

erate motorboats-including personal watercraft—to have a valid watercraft operator's permit. People who already

have a watercraft operator's permit are not affected by the law, which is designed to make boating safer by ensuring everyone operating a motorized watercraft knows the rules and is properly trained. Here's a breakdown of the key points:

Adult Operators

Permit requirement: Some adults (defined below) need a valid operator's permit to drive any motorboat or personal watercraft starting July 1,

Exemptions: Some adults are exempt from this requirement. Check the law for specific exemptions.

Supervised operation: People without a permit still can operate a boat, but only if there's an accompanying operator (defined below) onboard.

Young Operators Restrictions

on high-powered watercraft: Young operators (people less than 12 years old), can't operate a personal watercraft or any motorboat with a motor over 75 horsepower.

Low-powered motorboats: Young operators can operate a motorboat that's not a personal watercraft and has a motor under 75 horsepower as long as there is an accompanying operator in the motorboat.

Ruddy Ducks

When I go out to photograph wildlife, I usually have a specific species of critter in mind. The best images are the ones that I had envisioned ahead of time, carefully planned and executed. There isn't anything left to chance. I make sure that I go to the spots or areas where the species is most abundant and I go at the time of year when I can expect to see the critter in good numbers.

I think it's a common misconception that wildlife photographers just wonder around, hoping to get lucky. Or they stand in the woods for hours and hours waiting for something to transpire right in front of them. Honestly, this might work but the odds are very low. The best photographers are focused, pun not intended, on a specific species and are actively working to obtain an image.

Having said that, every now and then, while trying to photograph a specific species, another, unrelated species presents itself. This is exactly what happened this spring. I was out photographing Western Grebes and I happened to see a duck species that was busy courting a female. The duck was a Ruddy Duck (Oxyura jamaicensis).

The Ruddy Duck, is one of six species of "stiff-tailed ducks" in the genus Oxyura. They are found in North and South America. They breed mostly in the western half of the country extending as far east as the Great Lakes. Their common name comes from the rusty red breeding plumage of the male.

It is a small, round, compact duck. The male is rusty or chestnut brown with a striking black cap and white cheeks. One of the most outstanding features is the male's large bright blue bill. It has a set of dark, nearly black, stiff, tail feathers that it cocks

straight up while swimming around and displaying. Only a handful of duck species have these specialized tail feathers and the Ruddy is the only one in North America. While I am at it, I mentioned this bird's large sky-blue bill. Hunters commonly call Lesser and Greater Scaup, blue bills. If there was a species that should be called Blue Bill it should be the Ruddy Duck, not the Scaups. Just one look at the male and you will understand what I am saying.

Similar to the feathers of Blue Jays and Bluebirds, there isn't any blue pigment in the bill of the male. In spring, hormones cause the growth of a thin layer of cells over the dark bill. These cells, along with the dark layer below absorb all the wavelengths of sunlight and reflect back to our eyes only the blue color light. As a result, we see a blue bill.

Male Ruddy Ducks preform a very distinct and unusual drumming of their lower bill (mandible) against their chest feathers. He hits his bill on his chest hard enough to produce a "drumming" sound. The physical act of drumming its lower bill against its chest also sends a torrent of bubbles in the water right in front of the displaying male. This display is known as "bubbling"

It is not very common to see Ruddy Ducks flying. They

TO THE EDITOR:

As Chair of the Wright County Republicans, I want to commend Minnesota House and Senate Republicans for their constructive and solution-oriented role during the 2025 legislative session. migrate during the night, and they don't fly around much during the day, however I got lucky enough to see this lone male Ruddy Duck take a couple laps around the wetland before coming back and landing. Ruddies don't fly very high, and they fly very fast. Combine that with the fact they are a very small duck, they make for a very challenging subject to capture images while in flight.

This male took flight three times, each time flying far enough away to lose sight of it. After a few minutes it would come flying back in like a rocket. It would cruise just above the cattails and when it reached open water it would drop down and fly directly over the water. This allowed me to capture some fabulous, eye-level images of this most remarkable duck in flight. Sometimes you go out specifically to capture one species and come home with something completely different. This is one of the joys of wildlife photography. Until next time..

One person was injured at Lakeside Park on July 4 in Big Lake and the local police are investigating the incident which led to the wounded person receiving treatment at a local hospi-

Is 12 years old or older, and was born after these dates: June 30, 2004 (started July 1, 2025); June 30, 2000 (starts July 1, 2026); June 30, 1996 (starts July 1, 2027); June 30, 1987 (starts July 1, 2028).

