Clearview students learn about electricity

Employees from Stearns Electric Association recently visited fourth graders from Clearwater Ele-

mentary School to provide interactive presentations on energy efficiency and electrical safety.

Throughout the onehour sessions, students learned about the different types of electricity, conductors and insulators, and sources of energy. Students also participated in an allclass knowledge check and provided ideas on how they can conserve more energy at home.

Stearns Electric's live, energized home and farm model was the highlight of the presentation. Used as a tool to show students what can happen when they get too close to electrical equipment, students were fascinated with the electrical sparks and arc flashes demonstrated on the model.

The most important piece of knowledge students walked away with was information on how to react in a vehicle accident involving any electrical equipment. As the fourth

grade students can tell you, you should always stay in your vehi-

cle if it hits a power pole, unless your vehicle is on fire. If your vehicle is on fire near a power pole, you should jump out of your vehicle, keeping your feet together, and shuffle as far away from the accident as you can.

Following the live demonstration, one lucky student from each presentation was selected to dress up as a lineworker. Donning a hard hat, rubber gloves, pole climbers, safety glasses and a utility belt, these students got to experience the real-life equipment line workers use on a daily basis.

The proposal submitted by Officer Jenna Voigt stated, "It is becoming more common for Becker residences and businesses to have cameras. Cam-PARTME era footage is often an incredibly beneficial tool in solving and preventing crimes. Whether it is a doorbell camera, a camera on a back porch, or other external camera surveillance systems, security camera footage can assist the Becker Police Dept. with investigations."

Voigt goes on to say, "This initiative will afford local citizens and businesses the opportunity to assist the Becker PD with investigations. This program will be based on voluntary participation from citizens and businesses, which can be terminated at any time. Citizens will have the ability to complete an online registration form listed on the BPD's website. The information provided through this form will assist officers in solving and preventing crimes in areas in which external

cameras may be located." The Becker Police Dept. will not have direct access to camera footage or systems. How-

ever, in the event that there is potential camera footage that can be helpful to the Becker Police Dept. an officer will contact the registered individual or business.

"The information that is voluntarily provided will be used for official purposes only," Says

Police Chief Brent Baloun added, "we are excited to start this program and work closer with the community to solve crime. This will offer a huge benefit to our investigations."



Santiago has always been my family's town. It was our go-to place while growing up.

Mabel and Oswald Lee were owners of The General Store. As was common in the early years, they had living quarters above the store. Other businesses in-

cluded Santiago (Sherburne) State Bank, Santiago Locker, the hardware store, Centra Sota Co-op, Santiago Creamery, which later became The Hanging Kettle restaurant owned by Hilda McLamb (famous for broasted chicken). There was also the Coun-

try Store (gas station) owned by Virgil Gilyard. My older sister Ruth, and my twin sister Terri and I worked at the Country Store as cashiers in the 1980's and early 1990's. In the 1970's and 1980's, a barber had a chair in the back room at the Country Store and came once a week to cut hair. Prior to being Country

Store, there was a powerful Ford dealer for many years in the same location that was owned by Virgil Gilyard's uncle (Abner Gilyard).

There was also a bar on the strip called the Gin Mill in the 1970's where Bailey Ray's Roadhouse now sits.

Food brings people together. Going back to the 1970's, there was an amazing mom and pop style diner - Tom Sexton's Cafe - kitty corner from The Country Store. Sadly, Tom Sexton's burned down the fall of 1976 and was not rebuilt. Some of my older sis-

ters (Judy, Gloria and Karen) and my brother Roger's wife, Sandy (Bakken), were waitresses at Tom Sexton's and often didn't get home from their shifts until 5 am. Tom had the best hash browns around. He peeled more than a five gallon pail of potatoes every Saturday. My oldest sisters played

softball at the ball diamond on the edge of town in the 1960's and there were so many teams they had to practice at the Blue Hill ball field a few miles away.

Glaring Differences

The 2023 legislative session is underway with a state surplus of around \$18 billion and an escalated rate of violent crime in Minnesota as the backdrop. With that in mind, our

top priorities for the new session should be providing tax relief to help families struggling with inflation, improving public safety, fighting waste and fraud in our public programs, and helping students catch up from learning loss they suffered the last couple of years. Democrats in the House

majority said they supported these items last fall. They touted eliminating the state tax on social security and advocated for investments in public safety. Now, it's time to walk

the walk. The House already

showed some bipartisan spirit in the first days of this session by uniting to approve without a single "no" vote a common-sense tax conformity bill that will make things easier during filing season. That was a good start, but we need to move on to real, meaningful tax relief so Minnesotans can keep more of their money month after month and year after year instead of the one-time checks governor has proposed.

