FORMER CLEAR LAKE EMPLOYEES CHARGED WITH THEFT, EMBEZZLEMENT

Charges filed recently in Sherburne County in the 10th Judicial District allege that three former employees of the City of Clear Lake defrauded the city of over \$200,000 from late 2022 through 2023.

The former employees, Kari Koren (former clerk), Chad Koren (retired firefighter) and Dustin Luhning (former public works director), each face felony counts of theft and embezzlement of public funds.

According to a statement of probable cause in the criminal complaint, the Sherburne County Sheriff's Office received a financial fraud complaint from the city in April of 2024, alleging that the three employees had been stealing funds.

A forensic accountant was subsequently hired to investigate the financial activity of the city from November 1, 2022 until

December 31, 2023, and the review included credit card statements, vendor billing, payroll records, disbursements and bank statement

and signed the affidavits in the charging documents. Those records indicate

claimed that wage overpayments made to him were a mistake. Furthermore, he claimed that purchases from Luner Equipment and Discount Supply and Equipment "saved the city quite a bit of money". He later admitted to creating accounts for those vendors and profiting from the amounts the city paid

for the purchases. In all, Luhning's financial fraud is alleged to have been in the amount of \$71,077.45.

Chad Koren is accused of using a city credit card for personal purchases and defrauding the city of \$4,987.17. Koren provided a voluntary statement to the Anoka County Sheriff's Office in which he admitted that "money was tight" and things had snowballed.

Kari Koren's alleged illegal activity included payroll overpayment and fraudulent purchases totaling \$125,217.37. According to the charging documents, "defendant Kari Koren wrote a letter to the City Counsil (sic) during the investigation. She claimed that her actions were not intentional and that the errors in her accounting were either due to a software issue or because she forgot to reimburse the city for miscellaneous personal items."

Later, on June 25, Koren provided a voluntary statement to Anoka County, indicating "she was going through some personal issues and financial hardship during that time period."

Court records indicate that all three are scheduled for remote hearings on January 14, 2026 in Sherburne County 10th District Court.

Sophisticated phishing scheme targets Becker Twp what they can on their end,

An organized, sophisticated phishing scheme targeting Becker township residents was discussed at Monday's town board meeting.

Township Clerk Lucinda Messman talked about the ongoing issue, wherein the fraudsters are likely utilizing artificial intelligence to comb through township records and then create very realistic emails soliciting funds online.

Most often, the ma-



licious emails utilize personalized information and official looking logos to impersonate township staff who then request a wire transfer to pay for recent zoning and permitting ser-

Messman explained that the township is doing

encoding information and utilizing IT staff to help safeguard information. 'As a township, we do

not send emails to people asking for money," Mess-man explained, adding that people of all ages are being targeted. "We are old fashioned and encourage people to come into the Town Hall and write a check . . . we never use or ask for wire transfers."

Board Chair Brian Kolbinger noted the authentic look of the phishing correspondence.

"These requests look

very real," Kolbinger noted "We're doing what we can, but we want to get the word out to people about what's happening.'

Supervisor Brad Wilkening's name has been fraudulently used in some of the phishing attempts, and he offered another tip for the general public. "They are not only

using AI, but also they add a sense of urgency (to demand people to pay immediately)," Wilkening noted.

World War II stories become alive again


The Bridge at Remagen

It was March, 1945. The American war effort, coupled with the service of our Allied countries, had gone well. We had broken through the German defenses at Normandy, had liberated Paris and Caen, France, in July, 1944 - and had progressed eastward into Germany.

The Germans occasionally put up stout defenses and waited at the Rhine River. The Remagen Bridge was an arterial piece of the German war effort in each the First and Second World Wars, for it transported troops from that country to the west and back to the east, as war strategies required. It was doing just that in the spring of 1945. Recoiling German

The Germans first wanted to protect the bridge so they could escape across it to the east. When their soldiers were across, it was decided to blow the thing up. The date was March 7.

Raymond Brandl, a Nebraska soldier enlisted since 1941, was part of the action. He was a member of the 104th Field Artillery Unit 409. Their effort was to save the bridge so American troops, vehicles and supplies could transport eastward.

And that they did. Over the next several days, the Americans were able to transport 18,000 Allied forces across the bridge before it went down. Among the forces going East? Gen. George Patton's tank division. And British General Montgomery was next in The Remagen bridge,

located on the Rhine,15 miles south of Bonn, was not the only bridge used by the Allies to access eastern locales in Germany. But it was the one most foughtover, and the one most coveted for its strategic location. Young Brandl was on

the bridge when it was captured. The capture of the Remagen Bridge and the strategic part it played in Americans further east into Germany led to one of Germany's biggest troop losses of the war. The Americans' mission was to corral the Germans on the east side of the river and combine them with German prisoners from the Ruhr industrial area to the north. The Americans were able to take 300,000 out of service

to the Fuhrer The large number of prisoners put too much of a strain on Allied supplies, and many Germans died of disease and starvation before the Americans could recruit the French to take over those responsibilities.