This means people born after June 30, 2004, will need a permit to operate a boat starting in 2025. The permit requirement will gradually apply to older age groups over the next few years.

Who is Considered an **Accompanying Operator?**

A person 21 years of age or older who is in a personal watercraft or other type of motorboat; Is within immediate reach of the controls of the motor; and Possesses a valid operator's permit or is an exempt op-

Who is Considered an **Exempt Operator?**

"Exempt operator" means a motorboat operator, including a personal watercraft operator, who is 12 years of age or older and who possesses a valid license to operate a motorboat issued for maritime personnel by the United States Coast Guard under Code of Federal Regulations, title 46, part 10, or a marine certificate issued by the Canadian government;n Is not a resident of the state, is temporarily using the waters of the state for a period not to exceed 60 days, and meets any applicable requirements of the state or country of residency; Or possesses a Canadian pleasure craft operator's card; Is operating a motorboat under a dealer's license according to section 86B.405; or; Is operating a motorboat during an emergency.

Key Takeaways

Adult and youth permits: Young operators and some adults need a valid operator's permit to operate certain motorized watercraft. For adults born after June 30, 2004, the requirement started July 1, 2025. The law will extend to older age groups over time.

Youth restrictions: Young operators can't operate boats with more than 75 horsepower. They can operate boats (that are not PWC) with less than 75 horsepower if they're with an accompanying operator. Gradual rollout: The

law will phase in over the next few years. The operator permit requirement started July 1, 2025 and gradually expands through 2028. This new law aims to

improve safety on the water by making sure everyone operating a motorized watercraft is trained and qual-

Rentals

Eighteen and older: Must have a valid watercraft operator's permit.

Under 18: Cannot rent watercraft.

Low-Powered

Motorboats This new law does not affect individuals who operate motorboats powered by a motor with a factory rating of 25 horsepower or less. People of any age do not need a valid watercraft operator's permit or have an accompanying operator in the motorboat so long as it is not a personal watercraft and is powered by a motor with a factory rating of 25 horsepower or less.

Minnesota Farmers Union showcases local foods at its MFU Coffee Shop at 1635 Dan Patch Ave. on the Minnesota State Fairgrounds. The Coffee Shop is managed by Farmers Kitchen + Bar, an MFU-owned farmer-to-table

restaurant in downtown Minneapolis. MFU partners with other food artisans, including Earl Giles and J & S Bean Factory, to bring high-quality products to the Minnesota State Fair.

"At MFU, we take pride in supporting farmers and rural communities," said MFU President Gary Wertish. "Each year, we strive to showcase different foods grown in Minnesota at the state fair."

The Bison Meatball Sub includes bison and bacon meatballs made with Minnesota wild rice served with bison gravy, quick-pickled cucumbers, crispy fried onions and sour cream on a toasted wild rice hoagie.

The two Patisserie sweets are exclusive creations by Chef Kraus. The Apple Glaze features pull-apart doughnut dough baked with Minnesota-grown Honeycrisp apples and topped with brown sugar pecan streusel and orange blossom maple glaze. The Banana S'more is a twist on a traditional s'more with brown-butter crumb cake, bananas, marshmallows and chocolate chunks topped with graham cracker streusel.

Minnesota Farmers Union has had a presence at the Minnesota State Fair since 1953, with a building on the corner of Dan Patch Avenue and Cosgrove Street. It became the Farmers Union Coffee Shop in 2003.

Clear Lake City hires new city clerk and treasurer

During their recent meeting, the Clear Lake City Council split the role of city clerk into two roles: city clerk and city treasurer (both duties previously being performed by just the clerk). With that change, the council welcomed a new treasurer, Amanda Scheiber, and new city clerk, Ryan McCann, to their team of employees.

Open Forum

During open forum, one gentleman approached the council to ask about possibly purchasing some city-owned property that was adjacent to his property.

Bill and Colleen Kiffmeyer approached the council to express their interest in selling some of their land across from Hunter Lake. They wish to sell the acres that contain the house and other buildings, but keep the farmland.

Building Inspector

Building Inspector Nancy Scott from Allspec Services addressed the city council as a follow-up to the last meeting. At the previous meeting, the council asked a few different companies to provide sample inspections of a home in the city to get an idea of the services of each and the pricing of each company. Scott noted that her company hadn't been asked to participate, and Mc-Cann said his team used an inspection from 2023 to represent her company.

Scott asked to be able to submit a current sample, and the council agreed to ask each company for a sample again so they could better compare data and tabled the discussion for next time. Scott reminded the council that her company also provided zoning services for the

city at no cost, and they would also need to replace those services if they decided to move to another company.