We could start by once and for all getting rid of the tax on social security benefits, a place where there has been bipartisan agreement. This should be done as soon as possible this session. A standalone bill could pass right now with strong bipartisan support instead of waiting until the end of session when all bets are off and things can fall to the cutting-room floor. Also, last session an

agreement was reached to reduce income taxes for lower- and middle-income

Minnesotans. Reducing income taxes will put money back in the pockets of fami-While I support return-

ing the state's over-collected tax dollars to Minnesota taxpayers, there are areas where increased spending will be discussed this session. For example, this historic surplus is an opportunity to make investments in public safety to help communities hire more law enforcement officers and keep their community safe. Since Democrats control

the House, the Senate and the governor's office they do not appear compelled to reduce government spending. Unfortunately, the first

bills House Democrats introduced this session reflect entirely different priorities, from extreme abortion legislation to legalizing marijuana and adopting energy policies that would make power less reliable and more costly.

Time will tell what transpires between now and when the session is set to adjourn in late May. 11) passed a tax conformity bill, bringing Minnesota in line with recent federal tax changes and cutting tax collections by more than \$100 million. The bill was passed with bipartisan support and is headed to the governor's desk for his signature. The Senate's passage

of the tax conformity bill is a bipartisan victory that will help many Minnesotans who urgently need financial relief. However, I am severely disappointed to see our seniors left out of this legislation. When Senate Republicans brought forward an amendment to fully eliminate the tax on Social Security, Democrats refused to move it. As session advances, I will continue to fight for our state's enormous \$17.6 billion surplus to be given back to taxpayers.

The bill aligns the Minnesota tax code with Federal tax changes that resulted in many tax changes, including: The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act from 2020, The American Rescue Plan (ARPA) Act

Notable provisions in the bill: • Expand eligible expenses to college savings accounts through Section 529 plans; • Exclude shuttered venue operator grants from being counted as income; • Allows for student loan payments by employers; • Increases the amount a business can provide for employee child care bene-

Missing from the bill is the elimination of the tax on Social Security, or any reduction in personal tax rates. Senate Republicans tried to amend these changes to the bill, but Democrats opposed the move through parliamentary procedure.



to St. Cloud Hospital with non-life threatening injuries. All


occupants of the Hyundai were reported to be wearing seatbelts. Janson was also injured

Highway Dept. offers snow plowing tips

(Editor's Note: The following article was submitted by Wright County.)

The Wright County Highway Department would like to remind Wright County citizens of the hazards and liabilities of pushing snow from driveways onto any public highway. The snow, which may be left on the roadway or piles of snow left on the side of the road, can create real hazards not only for motorists but also for snow removal crews and equipment. In the past, snowplows have been damaged when hitting compacted and frozen snow deposited on or next to the

County Highways. Minnesota Statutes (160.27, Subdivision 5) prohibits plowing, shoveling, blowing or in any way depositing snow on any public highway. The violation is punishable as a misdemeanor. In addition, the property owner and/or person dumping the snow could be liable should a

civil lawsuit result. **Snowplow Safety Tips** Make sure to educate children on the dangers of snow removal and make sure

they play safely! Please remind them to:

 Never build tunnels or snow forts in the snowbanks near the street. The force and weight of the snow coming off the plows can collapse the tunnels or forts and harm/or bury the child.

 Keep sleds and toys out of the street and away from the edge of the road. Snowbanks can make it hard for plow drivers to see children

playing in these areas. Five Tips for Sharing the Road with Snowplow Driv-

 Start to slow down as soon as you see the snowplow and stay at least five car lengths (70 feet) back.

Don't stop too close.

 Give the snowplow room to work.

• Take extreme caution when passing.

• Permit the plow extra

room in high-risk areas. If you have any ques-





Pursuant to Minnesota Statutes § 463.15, et seq., the City Council of the City of Big Lake having duly considered the matter, finds the above-described property to be hazardous for the reasons set forth herein. Big Lake City staff have observed

the conditions present at 421 Eagle Lake Rd. N., Big Lake, Minnesota 55309 [hereinafter: Subject Property]. Their observations revealed that the Subject Property constitutes a hazardous property within the meaning of Minnesota Chapter 463. Specifically, the

Subject Property has been inadequately maintained and contains excessive storage that constitutes a fire and safety hazard to public safety or health within the meaning of Minn. Stat. § 463.15, subd. 3. Specifically, the City Council finds that the following hazardous conditions exist at the Subject Property:

1 The Subject Property has exces-

sive storage and rubbish throughout the home and yard. This constitutes a violation of Minnesota State Fire Code § 304.2. There are other residences bordering the property. The rubbish is easily combustible, thus creating a hazard to the public health, safety, and welfare of any occupants of the Subject Property and the neighboring properties.

