## LGBTQ students mount protest By Bill Morgan, Staff Writer The school board consented to the original request and on Mon-

The Becker School Board held a special meeting Monday evening to listen to a presentation from two former Becker School Board Members and a representative from the Child Protection League (CPL) in regards to concerns over the treatment of LGBTQ students at Becker Schools.

The meeting was held in the PAC in expectation of a large audience.

Students and teachers associated with the LGBTQ movement at Becker Schools (GSA - Gender and Sexuality Alliance) held two protests — one at 2 p.m. and one right before the 6 p.m. meeting — in which they carried signs and chanted, "No two sides to our pride."

They also marched the parking lot and lined up along Sherburne Ave. to rally support for their cause.

Last year at about this time, students from across the State of Minnesota held a walk-out to show solidarity with Black communities following the death of Daunte Wright in Brooklyn Center. That protest was organized by Minnesota Teen Activists, a statewide organization. Last August, the LGBTQ advocacy organization, Out-

Front Minnesota, made a presentation to the Becker School Board to address students' concerns. Following that meeting, two community members attended a March board meeting and spoke during public comment, expressing an interest in the school board having a presentation in response to Out-Front's presentation.

At least two community members responded to the school board a few months ago expressing concern for a presentation with a viewpoint different from OutFront Minneday, they made arrangements to hear from "the other side" of the cause from CPL - an organization the LGBTQ community deems an anti-LGBTQ GSA advi-

sor and Becker Teacher, Dr. Heather Abrahamson said she "doesn't understand how one could think there's another side to human rights, but they claim there is."

Betsy Armstrong, an attorney and former Becker School Board Member was the first speaker. Before she took the podium, the LGBTQ students turned away from the stage

Expected closing date is April 26.

Cherokee Liquors Inc., dba G-Will Liquors, will be operating as the new liquor store to replace Jubilee Liquors.

## Orrock residents gather at annual meeting

The Orrock Twp. annual meeting was held last week with an awesome turnout of residents. Board chair Bryan Adams was elected to be the meeting moderator. Auditing

Treasurer Gary Goldsmith went over the changes recently made in the way the township handles accounting. A few years ago, Orrock reached a population threshold that required the township to hire a professional auditor yearly to go over the books. Before this, board members would hold an annual board of audit which was considered sufficient (the board still holds a board of audit, but needs to hire an auditor in addition to this.)

The auditor has found no major concerns with the township's finances. There is, of course, the lack of segregation of duties, which is a common finding for a township, as the town would have to hire several more staff members to fix this issue. It is not a major concern in the eyes of the auditors. There was also a lack of Broker Acknowledgement Certification, which the township has since obtained. Finally, the only other issue was a deposit in excess of FDIC limits which was due to a banking error and was fixed quickly.

The Zimmerman-Livonia Fire Department got a new building last year.

The Big Lake Fire Dept. is scheduled to get a new roof this year. It is also looking for more firefighters to join the department.

Orrock is growing quickly enough that in a few years the cost of service with the two fire departments may rise quite a bit. For several years, the board members have kicked around the idea of having a fire sub station in Orrock, but this is not something that is in the works at the moment. If EMTs wished, the board would be open to allowing an ambulance to be parked at the town hall for faster response in Orrock, however they would

need to work out logistics of giving the EMTs access to the building for bathroom breaks.

Town Hall Expansion

The board has been looking into expanding town hall. The building is historic for the township, having first served as a school building

in the 1880's. The township purchased the building in th 1950's and it became the town hall. The building is no longer

sufficient to serve the needs of the entire community when it comes to election season. In 2020, the township was forced to use an alternative site for the elections. Using ARPA funding, the board has been planning to expand the building and bring it into ADA compliance.

Some of the Orrock citizens attending as the electorate were concerned about using ARPA funding for the building rather than another

area of the budget. They were concerned about the increase in the proposed tax levy. Another meeting of the electorate to continue discussing the town hall was scheduled for June 15 at 7 p.m.