Christopher Kearney of Jazacc Inspections was also available at the meeting and answered a few questions for the council

Lift Station

City Engineer Keith Yapp said there has been some difficulty getting an easement to access the lift station to complete the work. They would need to use privately owned land to get the work done, but one landowner had not yet given consent to use his property. Discussions were ongoing but stalled by the landowner being out of town. Without the easement, the work cannot be done.

ment, the work cannot be done.

Council decided to award a bid for work on contingency that they are able to get the easement they need. If they can, they will move forward. If not, they will have to begin legal proceedings to purchase

the land from the homeowner, which could be a drawn-out and costly process.

Public Works

A new flag was put up at the ballpark. Public Works Director Evan Johnson said he'd been speaking with the ball team about the fence, and they agreed a six-foot fence near the dugout would be the safest and best option.

While the city is waiting for their playground equipment to come in, they have to pay for weekly rainfall inspections at the Hunter Lake park in order to keep their permit open. Johnson offered a couple of options to save money, including putting in vegetation or just closing the permit and reopening it when the equipment arrives.

The council decided to pause the park project until next year after talking through all their options, and looking to get the park equipment installed in 2026.

Clerk McCann said he spoke with the city attorney, and said the old park equipment can be declared surplus and then donated or sold as the council saw fit. The council decided to ultimately just dispose of the equipment, as they were concerned about it holding up to play, and didn't want to risk any kids getting hurt on it.

In Other Business, the Council:

• Held a public hearing regarding a subdivision at 8169 State St., then approved the subdivision;

• Heard about the 46 calls for service by the sheriff's department and the 24 calls for service from the fire department.

• Approved an electrical easement for Northern State Power through Goenner Park.

Clear Lake Twp. still waiting on fire budget update

During their May and June meetings, the Clear Lake Twp. Board of Supervisors discussed numerous agenda items including their wait for a fire budget update, solar panels located within the township, street congestion caused by Clearview Elementary parents picking up their children, and sirens located within the township.

Fire Board

Chairman Bud Stimmler told the board he was strongly disappointed there has been no updates from the fire department during the township's last two meetings. The fire budget was originally supposed to be presented to the board in February.

The board understood they wouldn't have an update by that time, however, decisions on the budget and the new fire hall affect the township's levy discussions and shouldn't be taking this long. They haven't received any updates since their February meeting.

Solar Panels

The township continually gets asked questions from residents concerning the solar gardens located there. Stimmler told the board he attended a bus tour of solar fields held by NSP, where very knowledgeable representatives from NSP were there to answer questions.

He was informed there is nothing in the solar panels that will harm residents or the environment. NSP has also begun using sheep to graze the solar fields, which keeps weeds down and ensures no harsh chemicals are needed.

To stop misinformation, Stimmler is requesting NSP send out a press release stating all of this information to the public and include a phone number residents can call if they have questions.

For clarification, one mega-watt solar fields are privately owned; larger solar fields are owned by NSP.

Clearview

Residents have requested no parking signs on 90th Street because of

congestion caused by cars waiting to pick up students from Clearview Elementary after school. The township is sending the school a letter asking them to work on a plan to keep the road passable.

The township is asking notices be sent to the affected parents/guardians stating that temporary parking will be limited to only along the school side (south side) of 90th Street SE, with the opposite side (north side) being off limits. This is due to safety concerns for both through-traffic and emergency vehicle access.

Sirens Update

NSP is planning to shut down their warning sirens in 2026; the county will maintain them in 2026 and 2027. After that time the township will need to decide if they want to take over the cost of the upkeep of the six sirens. The cost hasn't been determined yet, but the levy would need to be raised to cover it.

Other Business

The state is mandating that more expenses be taken over by the counties which may affect property taxes in the future.

Clear Lake Twp. will be 170 years old next year; the board discussed having an open house to celebrate.

Rachel Iverson approached the board to request variances for septic on her 107th Ave. SE property. The board had no issues with the request.

A motion to adopt Co. Cannabis Retail Ordinance 2025-05-20 was passed.

The City of Clear Lake is having a

nitrate meeting at township hall where residents can bring in their water to have it checked for nitrates. A solar panel will be exhibited at the hall during this time.

The sheriff reported 108 calls for

service in April and discussed theft of irrigation equipment.

The next Clear Lake Twp. meeting will be on July 15 at 7 p.m.

