
Refuge sees record number of Sandhill Cranes

Earlier this month, the Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge (SNWR) saw a record number of sandhill cranes stop by on their migration journey. A total of 29,256 cranes were counted on Nov. 8 of this year, blowing the previous record for a single day's count out of the water.

The previous record number of cranes counted in a single day was set back on October 31, 2019, with 14,578 being counted.

Since 2002, staff members and volunteers at the refuge have counted the cranes coming through during the fall. Starting the second week of October, they count every crane spotted flying overhead once per week. The weekly counts will continue until there is a decline in the count from one week to the next. Volunteers stand at various stations throughout the St. Francis Wetland, where the cranes like to gather, to make sure there is

very little double-counting.

Since they began counting in 2002, staff has noticed a continual increase in the number of cranes passing though, but the number has increased significantly in the past few years. Although 2020 and 2021 did not break the single-day record number of cranes, the overall number

of sandhill cranes counted during that time was growing each year.

Cody Carlstrom, wildlife biologist at the refuge, said there could be several reasons for the increase in cranes. Both state and local laws protect the birds from being hunted by humans,



Neustrom worked in print sales for over 40 years, mostly for yellow page directories, before Google effectively destroyed his career. He felt lost, wondering what he was going to do with his life.

Believing he had nothing left to give except to God, he sold everything he had and joined a monastery. He spent nearly two years there before leaving, during which he helped start 10 new Christian churches, spent time in Africa doing mission work, and helped start several men's monas-

Working through Best Seller Publishing, he did a launch of the book on October 31 which, because of the title, he felt was appropriate. By the end of the week it ranked in Amazon's top 10 in 22 categories, including #1 in 10 of them, and it was #1 in the U.S., Germany, Canada, and Australia. The publisher stated the results were "un-

The glowing reviews have been wide ranged, from readers saying they received spiritual inspiration to readers talking about its key business tactics.

"It's been a rewarding process but absolutely the hardest thing I've ever done in my life," said Neustrom. "I put myself out there, making myself vulnerable."

This isn't Neustrom's first experience with publishing success. He's also featured in another #1 bestcalled Coaching Inc with lead author Ray Brehm. Brehm told Neustrom his chapter, called TOPGUN Coaching, was his favorite chapter in the book. Neustrom believes

part of his drive and determination came from his competitive career in gymnastics, where he was a five time state champion in high school and a member of the #1 ranked collegiate team in the nation while he attended the University of Nebraska.

Another story in the book is called "The Blind Helps the Lost to See,' which talks about how he met his wife Cherise, who is blind, in 2019. Today they enjoy traveling in their RV, last year going out on tour and offering to pray for people. The couple live in Clearwater Estates and attend Living Waters Church in Clear Lake, where Cher-



And on Oct. 3, 1863, with this victory in mind along with acknowledge of its great cost, President Abraham Lincoln delivered a proclamation, which is viewed as the beginning of the national holiday of Thanksgiving Day.

"I do therefore invite

my fellow citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next, as a day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the Heavens."

Minnesota homeowners and renters struggling to pay energy bills are encouraged to act now to ensure your home is warm and safe this winter. The Energy

Assistance Program administered by the Minnesota Department

of Commerce and the Cold Weather Rule administered by the Minnesota Public Utilities Commission (PUC) give homeowners and renters options to pay your utility bills, to reduce your energy costs and to protect you from having your heat and power disconnected.

"The Cold Weather Rule puts Minnesotans' health and safety first by ensuring your heat stays on during our cold weather months," said PUC Chair Katie Sieben. "We encourage you to contact your utility company now to avoid shutoffs."

Commerce Commissioner Grace Arnold said, 'With one application, Minnesotans can qualify for energy assistance and weatherization assistance to make energy bills more affordable and to permanently lower your energy bills. You can also apply for assistance to pay past-due water and sewer bills.'

When does the Cold Weather Rule take effect? The Cold Weather Rule





Most tax rates lower in 2023

Although actual taxes due in 2023 may be higher than in 2022, tax rates across the county will be lower next year.

A report released by the Sherburne County Auditor/ Treasurer's Dept. earlier this month shows all 10 townships and five of seven cities in the county could have lower tax rates in 2023.

The biggest proposed rate drop is in the City of Big Lake, which will fall almost nine percent from 47.505% to 38.765%. The rural service district in the city (RSD) will fall from 13.821% to 9.067%. (RSDs are typically undeveloped properties in a city that are not benefitted to the same

degree as other lands.) The City of Clear Lake

is next, with a proposed rate drop from 61.062% to 53.695%.

Zimmerman's rate is expected to fall from 42.697% to 36.783%, with the RSD dropping from 14.945% to 12.873%.

Princeton's rate continues to be the highest in the county, but that rate will drop from 63.980% to 57.099% in 2023. The RSD in the city will also fall from 20.357% to 15.291%. Elk River will have a

lower tax rate in 2023, from 43.957% to 39.898%. The only cities in the

county with proposed increases are Becker (44.322% to 44.905%) and East St. Cloud (50.904% to 51.995%).

All 10 townships are proposing tax rate decreases for 2023.

The biggest drops will be in Blue Hill Twp. (18.083% to 12.872%) and Livonia Twp. (22.113% to 17.337%).

