Although its construction is not a done deal, the Clear Lake Twp. Board approved funds Tuesday evening for engineering specifications for a picnic shelter that could be located at the township park.

At last week's annual meeting, the residents of the township had approved of the concept of the shelter which could also receive the support of the

Clear Lake Lions Club. Chairman

Gary Gray looked further into the issue and found that because it is going to be a public structure, there needed to be an engineer's architectural plan accomplished

before the plan could come to fruition. The

pervisors unanimously approved \$2,500 to get the plan finished and even if construction doesn't happen soon, the plan would be available

Preliminary construction estimates for the structure are in the \$25,000 range, meaning that the township would be footing the bill for approximately 10% of the project costs.

Convention of States is a non-partisan, grassroots organization gaining ground in their charge to engage everyday citizens to impose fiscal restraints, limit powers

and establish term limits for all politicians. They boast a network of over five million citizens and patriots in Georgia, Alaska, Florida, Alabama, Tennessee, Indiana, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arizona,

**CONVENTION of STATES ACTION** 

North Dakota, Texas, Missouri, Arkansas, Utah, and Mississippi have passed the COS application. Article V of the Constitution authorizes state legislatures to call a Convention of States to propose these amendments and to aid citizens in helping to curb the abuse of unsustainable debt, the crushing regulations on states and business

> with rising taxes, continued government overreach when it comes to one's health care and children's education. The Convention of

> States is being played out in all 50 states with eight getting passage through one chamber, 15 being passed in resolution and nine hav-

ing active legislation in 2021. It takes 34 states to call the convention and 38 to ratify any amendments that are proposed.

The Convention of States has grown 60% nationally in the first six weeks of 2021. Three hundred and seventeen people have signed the COS petition just in District

# BL Twp holds annual & regular meetings

Big Lake Twp. held their annual meeting and regular meeting on March 9 and 10, respectively.

#### Annual Meeting

In addition to the board supervisors, clerks, and treasurer, three residents attended the Big Lake Twp. annual meeting. Resident Eric Rosa, who ran an unsuccessful campaign to become a board supervisor last fall, was elected to serve as the moderator of the meeting.

#### **Community Reports**

The audience heard a summary about the town's finances and the Storm Water Pollution Program, both of which reported nothing but regular business.

Leah Hersh, Big Lake Twp's representative on the hospital board, gave a presentation on the state of the hospital for the last year. She said that vaccines are available at the Monticello Hospital for eligible patients. Hospital staff is excited to see a plateau in COVID-19 cases in the area, as this will hopefully be followed by a downward trend.

The hospital is also excited to welcome a new neurologist to its staff, and a new Da Vinci machine.

In the community, the hospital has helped to implement the Bike Fix-It station at the Northstar station in Big Lake.

On an unrelated note, Hersh encouraged community members to continue to donate their time and supplies to the Big Lake Food Shelf. Anyone interested in volunteering or who has questions about the program can contact the food shelf at 763-263-2432

She asked for any hospital patients to share feedback about their experiences, whether positive or negative, as such feedback is invaluable to the hospital.

Bruce Aubol next gave a report for the last year in the township. In 2020, 42 new homes were built. Five elections were held over the course of the year. Recycle day was a success, as usual.

#### 2022 Tax Levy

The assembly tentatively approved the 2022 at \$2,228,000. They then recessed the meeting until Sept. 9, 2021, when the final approval of the levy will take place, giving the board time to make adjustments and review the levy as deemed necessary.



# Warm weather brings vandals out in Santiago

The Santiago town board met last Wednesday and discussed several items related to the recent warm weather, including a return of the vandalism that has plagued the area in recent

Sgt. Andy Ochs of the Sheriff's Office was at the meeting to present the calls for service numbers for February, which included a total of 35 law enforcement contacts for issues from traffic complaints (five) to

medical emergencies (six). Within the past several weeks, supervisors learned that graffiti had again been painted on a township bridge and at least one sign, reading "stop sign ahead" had been stolen from a roadway, with others being vandalized. In addition, there was again four wheeler activity on some roadways with "donuts" being spun, but the remaining frost in the

gravel had spared the road a worse fate. The issue is not a new one to the board, who has spent considerable time and money to rectify similar issues in the past.

"When we catch them, we have to prosecute them," said supervisor Jeff Pappenfus, noting the clean-up expense caused to all township taxpayers.

"This is wasting a lot of money."

Ochs and the supervisors discussed possible solutions to the situation, although it seemed many possible solutions had been tried over the past decade with little luck in determining the perpetrators.

Twp. road contractor John Herbst said with the recent warm weather, it will likely be only a matter of weeks before he will begin grading the roads and getting them in shape.

