
Back for its 45th year, the Silver Bullet Saddle Club once again hosted the Clearwater Rodeo last weekend with three day of fu f or all ages.

Dubbed "100 Women Who Care of Becker, MN" is a fundraising and social event that is modeled after other similar groups, as Becker is the 17th Minnesota community to host su han event.

After an introduction by Director of Public Works Andrew Witter about the long process to get the project finally started, the ba rd awarded the contract for the Hwy. 169 & Co. Rd. 4 Interchange Project to Ames Construction at

"It's with excitement that I'm in front of you this morning with the resli ts of the bidding for the Zimmerman Interchange," he said. "It's come with a lot of effort over the last number of w ars - a lot of angst recently in regards to plu ling

The cost for the project is being covered by federal funding sources (\$34,826,467.94), state funding sources (\$8,706,616.91) and Local

Fon different firms bid on the project, and all four were well below the engineer's estimate of \$55,629,365.79. The three other bidders were C.S. McCrossan Construction Inc. Blue-Footed Booby

The common names for many species of birds can sometimes be confusing, contradictory, misleading, or a complete mystery. For example, the common name Red-winged Blackbird has always gotten under my skin, because the wing of this bird isn't red, it is actually black. It is the shoulder that is red, not the wing, so we should rename this bird as the Red-shoulder, Black-winged Blackbird.

The Common Loon is another bird with a confusing name. What does the word, "loon" mean? Turns out the name is thought to be derived from the Scandinavian word "lom" which refers to someone being clumsy or lame. This describes how this bird clumsily moves on land because its legs and feet are located so far back on its body. No doubt

you have heard of a group of birds called swallows. Where does the word "Swallow" come from? No one knows for sure, but perhaps it comes from the Old English word "swealwe" which means to ingest food and could refer to these birds eating while flying. Or it could be related to the Old English word "swell" referring to an erratic flight, which perfectly describes this bird's flight pattern. I guess its origin of the common name is

lost to history. All of this was running through my head on my recent photo tour of the Galapagos Islands in Ecuador. One of the most common birds found on this island archipelago is the Blue-footed Booby. Not only is there a Blue-footed Booby but there is also a Red-footed Booby and a Nezca Booby. Three species of booby live in the Galapagos Islands. So where did the name booby come from? The name comes from the Spanish word "bobo" which translate to foolish or

The reference to clownlike comes from these birds clumsily walking on land. When they walk, they lift their large blue feet high and slowly and deliberately place their foot, one in front of the other. It looks like the large shoes of a clown walking. These birds also have absolutely no fear of humans and walk around with their over-size clown-like blue feet without hesitation. It seems like these birds have a foolish nature, hence their common

Turns out there are six recognized species of boobies. They all belong to the genus Sula and three of them are very common in the Galapagos Islands. So, the name

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

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Clear Lake Mayor receives censure from city council

Mayor Tim Goenner was officially censured by the Clear Lake City Council during their August 4 meeting for inappropriate behavior, including taking the unauthorized role of a supervisor over the public works director (the council ov rsees the department together and no individual is allowed to take on this role), creating a hostile work environment according to employee statements, ignoring a directive from the council to have no direct communications with city employees, and using city equipment (specifically the city skid steer) without conc il approx 1.

One resident did speak to the mayor's character, saying Goenner does a lot for the city. Acting Mayor Chad Nelson responded that the comment was valid. but it does not excuse the bad behavior, and this has been building for a long

Mayor Goenner's only statement was that he had a lot to say and wou d say so at the appropriate time. **Lift Station**

To complete muchneeded work on the city's main lift station, the city needed to ask for easements from local landowners, in order to access the site. This is the main lift station for the city and in desperate need of work. One of the landowners included Mayor Tim Goenner. The city originally offered Goenner \$2,850 for a perma- yn shame and emb rrassnent easement to access the lift station, which was in line with inda try standard. This offer was rejected. Mayor Goenner countered with a lump sum of \$10,000 for a temporary easement good for **6** y ars.

The city's other options, including eminent domain or reconstructing the city infrastructure, woll d each cost more than **9**,00 0.

It was noted that Goenner originally sgge sted he could grant the easement for \$5,000 if the council chose not to pursue his censn e. Goenner asked for this option to **b** withdrawn from consideration before the meeting began but not before it was written into the meeting agenda packet provided to council mem-

The council made sure to thoroughly review the issue for the benefit of the public. Several council members let their displeasure be known, but lı timately since each other option would cost twice as much, they decided to accept the offer so the project could still move forward this e ar.

Later in the meeting, during the censure proceeding (which followed directly after the easement discussions), Council Member Lance Gilliland stated, "With the addition of the easement offer, I think that [the mayor's behavior] nearly rises to criminality. It is corrupt... And charging the public, the taxpayers, \$5,000 to avoid

ment is despicab e".

Acting Mayor Nelson asked that the censure be limited to the issues laid out, and that the retracted offer be dealt with appropriately n its own time.

Fire Department

The council looked over the new budget for the fire department. The CLFD requested a minor change in the verbiage of the contracts sent out the townships for next year as well, making the pension line item more clear.

The chief asked about running an open house. Council Member Stefany Janish said, as per the city attorney the city isn't sp posed to spend taxpayer money on giveaways at the event (such as prizes for the kids). Chief Ron Koren pa hed b ck on this, as many other departments do so. The council agreed to ask for a second opinion from another lawer.

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BIG LAKE MN DIES IN CRASH

A Big Lake man died in a two-vehicle traffic crash last Sunday morning in Mille Lacs County.

The Minnesota State Patrol reports that a little before 12 noon, a Chevy Trailblazer SUV, driven by 69-year-old Donald Goerisch, and a Honda pickup, driven by 79-year-old Richard Lang of Excelsior, collided head-on while traveling on Hwy. 169 in South Harbor Township.

The Mille Lacs County Sheriff's Office, Onamia Fire Department, Onamia Ambulance, and North Air and Lifelink Air assisted the State Patrol








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Becker girls end summer with a win