#### Road Updates

Town engineer Kevin Krueger gave an update on upcoming road projects. The road and bridge budget increased this year to account for the township taking ownership of the roads in the Shores of Eagle Lake development. The township did make sure these roads were up to township standards before adopting them.

Some of the residents in attendance voiced concerns about their own deteriorating roads, and Krueger explained that the roads in question were so far gone that they would need to be completely torn up and replaced. Therefore, it is more cost effective to allow them to deteriorate for a few more years as the township saves up money for the expensive process.

## **Proposed Levy**

Several members of the electorate raised concerns over the increase for the 2023 levy, which was set at 1,080,000 (a 7.1% increase over 2022.) The treasurer explained the reasons for the increase and, while the electorate was still concerned with the price increase, they understood the reasoning and decided to approve the proposed levy.

with their backs to the school board members and the speakers.

She was allowed to speak for a little under an hour following some downtime associated with audio problems as well as disruptions from the protesters. Many of the GSA students failed to abide by the "do not interrupt the speakers" request as well as "no handheld or posting of signs allowed in the room."

Joining the students from the LGBTQ community were Abrahamson, Joe Rand, Pastor Yolanda Denson-Byers of Faith Lutheran Church and English Teacher Arnold Changamire and Teacher Lisa Sackett, to name a few. Some of the signs carried into the auditorium featured slogans such as, "Men of quality don't fear equality", 'We can't be erased" and "I'd choose hell over homophobic heaven.'

Armstrong spoke of gender dysphoria, suicide, the transgender movement and the increase in gender clinics across America. She said she and her other presenters conducted diligent research into the evening's topic and the purpose was to bring balance to the information to meet the needs of the entire student body.

Armstrong also referenced a Bible quote that says God created two sexes — male and female — and said people who follow religious teachings are Constitutionally protected and their opinions ought to be given equal consideration. Murmurs and giggles came from the LGBTQ body when the slide appeared on screen and one student yelled out, "God is gay" to the cheers of others.

The next speaker was Attorney Chris Klippen, who also is a former Becker School Board member and a resident in the area.

Klippen spoke of the

legal aspects the board will face as the challenges of protecting classes grows. He spoke of the rights of the First Amendment and reminded the board that "human rights are not reserved just for special classes.'

He said the First Amendment issues include prohibiting compelled speech (use of pronouns) and prohibiting viewpoint discrimination, which include acceptance and affirmation.

He talked about the protected class and "who's in? and who's out?" Some questions he presented to the board included, "when is a student 'transitioned enough?", "self-identified" or "objective criteria" and finally, "who decides?"

The final presenter was Julie Quist, board chairman of the CPL. She began her presentation by identifying certain books that are being incorporated into schools though she pointed out, "it doesn't mean all or any of these books are part of the Becker curriculum."

The books she iden-




beliefs and norms of the community by accepting different gender identities. Quist confirmed sev-

## Santiago tables decision on broadband

It was a deep dive into the issue of rural broadband last Wednesday when County Commissioner Tim Dolan, Asst. Sherb. Co. Administrator Dan Weber and Midco Governmental Relations Manager Melissa Wolf visited the Santiago Town

Sherburne County designated broadband access a top priority as soon as the Federal government passed ARPA and doled out large sums of money across the nation. As part of their efforts, the county is inviting townships to invest in a cost-sharing grant program to bring broadband to areas which receive no current fiber optic service or are considered under-serviced because of slow speeds.

The Santiago Town Board has discussed the proposal for several months and was seeking additional information; thus, the attendance of the three guests at the meeting, each of whom addressed questions from the

Wolf explained the different projects Midco is

undertaking in Sherburne County, as well as the investments her company is making into infrastructure.Part of the project that will go in with or without the township's support are fiber cables as part of the RDOF (Rural Digital Opportunity Fund), which will help bring connectivity to parts of the township, including the Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge. The supervisors grilled Wolf about this part of the project, as Chair Stu Nelson mused that he was sure the Sandhill Cranes will appreciate the service, while other parts of the township won't have fiber connections.