The board is planning its annual road tour April 5 immediately following the local board of equalization. At that time, the supervisors will get a better look at how all of the roads fared through the winter and plans will be made at

that time to schedule main-

tenance such as crack sealing. They will also check the status of the township's signage and look for other damage.

## Fire Truck

Dave Dahlheimer of the Fire Dept. was at the meeting to discuss the sale of the old rescue rig, a 2002 GMC pickup truck. Before it is sold, a new title will need to be procured and then the township will set a selling price and process for taking bids on the ve-

The board expects to take action on the disposition of the truck at its April meeting

## Zoning

Supervisor Dave Jehoich noted that no action items for the township came up at the last county zoning meeting, although there will be a couple of driveway permit applications in the near future.

Resident Will Stang appeared before the board seeking feedback on his plans for an addition onto his existing house which

sits along Co. Rd. 16. Stang's residence already sits over 100 feet from the roadway, but because 16 is a CSAH highway, the requirement for setback increases. addition is planned to be towards the back of his house and therefore the board agreed to send favorable comment to Sherburne County, as they hold the final decision in the land

## **Inventory**

Jehoich next spoke to the board regarding a need to have a listing of all township assets for insurance purposes. The board felt they may have had such a list in the past but agreed that it would be a good time to gather an update. Over the next couple of months, the township will work on this inventory of town hall

The next meeting for the township will be April 5 at 9 a.m. for the local board of equalization, followed by the road tour. The next regular meeting is scheduled for April 14 at 7 p.m.

# Orrock holds annual meeting

During its regular meeting, the Orrock Twp. Board reviewed their recent annual meeting, discussed roads, held the annual board of audit, heard the Sheriff's report, and approved a variance for the Doherty residence.

#### Roads

Town engineer Mike Nielson gave a report on what Orrock might see in road construction over the next couple of years. The town plans to take pavement samples this summer in order to get a head start on soliciting bids for work for the construction season of 2022.

The board reviewed projected road spending, and Nielson pointed out there was an expected jump in spending in 2027 and 28. However, getting work done now instead of waiting could smooth that bump down significantly.

Nielsen also discussed the possibility of letting 180th St. revert to a gravel road, since it doesn't service many residents.

#### **Treasurer's Business** The township held its

annual board of audit. The treasurer, Gary Goldsmith, provided each supervisor with a list of expenditures, then asked them to pick out three receipts and three disbursements, which he then located among his files in order to prove the expense was properly processed.

He noted that each board member is given a list of expenses monthly, and he strongly encourages them to look at the list carefully. He said that a clerk in Vermillion Twp (Dakota County) was recently found guilty of embezzling \$650,000 over the course of eight years. Goldsmith said he doubted Orrock would ever be in any kind of similar position, just from the way they are set up, but he nonetheless encouraged the board members to make sure expenditures were all on the up and up.

Next, the board reviewed the 2021 budget framework. The framework outlines what the township expects to spend over the next year, but doesn't prevent the township from spending more or less than the budgeted amount.

The budget helps the township determine the tax levy, which is approved at the annual meeting.

## Sheriff's Report

It was a quiet month for the sheriff's department. The department continued to investigate fraudulent checks and unemployment fraud. As always, officers encourage citizens to never give their personal information over the

Most traffic violations in Orrock took place on County Roads 4 and 15, and in the 30 mph zone in front of the gas

### **Doherty Variance**

Mike and Ashley Doherty requested the board approve a new variance for their home. The couple recently found that the house is sinking and needs a new foundation, and decided that, while they were at it, they might as well add an addition. The planned addition didn't come near the right-of-way, and so the board sent positive comments on to the county, who will also need to approve the variance.

#### Orrock Annual Meeting

Orrock's annual meeting took place the week after the regular meeting, on Tuesday, March 9. All board members were present, as well as the clerk, the treasurer, town engineer Mike Nielson, and two citizens: Anna Dirks and Luke Masica. Supervisor Bryan Adams was elected to be the meeting's moderator.

### 2020 Overview

Adams gave an overview of 2020 for the benefit of the audience. The estimated population of Orrock is 3,856, with 22 new home permits being issued last year.

J. P. Brooks company



is developing the Shores of Eagle Lake development, and already six lots have been sold, sight unseen.

The town hall received an audio/visual upgrade toward the end of the year to allow supervisors to attend meetings remotely. This was thanks to the CARES Act funding. Other CARES funding went to benefit the Big Lake and Zimmerman/Livonia Fire Station, local schools, and other organizations in the community.

Supervisors Eric Peterson and Corrie Silverberg retired from their positions, and Gregg Felber and Janine Arnold joined the board.

