Governor Tim Walz and Lieutenant Governor Peggy Flanagan recently appointed Maj. John Donovan, U.S. Army, Retired to the Governor's Advisory Council on Opioids, Substance Use, and Addiction. 





ported. The Quetzal is well known for feeding on wild avocados. So, after a short hike on a muddy trail, we set up near

a large avocado tree. The surrounding area was beau-

tiful and there were several perches the bird might use that would allow the possibility of some great images. We stood there in the light rain, everyone hopeful for the arrival of the Resplendent Quetzal, but no one was reporting any sightings this morning. Several hours passed and still nothing, but then our local guide's phone rang, and in half English and half Spanish he said pack it up let's go quickly to another location. We piled out of the van and trekked across several open fields to the edge of the jungle where another avocado tree stood. We waited and waited. The rain stopped for a few minutes and the sun came out and warmed us up. After a while it was decided



we waited a little longer and still no bird. We headed back down the steep trail doing our best not to slip and slide down the hill. We gathered for lunch and made a plan to return to the last location where we ate breakfast to wait out the afternoon to see if we can

capture some images of the Quetzal. When we returned everyone was wet from the rain and had muddy boots. In these conditions we

needed rain gear our cameras and ourselves. Again, the waiting game started. One hour passed, then another.

The sun set was around 5 p.m. and it was getting towards 4 p.m. with very light rain falling. Suddenly a flash of bright iridescent green shot past the group and landed in the avocado tree. After the initial gasp of delight, everyone fell silent and concentrated on capturing some images of this unbelievably beautiful bird. The bird moved around the tree and three times came out into the open allowing everyone a good chance to see and capture stunning images.



Palmer Board considering ARPA expenditures

The Palmer Twp. Board met Monday evening and examined several potential uses for their remaining American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds.

Awarded at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, the ARPA funds were Federal dollars that flowed to local units of government, who must earmark the funds by the end of 2024.

The board reviewed several quotes for security upgrades at the Town Hall, including new locking mechanisms, before tabling the idea until next month. The board also approved approximately \$7,700 for the basic remodel of the front entrance area in the Town Hall, which will include the installation of a service window and counter area to better serve the public.

Supervisor Richard Larson requested that some of the funds be pledged to crosswalks and flashing lights for the town, which is basically bisected by Co. Rd. 6. Larson felt that safety could be greatly enhanced by the flashing lights, similar to what are used in Duelm.

Chair Mike Ganz and Supervisor Steve Demeules agreed with the concept, but noted that Co. Rd. 6 is governed by Sherburne County. Larson agreed to tackle the project and do the "arm-twisting" necessary to move forward with getting the costs and next steps outlined before the next board meeting.

Lake News

Demeules updated the board on several lake related issues, including the BLCA weed spraying notices that were mailed out to anyone who participated last year. For any new participants, they should check the BLCA website for the form. Most everyone reported excellent results a year ago and the same vendor is slated to provide the service.

Demeules also announced that the Healthy Lakes committee was looking for new members. The group meets the first Thursday of every month and more volunteers are needed. He also provided the

annual announcement that the channel between Rush and Briggs Lake

is never fully safe due to thin ice - flowing

water. Additionally, board discussed the ongoing issue of trash and other waste left on the ice during the ice fishing season.

Mitch Wipper from the Briggs Lake General Store and Paul Braun from The Palmer House were both present at the meeting and reported that they will be putting up signs reminding people to take care of

their garbage in a responsible manner. Dumpsters are located at the landings and should be used to keep trash off the ice. The board is hoping for patrol from both the DNR and SCSO to help cite offenders who leave garbage or human waste on the ice. All in atten-

dance felt that a little enforcement would go a long way in addressing the nasty human behaviors that leave the lakes littered with unwanted materials.

In Other Business, the Board:

- Approved the Assessment Services Agreement with Sherburne County;
- Discussed the renewal of the lease for space between the Township and the SCSO;
- Heard an update on plans to cut the dead trees at Palmer Park;
- · Reviewed a quote from Kraemer's for the 2023 Clean Up Day, with the costs being approximately half of last year's
- · Discussed snowplowing at Cedar Point and what can be done to get the road cleared;
- Heard from Sgt. Geoff Dowty about last month's 91 calls for service from the SCSO, including 35 traffic stops, one burglary, one DUI and several fraud calls;
- Received the fire department report, outlining 18 total calls for service, including eight in Palmer

SNWR Christmas Bird Count upcoming

(Editor's Note: The following article was submitted to the Patriot by Jade Pederson of the Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge.)

The Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge's Christmas Bird Count will be held on Tues., Dec. 20 starting at 7:30 a.m. at the Oak Savanna Learning

A nation-wide activity organized by the National Audubon Society, the Christmas Bird Count is held from Dec. 14 to Jan. 5 annually, with 10's of thousands of volunteers participating in this citizen science project.

This year marks the 123rd year of the survey of winter bird species and participation now ranges from Alaska to Antarctica. Sher-

burne's Refuge volunteers will survey within a 7.5-mile radius from the intersection of Sherburne Co. Rd. 9 and

Co. Rd 5. Although additional volunteers are not needed for this year's count, the refuge could still use one's help! If one lives within 15 miles of the count area, it would be greatly appreciated if one cleaned and filled one's bird feeders at least three days before the count. Additionally, please be aware that vehicles may be driving slowly past one's

home with binoculars fixed on one's property. Know that one shouldn't be concerned! The observers are only interested in the species and numbers of birds on one's property.

Reports from participating groups all across the country are tallied by Audubon and other birding organizations, including the Minnesota Ornithologist's Union. The final tally provides valuable information on the number of bird species present during that 23-day time frame. Nationally, this data is used to track long-term trends in bird populations and distribution; both declines in populations and increases in species like bald eagles.

Local data for the Ref-

uge is used to track changes in the bird populations over time, and it can also be pooled with other areas to detect patterns over a larger area. The Minnesota Ornithologist's Union maintains records for the Sherburne Refuge count dating back to 1966.

Last year, the Refuge's Christmas Bird Count observed 42 species of birds including numerous common species such as blackcapped chickadee and snow bunting to less common species including spotted towhee and hoary redpoll. This important count would not be possible without a dedicated group of refuge volunteers!

Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge is managed by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, and is located near the cities of Princeton, Zimmerman, and St. Cloud, in central Minnesota.

The mission of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service is working with others to conserve, protect and enhance fish, wildlife, plants and their habitats for the continuing benefit of the American people. They are both a leader and trusted partner in fish and wildlife conservation, known for their scientific excellence, stewardship of lands and natural resources, dedicated professionals and commitment to public service.