Dachau

Concentration Camp It was almost a year later before the service of Raymond's older brother, John Brandl, came into focus. Sergeant John Brandl, was serving with Company B, 524th Military Police Battalion when his unit was dispatched to the Munich region of south central Germany. Their focus? The Dachau Concentration Camp, which had the distinction of hav-

Prior to the Monday, November 17 meeting of the Clear Lake City Council, extra chairs were put out in anticipation of residents showing up to inquire about recent charges filed against former city employees.

In the period from Nov. 1, 2022 through Dec. 31, 2023, former City Clerk Kari Koren has been accused of getting paid for hours not worked and fraudulent purchases totaling \$125,217.37. Former Public Works Director Dustin Luhning has been accused of the same with the total being \$71,077.45. The filed complaint also accuses Fire Fighter Chad Koren with making personal charges totaling \$4,987.17 on city credit

Council Member Chad Nelson read a prepared statement, "The City is aware that former city employees Kari Koren, Chad Koren, and Du tin L**h**i ng were charged with theft and embezzlement of public fuds . The City Couc il became aware of potential financial issues in 2024 and retained a forensic a**d**i tor to review city records with the assistance of the mayor and a previous council memb r.

Nelson continued. "Throughout the en-

tire process, city staff, the Fire Department, and the council cooperated with the auditors and attorneys to investigate. City officials and staff were under strict instructions to not discuss these issues until the investigation was completed and the information made public. Pursuant to t**h** Minnesota Government Data Practices Act, the city cannot divulge private fore cannot divli ge p ivate fore cannot provide further comments at this time. Please refer to the criminal complaints for more infor-

No one in attendance spoke during open forum.

New Radios and Pagers

Fire Chief Ron Koren's request for funds to purchase new radios and pagers for the Clear Lake Fire Department was approved. Koren submitted a bid for seven Motorola APX N30 Portable Radios totaling \$9,929.4 and another for six Motorola pagers totaling \$,325.

Adolph Hitler's 13 years of power.

Dachau was designed to hold some of Hitler's most-hated enemies, the mental and physically-defected - and his political enemies. But not long after its opening, Dachau began to serve a more ominous purpose - elimination of prisoners of war.

In 1941, Germany had been at war with its neighbors to the east for two years. And that included the Russians. So, what happens to Russian prisoners of war? They get transported by train to Dachau, where their days are numbered. They are executed by firing squad shortly after stepping off the train. That

Dachau was designed as a holding facility for prisoners of The Reich. Not so much as a killing institution. But the guides told our group that of its design for 44,000 inmates, likely 20 percent did not survive it.

Annette Brandl, daughter of the American military policeman, recounts his stories about war against the Germans

"People are meaner than animals," he said of the German occupiers at Dachau. "He told of the lampshades being made out of Jews' skin, with tattoos on the shade. Gold being taken out of Jews' mouths by the Germans, as well as cutting off the fingers of the men for jewelry." When Brandl's MP unit charged Dachau to liberate it in

April,1945, there were just two dozen or so Germans onsite. A quick fire fight dissolved the defense and then was the MP's job to gain order and assure the prisoners their lives were no longer in jeopardy.

Brandl later noted many prisoners had no place to go, or were afraid for their safety outside the walls. He was transferred away from Dachau in December, 1945.

Brandl told of earlier times, during his unit's march across Europe - and of the fighting in fields and pastures. Farmers would give soldiers their bedsheets to the GIS for camouflage cover. They used coffee grounds and egg to make coffee. They would also shoot cows for meat out in the field.

John's wife, Dorothea, recounted her memory of John, crying as he told a story about action in Normandy. He had shot a 16-year-old German out of a tree.

John and Raymond Brandl returned home to Humphrey, Nebraska after the war and lived out their lives at the farm, marrying and raising children in the peace and quiet of the Midwestern prairie. Raymond died in 1999; John in 2010.

The Eagles Nest

There is a most-beautiful area of Germany called Berchtesgaden, where the Alps form above the lakes and communities in the far southeast. Hitler recognized it as his favorite playground in 1932 and dispatched his business people to purchase properties up in the mountains from 700 residents, many of them against their will.

But, the Fuhrer persisted and was soon at work with his architects, designing Eagles Nest, which he visited only 14 times during his 14-year reign. The work on his venture, which included an elevator capable of transporting 50 people, took only a year and a half to complete.