Since the town hall did not have the capacity to host the elections of the last year while also allowing voters to socially distance themselves. elections were successfully held in the snowmobile trail shed instead. Of the total number of registered voters in the township, 57% chose to vote in person, and 30% voted absentee.

# **Fire Stations Reports**

Supervisor Paul Ellinger gave a report on the Zimmerman/Livonia Fire Dept. A new fire station is close to completion. The station would also house an event center with an event coordinator staffed. Last year, Orrock Twp. donated funds to the department to purchase new turnout gear for the fire-

Clerk Chris Weber gave a very brief summary for the Big Lake Fire Dept. Orrock Twp. donated CARES funding to help purchase an extractor machine to help clean and sanitize equipment. Weber said a more in-depth summary would come at a later regular monthly meet-

#### **Town Hall Building Update**

The Town Hall building was inspected last year, and it was apparent to the board that some changes will need to be made in the near future. The building is in good shape, despite its old age, but it can no longer support an election. The board members have considered adding an expansion to the building, essentially doubling its size. The board also considered creating a fire substation which would be connected to town hall, though this project was dropped quickly after seeing the cost. Regardless of what the board decides, no action is likely to be taken for a few years, at least.

#### Roads Summary

Last year, \$721,000 was levied for the road and bridge fund. Of that, \$718,390.33 was actually received to use towards that purchase. The total cost of all the road projects for 2020, before engineering fees, was \$481,962.83. The expected cost of 2021 projects, which includes several overlays, will be slightly lower, at \$405,773.

As promised earlier in the year, Supervisor Adams asked the attending citizens to give their opinion on adding swing-away mailboxes around the township. The cost of the mailboxes would be added to the town's budget, and the town would pay for the initial installation of the mailboxes, but not to replace or maintain them. With the swing-away mailboxes, it is less likely for a snow plow to knock them out, and the snow plows are able to plow much closer to the curb, so residents have less to shovel themselves. Residents who preferred not to have swing away mailboxes would not need to accept one. Of the citizens in attendance, neither had any issue with the addition

#### of swing away mailboxes. Approval of the 2022 Tax Levy

The tax levy was recommended to \$1,008,000 for 2022. This is up by 3.4% over last year. To continually raise the levy by 3-3.5% each year, taxpayers without significant increase in property value will see their township portion of taxes either remain the same or decrease each year, due to value being added to other homes and in new homes. That rate will also allow Orrock to prepare for road reconstruction down the road without needing to create a dramatic increase

The levy was approved by the citizens.

## NEWSPAPER ADVERTISING DRIVES ACTION

A study by NAA found that 81% of adults acted upon a coupon or call to visit a brand's local store after seeing a newspaper ad in the past month. At age 75, about 50% of people have had cataract surgery, and most people require it during their life, but it's not possible to predict when. It's nothing to fear, it is a painless outpatient operation. If you are having blurry vision, you should schedule an appointment for evaluation. We also recommend an annual eye exam to detect eye conditions before they become a problem.

# Minnetonka woman arrested in Big Lake

(Editor's Note: The following article was sent to the Patriot as a media release).

March 6, at approximately 12:48 a.m., Big Lake Officer Tyler Hecht observed a vehicle with a large, non-transparent decal in the rear window and whose registered owner had a revoked drivers license.

Officer Hecht initiated a traffic stop and made contact with the three occupants. Officer Hecht could immediately smell the odor of marijuana coming from the inside of the vehicle. The driver admitted to smoking marijuana earlier that day.

A search of the vehicle resulted in the discovery of a red and black handbag on the back seat next to where the rear female passenger had been seated. The female was identified as Heidi Schliesman, 31 of Minnetonka. Inside the handbag, officers located two baggies of suspected methamphetamine. Additional white powder, suspected to be a controlled



substance, was also located in the handbag, along with a

piece of mail bearing Schliesman's name and address. The suspected methamphetamine field-tested positive for methamphetmaine and weighed 39.1 grams. The white powder substance was sent to the laboratory for analysis

due to concerns it may contain fentanyl. Schliesman was arrested and transported to the Sherburne County Jail. Schliesman was charged by criminal complaint with; Felony 2nd Degree Possession of a Controlled Substance.

drawing for the location of the shelter, as well as several parking stalls that could service the area. Eyk stated that he would secure a topographic survey of the area to aid in the exact placement of the shelter and he also added that fencing would need to be done around the drain field area of

The supervisors agreed to move forward with the project as it could add a nice amenity to the park and additionally provide a service to township residents looking for a place to hold a gathering

Eyk's report to the board included information that the LRIP grant had been submitted, but the State of Minnesota had postponed a final decision on awarding funding until perhaps the end of June because the state had received 471 applicants for the program. Because \$75 million had been allocated by the state for this year, it is expected that there will be fierce competition for the funds.