Lindbloom sworn-in as new Becker Chief of Police

Though Officer Chris Lindbloom's official start date as Becker Police Chief was in June, last Tuesday's City Council meeting featured his official swearing-in and introduction to the community.

Lindbloom survived the hiring process that took months and featured numerous qualified candidates and interviews. Lindbloom was named chief by the council and took over for interim Chief, Mike Meehan on June 7. This after Long-time Chief Brent Baloun retired from the department at the end of 2024.

Lindbloom, 37, grew up in Sartell along with his parents and two sisters. He attended Sartell High School and upon graduation, attended St. Cloud State University (where Baloun was instructor) and attained his Bachelor's degree. He then attended Law Enforcement School in Alexandria.

"Yeah I took some skills training classes at SCSU when Brent was an instructor there," said Lindbloom. "Years later, when I applied for a job at Becker, I mentioned that to him and he said he kinda remembered me.'

Lindbloom, while living in St. Cloud began looking for a job in law enforcement that was "closer to home". He eventually found work in western Minnesota (Clara City in Chippewa County) and served there for two years as a Police Officer. In 2013, a part-time position at Becker opened up and he applied and was hired by the

His first days on the job he was an overnight patrol, then dayshift which led him to become a Lieutenant under Baloun. He finally moved his family (wife, Brittany and nine-year-old son, Colton and seven-year-

old daughter, Brooklyn) to the Becker area and started getting acquainted with the community by being involved as a softball and t-ball coach, a Watch Dog at the school along with many other activities and events.

Lindbloom says he's not about to "rock the boat" in Becker as the new chief saying, "I've inherited a ship that is sailing in the right direction and I'm not about to disrupt it. I'm not coming into a department that has a lot of needs."

Currently, Lindbloom has seven fulltime staffers and one fulltime administrator along with two part-timers and two reserves. He's presently looking to hire at least one fulltime officer along with a supervisor and investigator.

Lindbloom says he has taken over a department that is comprised of highly trained and dedicated staff who make it their mission to provide a quality service to the citizens of Becker.

"I will work to maintain strong relationships with our community members, businesses and visitors," he says. "Understanding our community and providing police services with professionalism, confidence, empathy and compassion will be a priority. We are always adapting and growing, keeping up with those changes whether it is a new policy, procedure, tool or training is vital to the success of a police department, especially in a community our size."

The other thing he and his department has had to face is the new department facilities at city hall. For a couple years, the building along Sherburne Ave. in Becker which house city hall and the BPD has been under construction for renovation and expansion. The police department itself is expanding exponentially with larger offices and workspaces, a larger and better built garage, new evidence rooms, locker rooms and showers and an exercise and weight room that mimics just about any area fitness center.

Lindbloom says he is excited to work with city council in his new role, though he is well acquainted with the board after representing the department with committee reports and budgets for Baloun. He plans on expanding on his leadership qualities and is thankful for the mentoring he's received from both Baloun and Meehan through the years.

One of Lindbloom's pride and joy is the donut drive-thru he initiated years ago where citizens are invited to pull up to the Becker Baptist Church's parking lot on their way to work to receive free donuts during Becker Kindness Week every November.

"It's a small gesture but I like to see the smiles on people's faces and the joy something simple like this brings to the community,' he said.

Lindbloom also plans to re-ignite the "Coffee with the Chief" event so people can ask questions about himself or the department. He

already has good relations with Big Lake's department and the sheriff's department in Sherburne County but he wants people to see the police in a friendly, willing-tohelp way rather than being formidable and daunting. "I strive to be avail-

The council added a clause that if the food shelf ever wished to sell the land in the future, the city would get the right

of first refusal.

they mistook the Becker Township ordinance with Becker City ordinance, and believed they were allowed to keep the animals on their property. They realized their mistake when a neighbor filed a complaint. Ricks said that the ducks were emotional support animals and she wanted to find any way she could to keep them, including erecting a privacy fence and moving the coop further back onto their property.

Committee Reports

Fire board held a special meeting to work on the budget, and was finally ready to present a budget with which they were satisfied.

Police committee discussed the staffing situation regarding the new chief -They decided not to replace

the lieutenant position Lindbloom was vacating to become chief.

League of MN Cities annual conference covered the cannabis update, and Council Member Mike Doering also attended a few utility classes. He said he was disappointed the governor didn't appear.

Mayor Mark Kolbinger proposed putting together a Mayor's Round Table to talk about issues between the city, school, and township. The first date of this meeting will by July 29 at City Hall.

For the City Hall project, the perimeter fence recently came down, and things are generally starting to be wrapped up.
