PO closing, **PO Boxes being** relocated

With the Becker Post Office closing its doors at its current location on Oct. 24, residents and curious neighbors have been wondering, what's gonna happen to my PO box?

For the entire time the Becker PO has been put on notice about their lease ending this month, Becker Mayor Mark Kolbinger has been furiously trying dents and businesses while we continue to seek a solution to have retail and operations permanently located in our community," Kolbinger said. But Kolbinger will not

cease doing everything in his power to get the USPS to re-consider and make better efforts to find a permanent home in Becker.

"Now that we have secured temporary mail delivery service for those residents and businesses who



to work things out with the post office to retain a building here in Becker. With the timeline shrinking, Kolbinger began researching area sites where he thought could accommodate just the PO boxes while the rest of the PO services continued out of Monticello for the

As of this week, it appears Kolbinger's persistence has paid off.

"While I continue to work hard every week to come to a permanent resolution to keep our post office in Becker, I'm glad the USPS agreed to our proposal to put temporary post office boxes at the Becker Community Center," Kolbinger said

Kolbinger said the the USPS told him their staff will be notifying box holders in Becker about the new location and also distributing the keys for the portable CBUs to be located outside at the Becker Community Center. The CBUs will be post office boxes that are secured and similar to what people might see at an apartment complex.

"This will preserve mail service for our resiutilize post office boxes, I will be shifting my efforts to my 'Keep the Becker post office in 55308' campaign," said Kolbinger. "I will be engaging with our local citizens to help in this endeavor as we lobby the USPS as well as our Federal elected officials."

Kolbinger said he will be asking for the public's help to ensure that their voices are heard and common sense prevails.

"Quite frankly, it's ridiculous that our 55308 community, with over 10,000 residents, has to fight this hard to keep a local post office," he said. "Please watch for details in the coming weeks as we

enter the next phase." Kolbinger noted that he thinks it's also important for everyone to remember that the Rademacher family (Bill's Family Foods, Bill's Superette) gave the post office several years' notice and more than ample opportunity to prepare for this day.

"I applaud Grant and his family for their continued dedication and commit-ment to our community," Kolbinger said.

Understanding the Upcoming Becker Schools Election

On November 4, Becker residents will have the opportunity to vote on a new school board member, with Renee Regel running unopposed for the seat vacated by Troy Berning. In addition, District residents will have the opportunity to vote on an operating levy that directly supports our schools' day to day operations. The request is for \$200 per pupil, which would generate about \$640,000 annually for Becker Public Schools. This \$200 per pupil is the lowest per pupil amount proposed on ballots across all Minnesota School Districts out of about 100 questions The Becker School

Board has been very deliberate in crafting this proposal. They understand that every tax dollar matters and are committed to keeping taxes as low as possible while maintaining the quality of education our community expects. The average homeowner in Becker would see an increase of about \$8 per month, or roughly \$100 per year based on a \$365,000 home value (Homestead+up

This operating levy is not driven by local decisions alone. School districts across Minnesota are facing financial pressures created by state and federal policies that have not kept pace with inflation or funding promises. New state mandates, such as paid family leave, unemployment insurance, increased requirements under the READ Act are all worthwhile initiatives, but they come with signifi-

cant costs. At the same time, state support in areas such as special education, transportation, student support personnel aid, and school meals has decreased.

Becker has maintained a fiscally conservative approach, building its fund balance for emergency use, avoiding staff reductions, and sustaining strong academic and extracurricular programs. However, these unfunded mandates and rising costs are eroding that stability. Without a modest increase now, future requests could be two, three, or even four times larger as we attempt to recover from structural shortfalls.

Residents can learn more and review tax impacts on their own property by visiting www.becker.k12.mn.us and clicking on the levy information link. Voting is open weekdays from 8:00 am to 4:30 pm at the District Office (Door 2) through November 3, and on Election Day, November 4, from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm at the Becker Community Center, 11500 Sherburne Avenue.

The American Bison (Bison bison) is one of those

animals that doesn't seem to get the admiration or respect that other large animals command. Brown Bears, Moose and Elk are adored by the masses. White-tailed Deer are prized, and Black Bears are respected and yet it seems the Bison is just tolerated, kind of like you might tolerate your strange uncle that comes to a family gathering.

Bison are the national mammal of America, and it seems rather fitting. The Bison has a significant historical, cultural and ecological importance and does a great job at representing the strength of America. This critter has gone from being one of the most numerous animals in America in pre-settlement times, to being at the brink of extinction and is now rebounding. It has an important conservation success story to tell and a good lesson to learn.

The American Bison is the largest land mammal in North America. This was painfully obvious to me while I was recently filming and taking pictures of some Bison in Teddy Rosevelt National Park in North Dakota. The males where rutting and tending very closely to some females. Looking through my camera lens brings the animal up close and personal and really drives

home the fact that the males are absolutely huge.

An adult male can stand over six feet tall at the shoulder and are 10 to 11 feet in length. Females and young males are much smaller, but an adult male can weigh over 2,000 pounds (one ton). The record heaviest bison



weighed over 3,800 pounds. Despite their massive size, they are super-fast and can even outrun a horse, reaching 35 mph and jump over six

feet high. This is definitely not an animal to trifle with. I was following one particular large bull when I noticed he wanted to cross a road. The sides of the highway had the standard metal guard rail, which is only about three feet tall, but this bull didn't even break stride and cleared the rail in one clean jump and kept going.