Eyk said that the bid letting for the Sherwood Shores road construction had listed a July 6 approximate start date, but he is hoping to work with the contractors to accelerate that timeline because it will be a full depth complete reclamation and that process is more efficient when it is done when the road mat is at colder temperatures.

April 15 and 16, the township is planning to hold meetings with the residents of Sherwood

Shores to discuss the road project in detail. All affected property owners will be receiving a letter around the 1st of April regarding the meetings and they will be asked to sign up ahead of time for an in person or *Zoom* registration. The board is hoping to have as many of the 77 affected residents attend as possible so there is clarity around this summer's project which will rebuild the roadway in the Clear Lake Twp. portion of the development. As of now, Haven Twp. does not appear to have plans to reconstruct their portion of the road. Next, Gray spoke of his efforts to gain some clarity on the Co. Rd. 53 project that involves

Sherburne County and the City of Becker. There have been conflicting reports of some of the plans for the road so Gray is working with Commissioner Felix Schmiesing to arrange a meeting to discuss how the project could affect all participating entities.

In the last bit of road news, it was decided that Eyk would join Stimmler to conduct this spring's road tour and report back to the group. Usually, the tour involves the rental of a van and as many as 10 people participating in the meeting. However, because of covid it was felt that the two men could accomplish the task this spring and the fall tour will be re-evaluated for safety and social distancing needs at that time.

Township residents Brent and Tamara Benson appeared before the board seeking a variance for the partial tear down and construction of their home on Long Lake Lane. The variance is needed because of the home's proximity to the lake, however the new construction will be within the same existing footprint and no closer to the lake that the current structure. The Bensons have planned several improvements to their property, including reducing the percentage of impervious surfaces and also augmenting their erosion control.

The board approved a favorable recommendation which will be sent to Sherburne County

In a final agenda item, Gray announced that Clerk Peggy Berger will be leaving the position after two years of service. Berger has accepted full time employment elsewhere and both she and Gray stated they had a discussion and felt that the time commitment would be too much for her to

Gray thanked Berger for her service and wished her well in the future before appointing Gary Anderson to be the temporary Acting Clerk until such time as a future course of action is decided

The board will meet next at its Local Board of Equalization April 7 at 10 a.m.

# **COVID** relief funding in schools is a problem

At the most recent Becker School Board meeting, Superintendent Jeremy Schmidt stated he was continuing to investigate the allocation of ESSER II funding, and what could be done to more fairly distribute the funds to the schools that need it. Following is an article which explains what ESSER II Funding is and why local superintendents are upset about the fund distribution.

#### What is ESSER II Funding?

ESSER (Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief) funding is government funding to help schools pay for unexpected costs due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Congress awarded about \$13.2

billion in ESSER I funding to schools around the nation, while ESSER II funding (the most recent round of funding, which will be the subject of this article) awarded \$54.3 billion nationwide. These funds were allocated to schools using part A of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. This is the act that later created the framework for the "No Child Left Behind" act. Title I refers to the provision under the act which singles out schools that have low-income families to receive more fund-

#### levels receive more funding. Title I Vs. Title II

ing. In other words, school

districts with high poverty

The problem, according to Becker Superintendent Jeremy Schmidt, was the decision to use Title I to guide the distribution of ESSER Funding. While Title I is a good model for normal school funding throughout the year, as it helps impact impoverished students, Schmidt argues that this was not the way to go for COVID-19 relief funding.

"Every school has been affected by COVID," Schmidt said. "Every student, every facility, every Schools all across the

nation were forced to shut down due to COVID-19, regardless of the income level of those schools' families. Many students are struggling due to the lack of face-to-face interaction with

This is why Schmidt believes that Title II funding should have been used to

determine the distribution of funds. Title II, alternatively, is designed to support teachers based on student population and poverty counts. So low-income area students are still taken into consideration, but so is the number of students who attend each

**Unbalanced Funding** This issue slid under the radar for the first round of funding, since only \$13.2 billion were distributed to all the public school districts in the country, while nearly four times that amount is being distributed in the most recent round of funding, with nearly \$1 billion being distributed in Minnesota alone, so differences in allocations are much more visible.

"The largest district in the State of Minnesota, Anoka-Hennepin School District is receiving \$17,000,000 in ESSER funding compared to the second and third largest districts receiving \$100,000,000 each, yes each!" Schmidt said. "Are you aware there are schools with under 300 students receiving about \$600,000 while schools with over 6,000 students are receiving under \$500,000?"

In the above statement, Schmidt is comparing College Preparatory Elementary against the STMA School District. When there is \$1 billion in the pot for state schools, it makes the gaps in funding much more visible. A total of 40% of all the ESSER II funding in the state is serving only 7% of the students.

