What does a wife, a mother of four young children, two cats and a golden dragon do to fill her already busy days?

She applies and gets accepted to medical school!

The University of Minnesota Medical School CentraCare Regional Campus will soon open their doors and be the first new medical school in Minnesota in the last 50 years. It is a school that grants Doctor of Medicine (MD) degrees and Sierra Bermudez (Bratsch) of St. Cloud applied to one day be a physician.

And she was accepted! Bermudez, 25 was one of 2,000 St. Cloud School applicants to be welcomed Only 24 students were received favorably for this year and following some rigorous testing, Bermudez cleared the hurdles and is set to join the others at orientation August 18.

"The road to becoming a medical doctor is long and difficult," she says. "After high school, you need to complete four years of undergraduate studies (bachelor's degree), typically in a science-related major, because most schools require upper-level science coursework.'

W ere it Begn

Sierra first became interested in medicine when she got pregnant in the 11th grade.

"Having so much support from my medical team time inspired me to help others in the same way, she says. "I had four kids by the time I was 22 and through all of my pregnancies my doctor and care team taught me so much about my body and reproduction while also connecting me with community resources."

It was this experience that sparked her interest in science and showed her a way to combine her interest in science with her desire to help others within her community.

"Medicine is a lifelong learning experience. I cannot think of a

Remembering Bruce

I'm praying for Senator Anderson's wife and the entire Anderson family. My heartfelt condolences go out to them. Bruce was a man deeply dedicated to his faith and to serving the people of his district and Minnesota with honor and integrity.

I first got to know Sen. Anderson when I interned for Rep. Sondra Erickson in the House in 2007. Several times that session, he approached me-a kid just out of high schooland struck up meaningful conversations. We talked politics and life. He shared about his first wife, who he had lost the year before, and I could tell how much she meant to him by the way he spoke about her. It was clear her loss had a big impact on him.

He was a staunch defender of faith, family, and freedom. He was friendly to everyone, from lawmakers to interns, and I'm honored to have been his friend and colleague.

The family has asked for privacy and will share a statement at a later time.

A summary of Senator Anderson's public service career follows.

Bruce Anderson (R-Buffalo) began his legislative career in the Minnesota

Last Thursday, one of our biggest legislative priorities, the Anti-CBDC Surveillance State Act, passed the House of Representatives with nonpartisan support

The Anti-CBDC Surveillance State Act is simple. It prevents unelected, unaccountable bureaucrats at the Federal Reserve from issuing a financial surveillance tool that would fundamentally undermine the American way of life.

For those who are unfamiliar, a central bank digital currency (CBDC) is a digital form of sovereign currency designed and issued by a government, which transacts on a digital ledger controlled and monitored by that government. Simply put, a CBDC is a government-controlled programmable money that, if designed without the privacy protections of cash, would give the federal government the ability to monitor, track, and restrict Americans' individual transactions This is more than alarming; it's un-American. We have already seen examples of foreign governments weaponizing their financial system against their citizens. In China, the Communist Party uses a CBDC to monitor and control its citizens' spending habits. This data is being used to develop a social credit system that rewards or penalizes individuals based on their behavior. Think this could never

light, our Fireflies are tiny little insects, less than a half of an inch long.

The light production is a chemical process called bioluminescence. It occurs in a specialized organ where




an enzyme luciferase acts on luciferin and oxygen and produces light. The oxygen is supplied via the breathing tubes along the abdomen of the beetle's body. The light they produce is a cold light, no heat energy is produced, making it one of the most efficient light sources. The light has no infrared or ultraviolet frequencies. The light is usually a yellowish color. Different species of Fireflies produce green or pale red colors.

So why do these beetles emit light? Adult beetles emit light for mate selection. In our local Fireflies, both the male and female will blink their

cycle of the Firefly.

set while I was looking into my backyard and watching hundreds of Fireflies or Lightning Bugs blinking in the air of the warm summer evening. The Firefly is a soft bodied beetle which possesses

the remarkable ability to emit light through their body. Fireflies are found in temperate and tropical regions around the world. Although many countries no longer have fireflies. Here in America, they are found in damp forests, wet meadows and other protected areas that have leaf litter covering the ground.

