to oversee its dispersal.

"There is a sense of urgency here because we've been given a short period of time to use the money," noted Board Chair Felix

Schmiesing. "We want to get this out on the street."

To that end, Weber presented a couple of options to the board for adoption. The first is a Small Business Relief Fund geared towards providing a maximum of

\$30,000 to businesses who are eligible. To access the funds, companies need to have at least two full time and no more than 50 full time

employees and the money needs to be earmarked for expenses such as rent, mortgage payments, payroll and other operational costs. Property tax payments are not eligible for the funding. It's also geared towards businesses that have not received other Covid related funding in the past.

The Board moved approval of the program and Weber said staff is hoping to be able to roll out the online portal by July 27 and it would be open until August

HHS Director Amanda Larson spoke about the second initiative, which caters to adults and families in need of assistance. The program will in large part be an extension of the EA and EGA programs already administered by the county. Larson proposed the plan, which pro-

vides up to \$2,000 for adults famior lies who meet criteria such as income guidelines, which will be set at 300% of the federal poverty level. For example, a family

of four would see a cap of \$78,000 to be eligible for the funding. Eligible expenses could include certain home repairs, transportation related needs and Covid related funeral expenses. Once the statewide moratorium on evictions expires, the funding could also help with rent and housing assistance.

After some discussion, the board moved approval of the program with a similar timeline as the business fund, although Larson noted that staff would soon begin giving priority review to previous applications for assistance that may have recently been denied due to stricter income caps.

A fund for nonprofit organizations was also discussed and will be reviewed at the next county board meeting, as will a plan to access the broadband funding mechanisms available

under the legislation. County Administrator Bruce Messelt informed the board that staff will move as expeditiously as possible to make the applications available to the public and he noted that at each upcoming board meeting, a deep dive into the data will be made available for updates into how much money is being awarded. He also wouldn't rule out the possible need for additional special meetings to be called.

Local COVID Update

Larson provided the board with an update of the local COVID pandemic numbers which can all be accessed on the county website. It is updated three times a week and contains very detailed information about spread within individual communities.

She noted that the average age of COVID infections has fallen dramatically since the early days of the pandemic, with younger people now counting for a majority of infections. As of the meeting, Sherburne County had experienced 31 hospitalizations during the pandemic including 12 individuals who required ICU treatment.

She also pointed out that the St. Cloud Reformatory has accounted for 12 cases, while the Sherburne County Jail remains Covid-

Preparedness Plan

Messelt presented the updated preparedness plan for the board's review and adoption. While it does not require facial coverings within the government center, they are strongly urged, as the building remains open for essential services on an appointment only basis. He reminded everyone that the MN Court system recently mandated facial coverings for the general public in all court buildings and added that local court staff would be complying with the facial cover mandate.