## **Schools Struggling**

Jeremy Schmidt is not the only superintendent worried about the situation. Big Lake Superintendent Tim Truebenbach is also concerned about how he will secure funding for his district.

"If the state doesn't come through with at least an inflationary increase [in general funding], we will struggle," Truebenbach said. "My biggest concern centers around our loss of enrollment. I just read in the Star Tribune that the average enrollment loss in Minnesota is 2%. Big Lake is currently down by 2.65%. Fewer students attending our schools equals less revenue to our schools. Less revenue to our schools equals less likelihood to be able to afford offerings. If this continues, all schools across Minnesota will struggle."

If all schools in Minnesota are struggling with enrollment being down, and with students being absent from the classroom, these two local school leaders feel that the ESSER Funding should have been used to more fairly compensate schools for their struggles, rather than give disproportionately to low-income districts. This was the opportunity to help the schools all around the state who had been struggling with the impact of COVID-19, but it was handled as though it was a bill to help low-income students instead.

## **How to Fix the Issue**

Schmidt says that Governor Tim Walz has the power to shift the funding model from Title I to Title

Our students need a leader like Governor Walz to continue to stand up and fight for them," Schmidt said. "[There] is more than enough evidence to show how this is an unfair distribution of our country's money being used to help out in this time of COVID."

# **Endangered No More**

Last week, along with the clamor of red-wing blackbirds, I heard loud gargly noises coming from the slough behind our house and knew that spring had finally arrived. What was making the strange sounds? Sandhill cranes returning from their southern migration.

My husband calls them the pterodactyls, not only because of the prehistoric noise they make but because of their huge shapes when they fly overhead. Adult sandhill cranes are large and formidable, with seven-foot wingspan and standing up to five feet tall. They have long bills, long necks, and long, leathery legs.

I feel blessed to have these noisy neighbors. Like many species, sandhill cranes were close to extinction by 1900 due to settlers moving west. They were hunted for food and their beautiful feathers, their habitat converted to farmland. Luckily the Migratory Bird Treaty Act was passed in 1918, making it illegal to hunt birds that migrate, and states began to preserve areas where they live and breed. Today's sandhill crane populations healthy, with around 15,000 of them in Minnesota.

I find sandhill cranes fascinating, especially because of their "dance." You haven't seen a mating ritual until you've watched sandhill cranes. During courtship, they bow to, flap their wings and bounce into the air. They bob up and down on one leg, touch beaks, and extend their bills up to the sky.

They're not shy about it either. I once saw a pair dancing in a ditch just outside of Clearwater. They went about their business, completely ignoring me as I drove by.

As I was listening to the cranes' loud calls last week, I realized there are actually

a number of species living around me that have recovered from near extinction, such as trumpeter swans and bald eagles.

Like sandhill cranes, trumpeter swans were also over-hunted by settlers, with the last breeding pair in Minnesota noted in 1885. Reintroduction efforts in Minnesota began in 1966, and today they nest throughout much of the state. Even so, they're still on the state's threatened species list due to threats like loss of habitat and illegal shooting.

Sadly, lead poisoning from ingesting lead shot and fish sinkers is actually responsible for around half of the trumpeter swan deaths in the Midwest. Like many, I was thrilled when the huge birds first came back to this area not that long ago. Like others, I was also dismayed when it was discovered that a number of them had died after ingesting old lead shotgun pellets along the open-water channel between Clearwater Lake and Grass Lake in 2007. Although nontoxic shotgun pellets have been required for all waterfowl hunting in Minnesota since 1987, the area had long been a popular duck hunting spot and was filled with old lead shot.

I was torn when the DNR announced they would be working to discourage the swans from

overwintering in that area. I didn't want to see the beautiful birds poisoned, but I also didn't want them to leave now that they'd finally come back.

Luckily, the trumpeter swans haven't left. Every day, summer through fall, small flocks of the birds fly over our property, honking noisily as they head to the fields in the mornings and then back again in the evenings.

Bald eagles are another success story. I remember hearing about their decline when I was still in school, how they'd first started losing numbers due to hunting and habitat loss, which became worse after World War II due to the rampant spraying of DDT. Eagles contaminated with the pesticide began laying eggs with shells so weak they often broke during incubation or didn't hatch at all.

In large part because of the book published by Rachel Carson in 1962, *Silent Spring*, DDT was banned for most uses in the U.S. in 1972. The ban, along with efforts to protect eagle habitat, brought them back from near extinction. In 2007 it was removed from the endangered species list and is again found throughout our country.

Today there are a number of bald eagle nests close to where I live. In fact, when the trees are bare of leaves, I can actually see one from my yard. The majestic birds are an amazing sight soaring the skies in search of prey.

