From rolling the crusts to mixing fillings, young and seasoned bakers work





2 road projects in **Becker move** forward

During their recent meeting, the Becker City Council started the ball rolling on two road projects that will both be eligible for government funding assistance.

The council signed a supplemental letter of agreement to start work on planning for improvements to Edgewood St. and the trail alongside it. This will be a project for 2026, but city staff wanted to begin the planning process early, especially since the project will be eligible to use state funding. The council had a brief discussion on the details before approving.


Becker received a congressional appropriation (federal assistance) to create a grade-separated (on-ramp/ off-ramp) interchange at the Hwy. 10 and Hwy. 25 intersection on the west side of the city. The city requested proposals for the design work to keep the project moving

forward. Land Trade In March, the city was looking to sell off some land in the industrial park, and had a few interested parties, including TJ Potter Trucking. However, the economic development authority (EDA) discovered that the sale of the land could put the city in financial risk, so it was determined the land would not be sold. Todd Potter of TJ Potter was still interested in the land, which is serviced by city water, and offered to trade the city instead of doing the risky outright purchase. He offered to trade land back to the city which was not serviced by city water. City staff determined the trade would be fair if they took 18.5 acres of land from Potter in exchange for the 16.5 acres he was interested in owning. The process to plat the property and allow the city to make the proper vacations will additionally cost Potter \$9,950. Council decided to move



Big Lake Township hears update on joint project with city

During the recent Big Lake Town Board meeting, Big Lake City Engineer Layne Otteson gave an update on the joint project between the city and township for pedestrian safety near the schools. Since the project is receiving federal funding, plans have been submitted and are waiting for the appropriate signatures at the federal level. Otteson said he is working to keep the process moving

The next step, after federal approval, is to go out for bids, which Otteson expected to happen in September. Construction will likely begin in the spring.

Otteson said he was a little concerned about the signs on Co. Rd. 43 warning traffic if a fire truck is approaching. The way these signs work is by a fob inside of the truck which the driver can press to warn approaching traffic. However, these signs don't exist anywhere else in Minnesota, so it may not be approved to be used as part of the federally-backed project, though he said he would try everything he could to keep them.

The purpose of the hearing was to consider mid-year changes to the Community Corrections Fee Schedule to address certain financial, legislative and operational

Community Corrections Director Corey Mabis-Rowe said the Dept. of Corrections' subsidy has been lower than anticipated over the past two

"So we're looking at correcting some of the fees in Community Corrections." The revisions include a

new \$50 drug-testing fee, and a \$50 increase in program fees in the Adult Driving With Care Level I, (to \$150), Level II (to \$250) and Decision Points Group (to \$200). The vote to approve was

unanimous. **Charging Stations,** Vehicles After a 15-minute dis-

cussion, the board passed two resolutions and approved two agreements with MnDOT

for electric vehicle charging stations and the purchase of electric vehicles. Sherburne County was successful in securing \$42,222.32 in grant dollars from the Carbon Reduction Program (CRP) Funding to

Sherburne County continues to grow both from a population and a tax base perspective. The population increased 0.835% from the previous year of 102,206 to 103,059, making Sherburne County the 12th largest County in Minnesota. Countywide residential values have increased approximately 5% for taxes payable in 2024, bringing the average residential value to \$368,300. New home permits are level compared to the same period in 2023. The County continues to see a number of solar farms (known as Community Solar Gardens under Minnesota Statues) that have developed primarily during the 2017-2021 timeframe. Additionally, commercial and industrial new construction, as well as permits for renovations and/or expansions of existing properties and facilities, has decreased compared to prior years. County staff continues to look for innovative solutions to control expenses and increase revenues while maintaining services to

A number of indicators contribute to continued growth and financial stability of the County. The following are some of what we feel to be key indicators.

Due to its relatively dense population outside of - and yet in close proximity to - the Twin Cities metropolitan area, Sherburne County is attractive to businesses that seek affordable land and labor costs to locate or expand their operations. Businesses are continuing to choose Sherburne County because of the growing population, available and educated workforce, and access to major highways and the railroad.

Commuter rail service continues to provide ridership via the Metro Transit Northstar Corridor rail line and its related bus connector, the "Northstar Link", which began operation in November of 2009, linking St. Cloud to Big Lake (via the Northstar Link) to downtown Minneapolis, with additional stops in Elk River, Anoka, Ramsey, Coon Rapids, Fridley and Target Field (Minneapolis). Ridership was greatly impacted by business shutdowns and restrictions caused by the COVID 19 pandemic leading to the State of Minnesota to contemplate shutdown of Northstar as early as January 2026. A final determination on the future of Northstar and/or any successor transit service is still to be determined.

LONG-TERM FINANCIAL PLANNING


The County Board annually sets goals to establish key priorities, based upon an adopted 3-5 year Strategic Plan. The budget process provides direction for Department Heads to document savings to be achieved during the year to address any anticipated revenue shortages from the State. The County Board encourages Department Heads to explore work process efficiencies and review current service offerings, and/or find alternate methods of cost reduction or revenue enhancement. The County holds regular "LEAN" events to look for departmental and countywide efficiency improvements and cost savings. The County also annually updates the Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan, prepared by the Administration department, with inputs from all County departments. The County has utilized the OpenGov budget platform software to increase budgeting efficiency and enhance transparency with the public. The software is available to County residents 24 hours a day on the County's website.


MAJOR INITIATIVES

Public Works Department and Regional Rail Fund - The County Board approve allocating some of the adopted local option sales tax to Metro Transit's Northstar Line costs, thus reducing the Regional Rail Authority levy to \$0 again for 2024 – the net effect of both county levies, therefore is a 3.99% increase. Put another way, the average residential homesteaded property in Sherburne County will see a \$2.50 increase/month. For 2025 valuation for payable 2025 property tax, the average valued residential home increased by 0.5% and commercial & industrial values increased 4% in Sherburne County. However, the County experienced an overall tax base loss of 0.5% due to the Sherco Coal plant Unit #2 decommissioning that occurred in 2023. In addition, the recent Homestead Market Valuation Exclusion law change led to an additional \$200M loss in residential taxable value.

Providing quality services in a fiscally responsible manner continues to be the mission and one of the five pillars of the Strategic Plan of Sherburne County. Streamlining business processes through technology improvements is a consistent theme for County Elected leaders and staff. The County Board is now utilizing Microsoft Teams for residents to be able to listen and/or become participants, when appropriate, in the County Board, County EDA and Planning Commission meetings. This meeting platform is also utilized by our employees as they work or conduct significant business remotely, thus increasing efficiencies and reducing travel time and costs. Meetings can now be viewed in real time through a live YouTube stream. This is a trend that will likely continue. In addition, the County recently automated the Homestead process in the Assessor's office and the foster home service agreement and payment voucher process in HHS. We have also created an appointment system for Driver's License and Recorder's departments greatly reducing the wait times for residents. An enhanced online service portal has been developed for the County's permitting and planning and zoning functions and a similar program for Solid Waste-related functions is in the process of being developed. Sherburne County will continue to look for ways of conducting business more effectively for County residents.