The Fireflies we see at this time of year are a result of adults mating and laying eggs last year. After mating the female lays her eggs either on or just below the surface of the earth. A nice layer of dried tree leaves helps maintain the moisture needed for the eggs to survive. The eggs hatch in two to three weeks and a small larva (tiny worm) emerges. The larva feeds until the end of summer before digging deeper into the soil to overwinter

In spring the larvae emerge, feeding heavily on snails and slugs for a couple weeks. The larva then pupates (life stage of an insect where it transforms into the adult) for one to two weeks and by the dog days of summer, emerge as the adult beetle. There are more than 2,000 different types or kinds of light-emitting beetles in the world, and each species is slightly different in their lifecycle, light-emitting, and what the adult beetle looks like. Despite their big bright

career more rewarding than learning about the body that drives us every day while helping others to live happier, healthier lives."

Bermudez graduated with a BS in biomedical sciences and a Spanish minor from St. Cloud State University. She has a husband, Anthony, four children in Dalton (eight), Ivory (six), Kalia (five) and Azaleah (two) She also has two cats, Mushroom and Truffl and a bearded dragon, named Phoenix. "Although not always required, it is highly recommended to have research experience, volunteer hours, and shadowing hours," she said. "I was asked about all three of these experiences during multiple steps of my application as well as my interview." Bermudez said she did undergraduate research in Type 1 diabetes at SCSU where she studied immune cells in streptozotocin-induced diabetic mice consuming Coca-Cola. "I volunteered around 100 hours in the pediatrics unit at the CentraCare St. Cloud Hospital where I helped to comfort children and give some relief to nurses and family members," she says. "I also volunteered at Project HEAL health clinics, where I helped translate to allow Spanish speakers better access to resources like vaccines and routine check-ups." Additionally, Bratsch-Bermudez conducted over 130 hours of shadowing where she followed and observed doctors from nine different specialties. "There are plenty of students who get many more hours of volunteering and shadowing," she says. "Because I have young kids and was working opposite shifts from my spouse, we did not have a babysitter, so I needed to make do with what little free time I had."

Nobody was injured.

The suspect has been booked at the Sherburne County Jail and has been identified as Zha Vang, 51, of Elk River.

Law enforcement from several agencies responded to the Government Center at about 9:30 a.m. after the report of shots fired. There is an active and ongoing investigation into whether Vang committed any additional crimes before and/or after shooting at the Government Center.

County staff are working to secure the building and assess the damage, Zawacki said.

Because the Government Center campus remains a crime scene, access to the building, parking lot and surrounding grounds is restricted until investigators clear.

According to records, Vang has convictions dating back to 2017. He was cited and convicted for violations ranging from petty misdemeanors to a misdemeanor, including for a Wildlife Management Area firearms violation, three speed citations, two parking violations, fishing without a license, and driving after suspension.

Testing and Scores

On top of all this,applicants must have competitive grades, a competitive Medical College Admission Test (MCAT) score, and an overall impressive application and personal statement.

"Before applying, you must take the MCAT, which is a challenging test that includes material from biology, biochemistry, chemistry, physics, psychology, critical analysis, and much more,"

she said. "This test is not pass/ fail. You receive a score and vou can then decide to apply or retake. Some schools require additional testing but for the University of Minnesota, I was able to apply with just my MCAT."

Sierra had a primary application and a secondary application, which required different essay questions. Following her secondary, she received an interview invitation

"The interview lasted a couple of hours," she said. "I received an acceptance call about two months after my interview. Medical school primary applications open early May of the year before you plan to attend, so the application cycle can last an entire year.'

Staying Hopeful

Sierra sat on pins and needles until she finally got the call that she had been accepted.

"Upon being accepted, I just screamed and cried," she said. "I was probably scaring my kids, but to be one of 24 accepted was an amazing feeling. Knowing I got into my first-choice school and did not have to move my kids away from their school and family was a huge relief. Having the privilege of studying at an incredible school like the U of M while being part of the inaugural class is such an honor!