It's inconceivable to me that there are people who don't support endangered species acts. I don't ever want to wake up to a spring without the gargling of sandhill cranes, the honking of trumpeter swans, or the shrieks of bald eagles. I prefer the noise.

# Future Peacetime Emergencies

(Editor's Note: The following article was unsolicited from the office of Sen. Mary Kiffmeyer of Big Lake).

Monday, the Senate passed legislation on a tri-partisan vote of 38-29, that would reassert a fair balance of governing power between the legislative branch and the executive branch during future states of emergency.

The bill would require the Governor to obtain legislative approval to extend any emergency declaration beyond 30 days. The governor has access to many emergency departments for vaccinations, like public health for example, without using emergency powers.

using emergency powers.

Current law allows the Governor to extend a peacetime emergency indefinitely for 30 days at a time and only grants the legislature the option to cancel emergency powers with a majority vote of both the House and Senate. Forty other states are looking at modifications of emergency powers after the excessive use nationwide, but when Senate Republicans ask for a timeline of

when the emergency powers will end, Senate Democrats have failed to answer.

Over the past year, Gov. Walz has used his emergency powers to exclude the Legislature when it comes to making important decisions that have impacted each Minnesotan. It is truly disappointing that regardless of what the Senate and legislature has done, the Governor has chosen to keep emergency powers to himself. Minnesotans deserve better.

Our state has been under peacetime emergency powers for just over a year now. The Governor has offered to end his emergency powers, but only if legislators agreed to pass a laundry list of partisan demands first. That is not working together. Walz chose to start emergency powers, and it is his job to make proposals to end this unilateral decision-making. Unless, that is, he finds it too pleasant and just wants to continue with his oneman rule.

# Other Provisions Included In The Legislation:

The bill requires the Governor to give three days' notice to the majority and minority leaders of each body if the governor intends to extend a peacetime emergency when the legislature is not in session.

The bill prohibits the Governor from canceling an emergency order and issuing a new declaration for the same emergency in order to avoid approval by the legislature.

The bill clarifies that if the Governor declares two peacetime emergencies concurrently, the same legislative approval of any extension past 30 days is required for the second emergency.



# Becker Twp. ready for road construction season

The Becker Twp. Board met Monday evening and spent a good deal of time making preparations for the upcoming construction season.

Twp. Engineer Wes Davis updated the board on a variety of roadway issues, including trying out a new chip seal application that could cut down on maintenance costs.

The LRIP grant has been submitted to the State of Minnesota and Davis expects to hear back about the awarding of the funds sometime in late May or early June. The program received much attention statewide and requests are expected to far outpace available funds.

Construction plans for 2021 include some gravel roadway maintenance, as well as chip sealing for Garden Grove and Georgia Circle, both of which are set to go to bids this week. 164th Avenue is another road that will be sent out for bids very soon, while Davis also asked the board to consider adding 127th Street to

The supervisors felt like the timing was right to test the chip seal on this road and then assess how it

Supervisor Joe Danielson felt that if they did the application this year, it could save some grading costs. The board decided to add the road to the plan, yet keep a clause in the bidding allowing them to reject the project if it is too expen-

In other road business, Danielson and Supervisor Robin Boros reported that some pothole patching has already been accomplished, as well as some brush cut-

There was also discussion regarding some signage in the township, most notably the fire number signs that are placed by driveways.

ment have moved towards markers that include the roadway at the bottom of the sign, allowing people to identity residences easier. Because many roads, especially ones with major curves in them, actually contain different roadway numbers, this signage can help first responders, de-

liver drivers, etc. identify

When replacement signs are considered, the board will further discuss the issue as a phased in ap-

The board also discussed meeting with the Santiago town board regarding the shared roadway, 67th street, which is scheduled for reconstruction this year.

Convention of States Thirty-four state legislatures must pass a resolution in each chamber of their legislatures (called an "application") calling for a Convention of States. The Convention of States application does not need to be signed by the Governor to

As soon as both chambers of the state legislature pass the application, that state becomes one of the required 34 states calling for a Convention. In order for the applications to be aggregated (counted together towards the 34-state thresh-