Wolf pointed to the requirements of the Federal government and the project scope for RDOF, which outlined the areas of service through that program. Midco has to follow those guidelines and Wolf explained that the RDOF program was a separate project from the proposal that was being made in working with the township.

For the cost sharing agreement, Wolf was suggesting the township could utilize some its ARPA funds, in the amount of \$75,000, which would bring high speed internet to 72 residences. In total, this first ARPA-funded proposal would bring \$443,000 worth of fiber optic infrastructure to the township, with Midco paying for 44% of the cost. She stated that there was a high likelihood that Midco would subsequently use that infrastructure to bring additional service to another 121 homes, with her company picking up 100% of the costs for the second phase.

Supervisor Jeff Pappenfus next voiced frustration that the project wouldn't cover the entire township.

Wolf explained that the ARPA guidelines delineate which areas can receive the service now, and again reiterated that this first project would help the company expand in the future because much of the expensive fiber connection would then be in place.

Commissioner Dolan noted that the costs to cover every residence in the county would be "north of \$200 million" and that the current cost-sharing proposals would position the county and townships for future connections. He noted that the county was bound by the guidelines of the Federal government and additionally, it would not be cost effective for any private company to run fiber lines to the most rural areas of the county.

The partnership allows us to lower the long-term costs of providing broadband to more areas," Dolan noted. "The county's long term goal is to get everyone served. Any ARPA funds that aren't spent go back to the state and I can guarantee the state isn't going to come put fiber cables into Santiago Township."

He further asserted that without the project, it will be more expensive and take longer for residents to get the

Weber explained that there is a finite amount of money in the county's designated fund and the township

would need to participate monetarily in some fashion to keep the grant available to be scored in the rubric system that had been established. Once the county money runs out, no more cost charing agreements would be approved, putting any future projects in peril. Weber also explained that the township could choose to participate at a lower cost, but it would affect the overall scoring of the

project. From there, the board thanked those in attendance for the information and adopted a motion to table the request.

## Palmer Twp. sets open house for possible "Wipper Pit" acquisition

A date for a public Open House to discuss the possible acquisition of a property known as the "Wipper Pit" was set at Monday's Palmer Township Board meeting. Supervisor Steve Demeules reported to the citizens in attendance that the environmental review for the acreage is being conducted, and he proposed a date of March 30 at 7 pm at the Town Hall to present the plans to the public and gather input into the possible purchase and development of the parcel.

There was general agreement on the date and time of the open house and a motion to set the meeting passed. The township decided to use its social media accounts to advertise the meeting and will also send notice to the *Patriot*. For several months, De-

meules and the board have been discussing and studying the acquisition of the property for the establishment of a yard waste compost site. Sherburne County has signaled its support for the project, which would also be used for disposal of the weeds that are annually harvested from area lakes. Chairman Mike Ganz has abstained from the discussions and negotiations because of a possible conflict of interest.

Demeules said that the open house agenda would include a discussion of the finances of the project, as well as possible uses of the property. It would also be an opportunity to gather input from the residents of the township, but no formal action or voting will take place at the meeting.

## Sheriff/Fire

Commander Bob Stangler was at the meeting to discuss the 83 calls for service in the preceding month, which is up slightly from 74 a year ago and 59 the year before.

The calls included 24

traffic stops, with six citations issued, as well as two snowmobile complaints. Several residents spoke of the speed issues around the lakes and how the establish-

code. Residents also discussed how some pedestrians do not follow the rules and fail to wear reflective clothing. As speed has been an issue for quite some time and probably will continue in the future, the board decided to do some preliminary research into the establishment of speed bumps at certain locations to discourage excessive vehicle speed.

Fire Chief Ron Koren reported on his department's 16 calls for service last month, which included two fires in Palmer Township, one a car and one a snowmobile.

Ganz asked Koren about response time averages for the township and the chief responded that it largely depends on which firefighters are available to respond, while other factors such as the time of the day of the call have a big impact.

Roads Ganz again discussed the issue of residents plowing snow across roadways and reported that the township has no authority to grant exemptions to the statute prohibiting the practice because it is a state law.