The October day on which our group visited the Eagles Nest started as a slightly rainy day down in the valley. But by the time our tour bus was halfway up its ascent, the rains turned into slushy snow. It was a typical Minnesota wind-driven snow storm with temperatures at or below freezing by the time we reached the top. A picture of oneself in front of Hitler's fireplace and bowl of chili added to the scene.

NOTE: The petroleum-fueled buses were required to stop and turn over their passengers midway up the ascent to electric-powered vehicles because of environmental rules. But the venue was indeed worth seeing, if only to appreciate the wonderful engineering of the time. An average 2,000 to 3,000 people each day visit the site in the summer months.

On Thursday, Nov. 6 Judge Walter Kaminsky sentenced Jonathan James Schafer of Becker to two years in prison and 364 days in county jail with credit for 175 days served, but stayed the prison sentence, meaning he won't have to report to prison if he follows conditions of a threeyear probation. Conditions include completing chemical dependency treatment and not using alcohol or drugs.

Schafer pled guilty in September to both felony failure to stop after a collision resulting in death and fourth-degree driving while impaired. His passenger was identified as 23-year-old Julia

Bulldog swimmers and divers excel at state

It was a best-ever finish for the Becker Swimming and Diving team at last week's MSHSL State Swimming and Diving Championships.

"Overall, it was the best showing we've had at the state meet," Coach Tina Tamm said. "Five medal winners, two relays, and 12th place as a team - all things we haven't done before." In the preliminary

rounds, Maggie Graning performed great on her first eight dives to advance to the final round in fifth place. In Saturday's finals,

Graning was again stellar in her final three dives and secured a spot on the podium with a fifth place finish in In another Thursday

prelim performance, the 200 medley relay team of Laila Cook, Izza Mork, Grace Mork, and Mia Suelter finished in 17th place, just missing the chance to swim in the consolation heat on Saturday by .60 seconds.

Grace Mork also had a great prelim round in the 200 free, swimming another personal best time and bettering her Section record to earn a place in the finals.

Grace also swam the prelims in the 500 free, earning a spot next to the top seed where she finished just one second behind to place second and earn a spot in the finals.

On Saturday, Grace faced off against the top swimmers in the state and performed admirably, earning an eighth place finish in



Residents **Again Ask** Council to Replace Playground Equipment

All members of the Big Lake City Council were in attendance for the Oct. 22 meeting of the Big Lake City Council.

Residents living near Mitchell Farm Park were again in attendance to express their displeasure with the council's recent decision to remove the playground equipment at their park with no immediate plans to replace it. The council received their comments and then moved on to regular business.

2026 Meeting Change

Council voted on four motions that would allow them to meet monthly beginning in 2026, instead of meeting bi-monthly. Multiple motions had to be approved to amend a city ordinance and city council bylaws concerning council meetings. Upon approval of those motions, the 2026 schedule had to be approved and authorization for publication of the new ordinance had to be passed. All motions passed 4-1, with Council Member Ken Halvorson being the lone descent. City council meetings, beginning in 2026, will be held the third Wednesday of each month.

Playgrounds and City Hall

During the time reserved for meeting updates from council members, Halvorson called for a consensus vote to get the Mitchell Farms playground back on the agenda to reevaluate it. Council member Kim Noding seconded the motion. The motion failed 2-3, with both Noding and Halvorson voting for the

In his final statements, Halvorson spoke about the proposed Big Lake Public Safety Facility which would house City Hall and the Police Department. He asserted that financing the \$33 million project through the Big Lake Economic Development Authority would cost the city an additional \$2 million. Halvorson argued that by financing through BLEDA, taxpayers will have no input and they deserve to know.

Mayor Paul Knier said that the process has been transparent and that it, "only makes sense to go through EDA.

Council Member Ken Geroux echoed Knier's statement and said it was the best way to maintain costs, keep the project under budget, and avoid delays.

The Big Lake Public Safety Facility was the main topic of the September 24, 2025 city council workshop. During the workshop, City Administrator Hanna Klimmek stated that the overall cost of the project was estimated to be \$31,144,950 with a not-to-exceed budget of \$33 million. She also defended the city's financing decision stating, "A Lease Revenue Bond will allow the city to structure payments, timing, and project-specific funding more flexibility than a traditional CIP (Capital Improvement Project) Bond, and a LRB (Lease Revenue Bond) will distribute repayment through existing revenues

On a chilly, windy, and overcast Friday afternoon on Nov. 7, M&M Precision Machining owners Matt and Mike James were joined by representatives from the City of Big Lake and Mendota Heights-based R. J. Ryan Construction Inc. to break ground for their new 60,000 sq. ft. headquarters and man-

ufacturing facility. Currently located in Elk River, M&M has begun to outgrow their current facility. Their move to Big Lake should accommodate for any current and future growth.