ARTICLE V, U.S. CONSTITUTION THE CONGRESS, WHENEVERTWO THIRDS OF BOTH HOUSES SHALL DEEM IT NECESSARY, SHALL PROPOSE AMENDMENTS TO THIS CONSTITU TION, OR, ON THE APPLICATION OF THE LEGISLATURES OF TWO THIRDS OF THE SEVERAL STATES, SHALL CALL A CONVENTION FOR PROPOSING AMENDMENTS, WHICH, IN EITHER CASE, SHALL BE VALID TO ALL IN-TENTS AND PURPOSES, AS PART OF THIS CONSTITUTION, WHEN RATI-FIED BY THE LEGISLATURES OF THREE FOURTHS OF THE SEVERAL STATES OR BY CONVENTIONS IN THREE FOURTHS THEREOF, AS THE ONE OR THE OTHER MODE OF RATIFICATION MAY BE PROPOSED BY THE CONGRESS PROVIDED THAT NO AMENDMENT WHICH MAY BE MADE PRIOR TO THE YEAR ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUN-DRED AND EIGHTSHALL IN ANY MAN NER AFFECT THE FIRST AND FOURTH CLAUSES IN THE NINTH SECTION OF THE FIRST ARTICLE; AND THAT NO STATE, WITHOUT ITS CONSENT SHALL BE DEPRIVED OF ITS EQUAL SUFFRAGE IN THE SENATE.

At the Convention, each state's delegation participates in discussing, drafting, and voting on

amendment proposals germane to the topic(s) stated in the 34 applications that triggered the Convention.

Each state has one vote at the convention. Amendments sent to the states are merely suggestions, and have no authority until ratified by the states.

**Simulation** The first ever Convention of States Simulation convened Colonial Williamsburg, Virginia, Sept. 21-23, 2016. One hundred and thirty-seven commissioners representing every state in the nation gathered together

to undertake this historic endeavor. The Convention operated flawlessly, according to a set of rules drafted by Article V scholar Prof. Rob Natelson and approved by the COS Caucus, the largest state legislator caucus in America.

The Convention passed amendment proposals on the following six ideas: 1). The public debt shall not be increased except upon a super majority vote in Congress; 2). Term limits on

will override congressional Members of Congress; 3). Limiting federal overreach by restoring the Commerce Clause to its original meaning; 4). Limiting the power of federal regulations by allowing for a congressional override; 5). Requiring a super majority of Congress to increase federal taxes and repealing the 16th Amendment; 6). Giving the states (by a 3/5ths vote) the power to abrogate any federal law, regulation, or ex-

ecutive order. About

The Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge is planning a series of prescribed burns to be conducted during the spring season to help maintain the natural habitats for wildlife and reduce the chance of wildfires outside the refuge.

The refuge averages around 4,000 acres of prescribed burning each year.

Prescribed burns, fires that are carefully planned, are beneficial to native prairie and oak savanna plant communities at the refuge. The burns are conducted under a special set of guidelines for weather and safety called a "prescription." These prescriptions are planned to accomplish specific objectives for vegetation and wildlife man-

Before a burn begins, temperature, relative humidity, fuel conditions, wind speed and wind direction are measured. Refuge staff takes into account smoke drift, nearby buildings, livestock and other safety factors when deciding whether to burn. According to Kris Larson, Fire Management Officer, the burn is conducted only if conditions meet the approved "prescription."

"We want the public to know that safety is our utmost concern," Kris said. 'By reducing fuels through prescribed burning, we not only benefit wildlife, but also minimize the threat that wildfires on or around the refuge may have to the surrounding public."

Through habitat management programs, such as prescribed fire, Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge is restoring the natural ecosystem. The Oak Savanna ecosystem, with its plants and wildlife, is adapted to fire and depends on periodic burning for continued

Prescribed burns at Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge are planned to be conducted in March, April and May, or in the fall and winter, when weather and safety conditions are right to meet the objectives of the burns.

Sherburne National Wildlife Refuge is located northwest of Zimmerman with Refuge Headquarters off Co. Rd. 9.

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources has dedicated full-time staff to evaluating threats from the aquarium industry and working closely with industry professionals to minimize threats.

# Sherburne County has state's lowest C-19 vaccine rate

Sherburne County was recently identified as having the state's lowest COVID-19 vaccine rate. As of March 4, at least 948,127 people in Minnesota have received a first shot of Moderna or Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine, and 500,188 of them have completed the two-dose series.

Benton County is the nest lowest county at 12.8% for recipients of at least one dose compared the Sherburne County's 11.6%. The state percentage is at 19.3%.

Cook County (one of the state's oldest counties, according to census data) has the state's highest vaccination rate: 44.2% of residents who have received their first dose, according to Minnesota Department of Health data as of Satur-

So, why is Sherburne County the state's lowest? Some speculate it is

because the region has no major health care system while others say it is because of lack of accessibility. One doctor, George Morris of CentraCare said it could be because of Sherburne County's "independent mindset".

"I don't want to call it red and blue, Democrat [and] Republican," Morris said. "It's a little bit of: I don't want people to tell me what to do."

According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services as of March 17, Sherburne County is at a very high risk level for contracting the cornavirus. The reason is because there was an average of 20 daily cases per 100,000 people reported in the past two weeks. The risk in Sherburne County will decrease to high risk if the daily case rate drops to less than about 11.4 cases per 100,000 people and the test positivity stays low.