The board also decided to do some street sweeping this spring, since the icy conditions this winter did cause

the township to apply sand in an effort to help traction on the roadways.

Potholes were discussed and the supervisors noted that they are in better shape than ever to tackle the issue since they have their own tar trailer and kettle. As the temperatures continue in the freeze-thaw cycle, more potholes are expected and will be addressed as soon as possible.

metal detecting.

I'd always wanted to try metal detecting when I was younger and living in New Jersey. I remember getting a really cheap detector for Christmas one year. It worked. But because I lived in a city with lots of pavement, there really weren't many places to search where I could dig up anything good. And since the detectors back then didn't discriminate between different types of metal, every signal sounded the same. So my "treasure" was usually a nail, a bottle cap or a soda can.

Today's technology makes detecting a much more rewarding experience. The detectors have lots of features - different tones for different types of metal; settings for depth, volume and sensitivity. Many have digital numerical readouts that can narrow down what might be giving off a signal.

And there it was, a 1920 Mercury silver dime! But that wasn't all. We swung the detector over the hole again and got another signal. A few seconds later up came a 1929 Buffalo nickel. And then two more coins - a 1910 cent and 1919 cent.

That was all we needed to decide to get our own detector. Rita ordered one online, and after a few weeks we bought another one so we could detect together. We've been detecting ever since and have found plenty of coins, some rings and lots of cool

So when we finally decided to plan a vacation this spring, we wanted to go somewhere where the ground wasn't frozen and covered with snow.

Since we already liked Arizona, we did some research about places to detect down there. We checked online and watched some videos and discovered there's a long history of lost treasure in Arizona. Or at least that's what people are claiming.

We saw a documentary about different people searching for the Lost Dutchman's Mine, a place in the Superstition Mountains that is supposed to be filled with gold.

There are also countless videos of people detecting gold nuggets in the desert. And Rita read about the trail in Arizona and New Mexico 16th-century Spanish explorer Francisco Vázquez de Coronado followed in his search for treasure in the Seven Golden Cities of Cíbola. ## Needless Tax Hike ———

Minnesotans are feeling the weight of increased costs at the gas pump, at the grocery store and pretty much everywhere else these days with price hikes soaring at 40-year highs.

Many Minnesotans also are working hard to recover from losing income during the pandemic when restrictions and all-out shutdowns impacted workers.

Those are just a couple of reasons it was so disappointing to see the March 15 deadline to enact legislation preventing a tax increase from taking place pass without action in the House. The real kicker is the House allowed this tax increase to occur at a time the state is sitting on \$10 billion in surplus revenue.

This issue arose because the state's unemployment insurance trust fund was depleted with more people out of work during the pandemic. The federal government provided funding to the state to keep the program afloat and now that debt of more than \$1 billion is due.

The governor, House Republicans, Senate Republicans, and most Senate Democrats have supported passing a clean bill to fully replenish the UI funds. The Senate one month ago approved by a veto-proof majority legislation

But, instead of bringing the Senate's bill to the House

floor for a approval and sending it to the governor to sign and put this issue to rest, House Democrats continued to withhold that bill through the March 15 deadline. House Republicans made a move to declare urgency on the matter Monday to take up the Senate bill for a vote but, for the second time in the past week, that motion was blocked.

Now, a tax increase is set to take place to pay the state's federal debt even though Minnesota has a surplus of around \$10 billion. The consequences are highly concerning and even the Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development has sounded alarms. One recent article quotes Greater Minnesota employers saying they face tax increases in the tens of thousands of dollars next year, in one case a 130% increase which translates to a \$21,000 spike.

And, let's be clear: Those tax increases are going to impact us all, whether it's through higher prices for

goods and services, reduced wages or diminished benefits. That 12-pack of Diet Coke already costs a lot more than it did just a short time ago and this tax increase will only serve to raise its price even more. In turn, these higher costs we pay mean more sales tax is collected by a state that already has \$10 billion in surplus revenue.