The remaining eight

townships all have proposed decreases less than four percent. They are: Baldwin (16.590% 12.859%), Becker (17.987% to 15.639%), Big Lake (21.592% to 20.039%), Clear Lake (15.598% to 13.479%), (17.990% Haven 14.521%), Orrock (22.187% 18.440%), Palmer (16.101% to 13.242%) and (16.429% to Santiago 14.027%)

Total taxes payable will also be affected by the market value of the home or business, local levies, and by other taxing districts, such as Sherburne County, fire departments and school dis-

The county's tax rate

is expected to fall from 44.080% to 38.768%.

All seven school districts that affect Sherburne County properties will also have lower tax rates in 2023. They include Foley Dist. 51 (25.378% to 22.031%), Princeton Dist. 477 (24.658% to 21.260%), Becker Dist. 726 (21.835% to 19.264%), Big Lake Dist 727 (35.401% to 29.825%), Elk River Dist. 728 (30.889% to 26.483%) and Monticello Dist. 882 (15.459% to 12.815%).

Tax notices were sent out beginning Nov. 16. They include line items for each taxing jurisdiction, tax rates and proposed 2023 taxes.

incoming kindergartners in the 2023-2024 schoolyear. Dual Immersion in Span-

ish will be offered at Clearview and Westwood Elementary Schools, and Dual Immersion in Somali will be offered at Discovery and Talahi Community

Schools. At Clearview, kindergarteners in the fall of 2023 will transition to a dual immersion program in Spanish from full immersion. In a dual language immersion program, or two-way immersion, the goal is for students to receive instruction half the day in the target language and half the day in English.

In a full immersion program, students are immersed in a second language while they learn, math, reading, writing, social studies, science, health and other subjects. 

About Sandhill Cranes

Sandhill cranes do not produce many offspring during their lifetimes. The cranes are not sexually mature until they are about five years old, and, after that, they will typically only produce one or two offspring at a time.

During their migration every year, the sandhill cranes make their way down to the southeast coast of the country, settling in warm, wetland areas such as Florida, Georgia, and Alabama.



Early Ice Jiggin' 101 -**Choosing the Right Bait!**

in the day, the go to ice jigging bait for early ice perch or walleyes was a silver Swedish Pimple. The other option was a Kastmaster. Today. the shelves at the local bait

shop are decorated with hundreds of icy fish enticing vertical jigging options geared towards helping you catch the big one. For many ice anglers, the choice of what to drop down the hole can be quite overwhelm-Actually, it's quite simple if you un-

derstand just a of stuff) to help fe w k e y

points in regards to the jigging lure itself and how to match the lure to the aggressiveness of the walleye or perch your chasing.

Let's keep this simple and break down the multitude of ice jigging lures into 3 basic groups. The groups of jigging lures are based on the action/characteristics of the lure themselves and the general activity level of the fish. Drum roll please..... The three basic jigging lure groups are:

1. Swimming/gliding lures, 2. Updown lures and 3. Basic jig heads (like your favorite lead head jig you use all summer long). Let's quickly chat about each category and the basic application.

1. Swimming or gilding lures. Swimming or gliding lures themselves make up the most aggressive lure group of the three groups. After the initial upward pull (usually 1-2 ft), these lures swim or glide up, then out to the side as they begin an unpredictable darting quarter to full circle type pattern downward as it settles back to its original starting point. Let it sit still for 10-15 seconds, then "twitch" it about 5 seconds, let it sit still again for another 10-15 seconds and repeat! That's a lot of action fishing through a hole in the ice! Common examples of these lures are the Jigging Rapala, Northland Puppet Minnow, Salmo Hornet, or the Moonshine Shiver Minnow. I use these lures 90% of the time to catch aggressively feeding fish of all species—like a hot crappie bite, "golden hour" walleyes, or pike in general. The other 10% of the time I use swimming/gliding lures to trigger fish that are not aggressive at all. Can you say deadly on finicky walleye? In other words, this group of lures can be quite versatile. Keep the colors basic. Bright "fire tiger" type colors in stained water, golds/oranges/ glow in tanic stained water (i.e. Lake of The Woods/ Rainy), and the classic silver/black, gold/black, white, perch, silver/ blue in clear water situations. Fish the baits "naked" or tipped with a small minnow head for scent (a big minnow head can ruin the action). Experiment with different upward pull lengths and pause time in between your customized jigging sequence. I hang 'em up on a lighter monofilament line like Berkley Trilene 8-10 lb. test tied directly to the lure or with a small cross

I probably catch 75% of my fish throughout the winter using this lure group. I also tend to use smaller sizes (1.5"-1/8 oz. type)

Minnow tails work too, but the heads are better most of the time. I start with a more aggressive jigging approach using 1-3 foot upward pulls, let it settle and sit for 5-10 seconds, twitch for 3 seconds, let it sit for 5-10 seconds, then another







"A couple years ago we canceled it because of COVID and the last few years, we just didn't feel like putting a hardship on area businesses with requests after all they went through with the disease,' said Gevens.

A survey was initially introduced to the guests asking them what they

liked or didn't like about Freedom Days past. It also asked for any suggestions to make the event more successful and also asked if any of the guests would like to be on the committee or non-profit organization.

"We'd like to see the community grow the event over the next couple years,' said Knutson. "We'd still be involved at the city level for services, of course, but we just want the community to drive this thing.'

Several suggestions were made at the meeting to generate fundraising including re-instituting the t-shirts with sponsors on them, bringing in pulltabs, etc. The city also said they are committed to their budget of \$14,000 for this next year to go towards the event.

Kuha suggested this committee be organized soon since planning for the summertime event usually begins just after the first of

the year. He said the commitment for the committee would most likely be meeting, serving at the event and attending planning meet-"We'd like to get a

team built soon, so spread the word about this opportunity," Kuha said.