2. The Subject Property fails to maintain a means of egress that is free from obstructions in violation of Minnesota State Fire Code § 1030.3. Combustible storage inside the house and throughout the yard of the Subject Property obstructs the means of egress from the Subject Property in the event of an emergency. There are only small corridors through the rubbish. There is accumulated rubbish on the back deck preventing egress or even access to the back door. These are hazardous condi-

3. The Subject Property constitutes a health and safety hazard to any occupant as well as neighboring properties. The Subject Property contains rubbish and debris that have not been properly disposed of The Subject Property contains improperly stored and likely rotten food in violation of City Code § 500.02(A). The inadequate maintenance of the Subject Property has created damage to the structure and roof of the building, allowing

for the infiltration of water into the building leading to damp and unsanitary conditions in violation of City Code § 505.05, subd. 3. There is visible water damage inside the Subject Property and visible water damage to the exterior of the Subject Property. Damage to the property from inadequate maintenance further includes exposed insulation and crumbling drywall, creating a health hazard for any occupant. The accumulated rubbish and general unsanitary conditions has created a shelter for, and likely infestation of, vermin. These are substantial public safety concerns and indicate that the Subject Property is a hazardous building within the meaning of Minn. Stat. § 463.15, subd. 3.

4. The Subject Property constitutes a threat to the health and safety of the public due to the risk of fire. The rubbish it contains is easily combustible and further blocks access to the building. If the Subject Property were to catch on fire, the Big Lake Fire Department would not be able to nor attempt to make an entry into the home on the Subject Property. The excessive combustible storage on the Subject Property and the blocked means of egress render the Subject Property unsafe for firefighting crews. The Big Lake Fire Department would be forced to allow the Subiect Property to burn and instead focus their efforts on properties the surrounding properties only. This is a substantial public safety concern and indicates that the Subject Property is hazardous within the meaning of Minn. Stat. § 463.15,

5. The Subject Property contains a detached garage that is a threat to the health and safety of the public. The detached garage also contains rubbish preventing adequate access. The detached garage is also

in a state of inadequate repair. The roof is damaged, and the doors are dilapidated in violation of City Code § 505.05, subd. 3, Accumulated rubbish blocks entrance into or exit from the detached garage. Upon information and belief, the detached garage also contains accumulated rubbish that has not been properly disposed of. The state of disrepair and accumulated rubbish renders the structure unsafe for firefighting crews and has created access and shelter for. and a likely infestation of, vermin. This is in violation of City Code § 500.04(P). These are substantial public safety concerns and indicate that the Subject Property is a hazardous building within the meaning of Minn. Stat. § 463.15, subd. 3.

Pursuant to the foregoing, in accordance with Minn. Stat. § 463.17, unless the hazardous conditions listed above are removed within thirty (30) days of the date of this Order, the City shall cause the hazardous conditions on the Subject Property to be removed. The removal of the above-referenced hazardous conditions may include. if reasonably necessary, the demolition of the Subject Property, the detached garage, or both, the removal of the foundation, and backfilling to prevent any dangerous exposed excavation in violation of City Code § 500.04(q).

If you fail to remedy the hazardous conditions, the City will seek permission from the District Court for the City to do so. The City will move the District Court for summary enforcement of this Order pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 463.19 unless you remedy the situation within said thirty (30) day period or unless an answer is filed within twenty (20) days of service of this Order upon you pursuant to Minn.

Stat. § 463.18. Upon enforcement

of the Order by the City, all costs expended by the City will be assessed against the real property and collected as other taxes as provided in Minn. Stat. § 463.21.

If you fail to remedy the hazardous conditions, you must remove all personal property or fixtures within thirty (30) days of service of this Order upon you pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 463.24. If the personal property or fixtures are not removed within that by time, then the City may sell the personal property or fixtures at public auction as provided in Minn. Stat. § 463.21 or the City may destroy the same.

Moreover, you are advised that if the City of Big Lake is compelled to take any action to abate these hazardous conditions, all necessary costs expended by the City will be assessed against the real estate and collected as other taxes as provided in Minn. Stat. § 463.21. Dated: January 18, 2023