It never ends, which gets us back to the point: Our mission in the Legislature this session should be to do all we can to help Minnesotans get back on their feet after what has been, for many, an extremely challenging couple of years. The state has a historic surplus that should be used for tax relief but, instead, the House majority allowed a tax increase to take place.

Aside from mere dollars and cents, the added strain this tax increase is likely to cause people is concerning. Mental health issues seem to be contributing, on some level, to the rising rates of violent crime in our state. We need to get a grip on this dangerous trend as well and House Republicans recently outlined a package of bills which focuses on three key areas: crime prevention and accountability for criminals; police recruitment and retention; and holding the criminal justice system accountable.

If nothing else, Minnesotans and our visitors deserve to be safe.

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


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## Becker robotics qualifies for MSHSL state tournament

Add another state tournament appearance to the list for Becker High School, as FRC 4607 (C.I.S.) performed well enough at the Duluth Regional March 5 to earn a spot at the MSHSL state robotics tournament. The team has been in existence for just ten years, but has earned a reputation as one of the elite teams in Minnesota and across the entire FRC competition cir-

"It truly is a testament to the students - it is incredible to see their performance," Head Coach Alex Jurek said. "I am very proud of this team."

C.I.S. went 8-1 during the qualification matches to earn second place entering the final draft selection, where they joined forces with a pair of top teams to form the #2 alliance.

"At the end of qualifications we were ranked second out of 58 teams and became alliance captains for the first time in team history," said the team's marketing department. "We picked team 876 Thunder Robotics out of Hatton-Northwood, North Dakota, for first pick and for second pick, we picked team 2239, The Technocrats out of Hopkins, Minnesota."

The trio of heavyweights won both quarterfinal matches, 90-60 and 74-65, to make it to the semifinals. In those matches, Becker's alliance lost the first match, 74-54, but bounced back for a 76-61 win in the second match. In the tiebreaker, Becker's group prevailed 67-53 to make it to the finals.

"In the finals, we played a very tough alliance and lost both matches, 85-49 and 99-65," the marketing department added. "Overall we are very excited to be competing, and working to improve our robot for the next two regionals."

Becker will next compete in Grand Forks, followed by a trip to the Lacrosse, Wisconsin regional.

"We performed great at Duluth, we are preparing to win at Grand Forks," team member John Nielsen commented.

This year's game has multiple scoring avenues, as is usual with the FRC challenge. One of the ways to score points is a four bar climbing structure, while there are also two different goals in a central hub where balls can be scored. As usual, the matches start with an autonomous period, where computer program-

For the fourth consecutive season under Coach Dan Baird, the Becker girls basketball team is headed back to the MN State Class AAA state tournament. This year's trip came after last Thurday's convincing win in the Section 5AAA Finals over Mississippi 8 Conference foe Monticello by a score of 69 to 32.

points and dictated right away she wasn't going to be denied by the way she attacked the basket," Baird added. "Ayla Brown did a fantastic job getting to the basket as well."

Brown had ten first half points and ended the game with 15 to help bolster the Bulldogs' scoring attack.

In addition to their usual starting five performing admirably, Becker also saw a spark from its bench, which received extended playing time in the second half of the game.

"Evelyn Kreft did a nice job scoring eight points off the bench and made some nice defensive plays too," Baird said.

With the win, Becker pushed its record to 23-4 on the season, while the Magic finished at 13-16.

#### **State Bound**

For the Bulldogs, the state tournament has been a frequent destination in recent years, with the Bulldogs claiming a title a year ago. They were also slated to appear in the championship game in 2020, but the game was canceled in the hours leading up to the finals because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The previous year, the Bulldogs were runners-up. Becker will enter this year's tournament with an incredible amount of experience and

the hope that the familiarity with the facilities and the spotlight of the game will work in their favor.

The Class AAA tournament quarterfinals were held Wednesday at Maturi Pavilion on the University of Minnesota campus, with the semifinals (Thursday) and finals (Saturday) moving to Williams Arena. The state seeding meet-

ing was held last Saturday, with Becker receiving the #1 seed and drawing unseeded Austin as their first round opponent in the first game of the day, a 10 a.m. start time. Also playing each other in Becker's side of the bracket was #4 Benilde-St. Margaret, who took on Mankato East. In the other side of the bracket, #2 St. Paul Como Park was scheduled to face unseeded Grand Rapids, while #3 Totino-Grace faced unseeded Detroit Lakes.