Bison are considered ecosystem engineers, similar as the Prairie Dog that I wrote about last time. The bison don't just graze, they shape the environment around the areas where they roam. Moving around the Bison encourages a wide variety of plants to grow by grazing for a short time before moving onto an-

They are one of the few species where both the males and females have horns. Just a reminder, horns are different from antlers. Horns are permanent structures on the animal's head and are composed of keratin, compared to antlers which are made mostly of calcium and are regrown each year.

I was out filming a herd of Bison which contained several very large males, all who where rutting. During the breeding season, the males go around and check in with females. They smell the female to determine if she is near the optimal time to be bred. As the males wander around, they sound off with a deep and resounding bellow. These bellows are very loud and sound like a cross between a lion's roar and a Black Bear's growl. The low wave frequency of the bellow travels well across the open ground. I happen to notice the sides of the Bison vibrating with each bellowing call, just where the ribs are located, so much that the dirt and dust in the male's fur vibrated right out into the air. It was truly impressive sight to see and something I would never know about or understand if I wasn't spending so much time observing and filming.

We should celebrate our American Bison because it's truly a unique American animal. By the way, I hope you noticed that I never called them Buffalo. This is because they are not a type of Buffalo. Also, Saturday Nov 1st, is National Bison Day and Awareness Day. This day of celebration is the first Saturday in November each year. Until next time...

sniyder spent time describing her life story which continues to encourage and influence people of all ages. Later, Snyder stuck around and allowed to be photographed and signed autographs as well.

Snyder was involved in a serious car accident 15 years ago that left her paralyzed from the waist down. Prior to the accident she was a world renown barrel racer and rodeo star and has a passion for horses


One inspired youngster, Elena Davis of Becker, was thrilled when she was able to meet Snyder and have her autograph her horse-riding

A Big Lake woman was injured in a two-vehicle crash Saturday, Oct. 4, in Bock.

At about 9:55 a.m., the Minnesota State Patrol responded to a collision on Hwy. 23 near Wall Avenue.

According to the State Patrol, 62-year-old Kathie Robideau of Big Lake was driving a 2017 Ford Escape when it struck a 2019 Jeep Grand Cherokee driven by 83-year-old Robert Collison

of Milaca.

Investigators said Collison was attempting to cross

Portable Storage Unit: A storage unit or container designed, constructed or reconstructed to be capable of movement via towing, hauling, attachment to a vehicle from one site to another and designed to be used without a permanent foundation for the storage or shipment of household goods, wares, building materials or merchandise. Portable storage units shall include semi-trailers, cargo or shipping containers, and similar units which are used primarily for storage rather than transport.

Temporary Outdoor Storage Container: A portable storage unit that does not have a permanent foundation or footing and which includes cargo containers, portable storage containers, and bulk solid waste containers. Such structures shall not be considered a building. A temporary storage structure may include a self-storage container that is delivered to and retrieved from a home or business for long term off-site or on-site storage. Temporary outdoor storage containers shall be permitted for a maximum of one hundred and twenty (120) days.

(e) Portable Storage Units.

ii. A portable storage unit may be temporarily placed, stored, or used for storage on residential properties for moving purposes for up to one month in a 12-month period.

iii. A portable storage unit may be temporarily placed, stored or used for storage on residential properties for construction or renovation purprovided all required permits are obtained for the projin compliance, and the portable storage unit is removed completion of the project. Use is subject to the stan-

b. Commercial, Industrial, and Institutional Districts.

i.Portable storage units shall be allowed subject to the standards within this section and the respective zoning district.

2. Standards. The following standards shall apply to portable storage units in all zoning a. No portable storage units shall be modified, retrofitted or used on-site for any purpose

- other than storage. Portable storage units shall not be provided with refrigeration, heating, electricity or plumbing for the purpose of human habitation or to conduct commercial activities.
- b. All portable storage units shall be stored in a secure fashion with doors that are fully closed.
- c. All portable storage units shall be placed on a bituminous or concrete surface. d. Portable storage units shall not be stacked on one another.
- e. No portable storage unit may be placed on public right of way, block a public sidewalk or be placed in a location that does not comply with the requirements of section 117-1035.
- f. Portable storage units shall be maintained in good condition, free from evidence of deterioration, weathering, discoloration, graffiti, rust, ripping, tearing, or other holes or breaks, always. g. Portable storage units that become unsound, unstable or otherwise dangerous shall be
- immediately repaired or removed from the property where kept, subject to the city's requirements. The city shall provide notice to the owner of the property where the cargo container is located of any condition in violation of this section. After notice to the property owner, any cargo container stored or kept in a manner deemed a dangerous condition and a public nuisance as determined by the city may be immediately removed by the city. Any cost or expense associated with the removal shall be the responsibility of the property owner where the cargo container is located. h. Portable Storage units in Commercial, Industrial and Institutional Districts shall be
- screened in accordance with the provisions set forth in Section 117-1130 (b): Fencing and Screening Standards. The screening shall serve to minimize visual impacts on adjacent residential properties.

3. Current violations; time to comply.

a. Portable storage units located on Residential, Commercial, Industrial, and Institutional District prior to the effective date of this chapter are considered illegal.

b. All property owners within the city shall have 12 months from the effective date of this chapter to bring the properties, which currently portable storage units that are in violation of the terms of this chapter, into full compliance with the provisions of this section.