Why the Need for a **New Medical School?**

Rural communities within Minnesota and the United States are facing serious physician shortages. According to the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC), the United States will face a physician shortage

of up to 86,000 physicians by 2036. This is disproportionately affecting rural areas. The AAMC found that under-served communities would have needed 202,800 more physicians in order to obtain the same care as populations with better access to care in 2021. The new Saint Cloud Campus aims to train more physicians to serve rural Minnesotans to ensure that access to care is available for everybody regardless of where they live.


'Once I graduate from medical school, there is a process of applying to residency programs," Sierra says.

"There's different programs all over the country and you select and rank which you are most interested in. In five years, I hope to be in my preferred residency program in the St. Cloud area. I hope it's not too rough, residency is allegedly some of the hardest years of training. All of my kids will be in school so I just hope they are enjoying their classes and doing activities that make them happy. I hope my husband continues moving up within his career (Supervisor at Cintas) and we can continue building our future."

And in 10 years?

"In 10 years, I hope to be doing what I love, helping to keep people happy and healthy while closing gaps in care to rural Minnesotans," she says. "Dalton will be an adult, and the kids will be more independent. I hope to be in a specialty that I love and be a successful practicing physician. I hope we have time to travel and experience the world and all of its rich cultures.

Clear Lake City decides to hire new building inspector

During their recent meeting, the Clear Lake City Council decided to hire a new building inspector.

At the previous meeting, the council asked for example permit fees from three different building inspection companies as they considered switching their service provider. The council heard the differences between the proposals. The proposals were very comparable, and the council spent some time debating their decision. They ultimately decided to go with Metro West Inspection Services, switching from their previous provider AllSpec Inspection Services.

Public W ks Report Public Works Director Evan Johnson reported there would be a water distribution training system in Annandale. Council granted him and his employee permission to attend the training in August.

Mayor Tim Goenner said he'd received complaints about puddles not drying up on Church St. Council Member Lance Gilleland said the homeowner shared with him that she was concerned the puddle was caused by an issue with city water. Johnson said he was sure the puddle was just rain water that didn't dry up due to the worn out nature of the road and the freqe nt rainfall.

Staff Hours

With the hire of new city clerk, Ryan McCann, and treasurer, Amanda Scheiber, council discussed cutting back on the hours of the temporary city clerks. Clerk Ryan McCann was planning to take leave, but after his return the council wished to "phase out" the temporary staff and have McCann and Scheiber take over the clerk's office du-

Baseball Tournament Mike Golombiecki approached the board to discuss the upcoming regional baseball tournament. The

team has done a lot of work on the field with the assistance of Johnson and Goenner. The Clear Lake Lions will be handling concession sales.

The sprinkler system is still acting up. Johnson said it could be rewired though it would cost \$1,500. Whatever the solution, it won't be done in time for the tournament, and the sprinklers will continue to need to be manually switched.

Golombiecki spoke about some of the improvements he, the team, and other residents made to the park, including some tree trimming, donating plastic picnic tables, and other things. He asked that the council consider spending more money on the park to make it look nice.

Council Member Stefany Janish suggested getting together with the team in the winter after the season to discuss support going forward.

After some discussion, the council voted to install a four foot fence by the dugout for safety.

Fire Department

The council made a payment to Fire Safety USA for the new fire truck. The Travelers Country Club donated \$1,00 to the fire department. The council updated fire department job descriptions.

Janish said the council is supposed to perform an annual review of the chief officers of the department, which hasn't been done in recent years. She wanted to restart the annual review. The council discussed briefly but took no action.

Clerk's Report

Clerk Ryan McCan requested to capitalize a couple of opportunities for training as well as a membership with the MCFOA (Municipal Clerks and Finance Officers Association of Minnesota), which the council said they would look into. McCann also requested that he and the treasurer be allowed to apply to become notaries for the convenience of the city. The council approved the application for McCann only for the time being.

In Other Business, the Council:

· Decommissioned a performance bond for Distributed Solar Development LLC;

· Tabled a resolution to censure a council member due to lack of publishing information beforehand;

· Held a closed meeting to discuss acquisition of the lift station easement which will allow the city to access their lift station for improvements, as a follow up to the previous meeting;

· Heard from the mayor that he was very upset by the council's decision at the last meeting to dispose of the Rainbow playset, as he wished to show it to a local family.