In facing the Austin Packers, Becker will face a team with a 24-5 record that finished in second place in the Big Nine Conference with a 19-3 record, just behind Mankato East, who finished 20-2.

Becker went into the state tournament averaging 76.2 points per game, led by Dani Nuest's 15.9 points per game, while Ayla Brown averages 15.1. Close behind were Adeline Kent (14.8), Lexi Rose (13.2) and Maren Westin

Lexi Rose added a pair of free throws in the final seconds to secure the win.

With the win, Becker advanced to the state semifinals Thursday at noon against either Mankato East or Benilde St. Margarets.

## Bulldog boys to play for section title

The Becker boys basketball team is just one game away from being Becker High School's fourth winter sports team to qualify for the MSHSL state tournament, as the Bulldogs will face the Princeton Tigers in the Section 5AAA championship. The section final game was played last night (Friday, March 18) in Cambridge against the #1 seed Princeton Tigers.

Becker advanced to the title game with a semifinal win over the Monticello Magic and Head Coach Josh Ihrke said it was maybe his team's best game of the sea-

"That was our most complete team victory," Ihrke said after the game. "We had valuable minutes from every guy tonight."

Heading into the game, the semifinal matchup against Monticello had all the expectations of a close fought, physical playoff game, as the two teams had split 1-1 during the regular season. Monticello won the first matchup, as the host Magic were on fire offensively on January 28 and came away with a 85-75

Becker returned the favor at home exactly a month later as they won a 73-61 defensive minded contest on February 25. Becker had finished the regular season in third place in the M8 Conference with an 8-6 record (15-10 overall), while the Magic finished second at 9-5 (13-13 over-

But this time it was the section tournament and Becker was dominant in earning a trip to the finals.

The Bulldogs went on an offensive onslaught in the fist half, posting 49 points on the Magic and putting the game out of reach with a 49-20 halftime lead.

"Brady Paumen was playing at such a high level throughout the game, Ihrke added. "We were able to establish a toughness on defense that led to a productive offense?

Becker shot 52% in the game and held the Magic to a woeful 30% field goal percentage, and in addition the Bulldogs were better in points in the paint (40 to 30), defensive rebounding (29 to 20) and points off turnovers (20 to 11).

Paumen put up the double-double for the Bulldogs, as he scored 18 points and also grabbed 10 rebounds.

Eric Seavert also played well, scoring 15 points and dishing out five assists, while Hayden Harmoning played perhaps his best game of the year with 11 points, five rebounds and four assists.

Ihrke was proud of how his #2 seeded team handled a very good Magic squad.

We earned the opportunity to play in the section final on Friday against Princeton," Ihrke said.

CITY COUNCIL CITY OF CLEARWATER ORDINANCE NO. 2022-04 AMENDING PART I, CHAPTER 14, ARTICLE V – WEEDS

OF THE CLEARWATER CITY CODE THE CITY OF CLEARWATER HEREBY ORDAINS AS

FOLLOWS: City Code Section 14-93, Notice to Remove is hereby amended as follows:

When the owner and/or occupant permit a nuisance to exist in violation of section 14-92, the weed inspector, or assistant inspectors, shall serve a notice on the owner, occupant or agent of the owner of such lot or parcel of land ordering such person to have such weeds or grass cut and maintained or otherwise eradicated or removed within ten days after the service of such notice. Such notice shall also state that in event of noncompliance, removal will be done by the city at the owner's expense. When no owner, occupant or agent of the owner can be found, no-tice shall be sent by mail to the person who is listed on the records of the county auditor or county

City Code Section 14-94, Assessment is hereby amended as follows: If such person fails to comply with the notice within ten days after

service, or if no owner, oc-cupant or agent can be found, the weed inspector, or assistant inspectors, shall have such weeds cut and maintained or otherwise eradicated. A record showing the cost of such work attributable to each separate lot or parcel shall be delivered to the city clerk-treasurer. On or before November 1 of each year, the amount so charged against said lot or parcel of land, together with a description of the premises and the name of the supposed owner shall be certi-fied to the county auditor and shall be collected in the same manner as taxes and/or special assessments against said premises. The charge shall be a perpetual lien on the premises until paid.

Effective Date. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and summary publication, which is hereby authorized by the City Council.

Baloun said the reserve program has been a great recruiting tool and, while the department is fully staffed and is not hiring, it is still a great way for individuals interested in law enforcement to get experience they can use on their resumes when looking for a job at another department.

#### **GRRL Annual** Presentation

Jeannette Burkhardt, who runs both the Becker and Big Lake branches of the Great River Regional Library, gave her 2021 annual presentation to the council.

The winter reading program was a big success, which Burkhardt attributed to the gift cards to local businesses the library was able to give away as prizes.

The library changed its hours slightly in order to offer more morning hours to the public. They chose to do this based on public requests and the perception of changing needs in the community (especially with the Becker Area Senior Center recently moving right next door.)

Last year, the library

teamed up with Pebble Creek with a goal of raising \$500 for the Locally Growin' program. They were able to double this amount and raised about \$1,000. Last weekend, they again teamed up with Pebble Creek but without the same level of success, raising only \$300. Burkhardt attributed this to having better weather at the 2021 event, which led to golfers being out on the course and making use of the clubhouse that day. Patrons can still contribute to the program through the end of March. Stop in or contact the library for more information.

The library hoped to have a unique item available for checkout at the library to encourage residents to come in and move their bodies. They hoped to purchase a tandem bicycle that could be rented for rides around town, but their insurance company discouraged this idea. Instead, the library opted to purchase pickleball equipment that can be used at the court behind the Community Center. Kits include balls, paddles, and instructions for playing.

Story Strolls were popular last summer. These walks through city or county parks feature pages of a book printed on signs. In order to read the book, families take a walk around the park. Last year, kids were able to stamp cards every time they finished one of these strolls and won prizes if they completed all four sponsored by the library.

The library is continuing their outreach with the food shelf, putting together "take and make" bags for kids, which provide all the necessary materials to make a craft.

#### Job Classification and **Compensation Study**

Council decided to implement changes from the job classification and compensation study April 2, at the beginning of the second quarter. This will slightly alter city employee pay scales. Council Member Mike Doering asked whether the new pay scale will allow for higher rates to attract or retain talented employees in the competitive market. City Clerk Julie Blesi said that was not possible at this time, but there should be some options for such a case in a few weeks' time, at an upcoming council meeting.

#### Pebble Creek Remodel

Pebble Creek continues to get a makeover as staff sets its sights on the lower clubhouse level. The lower level is not in great shape, and is not being utilized as much as it could be. Currently, there

are a snack shack and locker rooms in the lower level. Staff proposed using the mens' showers as extra storage. The women's locker room would be converted into a bridal party prep room, including soft seating and vanities. The old snack shack would be turned into club storage, so patrons would not have to haul their clubs back and forth from their vehicles every time they came to use the course or the simulators. The ceiling tiles in the hallway would also be replaced. \$25,000 was budgeted for this project.

## Committee Reports

Public Works Committee reported doing leak detection at city fire hydrants. Staff did find one leak which they hoped to have fixed this week. They also elected to be put on a waitlist to purchase a new snow blower in 2023. This item was budgeted for purchase in 2023, but orders are taking up to 12 months to be filled at the moment. The actual purchase will happen

Ken Treasurer Warneke gave an overview on how the township makes and spends money. About 89% of the township's funding comes from the tax levy they set annually, while the remaining 11% comes from state or federal funding and miscellaneous

There is an increase in the public safety budget for the upcoming year, as the Big Lake Fire Dept. is scheduled to purchase a new engine. Rather than make a large increase in taxes at the time of purchase, Warneke advised setting it slightly higher a few years in advance in order to save up for the pur-