A county's risk level is determined based on the number of reported cases and testing data. Although county risk levels are assigned based on expert guidance and careful analysis, it is possible that the risk level in a specific county may be over or underestimated because of a lack of reliable data.

In some cases, a county

might not have a risk level if not enough recent data was available. or if inconsistencies were found in the data. If a county's recent testing data was not avail-

Over the past two weeks, an average of 19 cases per day were reported in Sherburne County, a 93 percent increase from the average two weeks ago. Since the beginning of the pandemic, at least one in 11 residents have been infected, a total of 9,025 reported cases.

Nov. 2020 was the worst month for cases in Sherburne County.

An average of 90 percent of I.C.U. beds were occupied in the area as of March 11. The trend in deaths tends to lag weeks behind the trend in reported cases: Cases have recently increased in Sherburne, which could mean a rise in deaths will follow.

Cases have increased recently in Anoka; Stearns; Wright; Benton; Isanti; and Mille Lacs Counties.

A few anomalies occurred this past year in reports from the state including no new cases or deaths on the Fourth of July holiday. Minnesota began including probable cases identified through antigen testing in October of 2020 and the state reported data for two days after reporting no data on Thanksgiving (Nov. 28). On March 9 of 2021, Minnesota announced many cases and

deaths from the past year that were previously unreported.

Two large medical providers expanded eligibility criteria March 4 for vaccination against COVID-19 in Minnesota, which has reported 6,521 deaths and 487,374 diagnosed infec-

The totals include 14 more deaths and 949 infections reported March 4 by the Minnesota Department

Gov. Tim Walz three weeks ago unveiled a vaccine timetable for Minnesota that gradually expanded eligibility to nonelderly adults with chronic health problems and frontline essential workers before getting to the rest of the general public by summer. That timetable could be accelerated now — with the original scheduling not factoring in the availability of a third vaccine.

The state has been prioritizing limited quantities of vaccine mostly for health care workers, longterm care residents, educators and people 65 and

State officials remain concerned about the emergence of more infectious variants of the SARS-CoV-2 virus that causes COVID-19. Genomic sequencing has now identified 112 cases of COVID-19 in Minnesota involving a more infectious B.1.1.7 variant first found in the United Kingdom.

# Sherburne launches virtual tour of Government Center

Sherburne County residents now have another tool to help them in making their trips to the Government Center more efficient, as county staff debuted a virtual tour function on the county's website at Tuesday morning's Board of Commissioners meeting.

Communications Media Specialist David Unze demonstrated the function for the commissioners and showed how a resident could take a virtual tour before coming to the building for an appoint-

By watching the video, a resident would be able to find the location of the department they are planning to visit and could also click on a link in the video to learn more about the functions and services offered by the county.

Unze explained that the project will help educate people about important information, as well as provide a visual to help people maneuver through the building. Many departments were relocated as part of the recent building project and this new feature can help to make the building more accessible for those who may not have yet navigated the new layout.

The project is just one of the latest efforts by the commissioners and staff to engage the taxpayers and focus on customer service for residents.

Along that theme, County Administrator Bruce Messelt reminded the board of an upcoming workshop that will focus on outreach efforts related to communicating with residents. Recently, the commissioners have discussed adding a newsletter or other print publications to help residents better understand the efforts undertaken by the county.

# **Broadband**

Throughout the past couple of years, broadband (high speed internet) has been one of the issues at the forefront of the county's efforts in terms of infrastructure.

To that end, Midco's Government Relations Manager, Melissa Wolf, appeared before the board to share the company's efforts to expand access within the county.

She reported that they have installed one million feet of network fiber within the county and have 5,421 passings (connections) to businesses and residences.

Currently, they are working on an expansion just north of Lake Ann and everything they are installing is direct fiber cable rather than wireless connections.

The company is also working toward some conduit lease agreements with the county, as well as several Federal grant programs, one of which resulted in \$893,000 being invested in Sherburne just last year alone.

The commissioners and Wolf discussed the funds expected to be available as part of the recent Federal legislation and pledged to work together where possible to continue increasing access for residents.

## Law Library

County Attorney Kathleen Heaney appeared before the board to discuss the law library, a statutorily mandated service provided to residents.

She introduced Benjamin Rydlund, who recently took over duties as the Law

Rydlund reviewed some of the services offered at the library, which is staffed from 8 am -4:30 pm on Tuesdays, Wednesday and Fridays. He also mentioned that he has been providing some computer and tech assistance to patrons, as well as doing outreach to places such as the YMCA, Senior Centers and churches.

As covid becomes less of an issue, Rydlund is hopeful for increased traffic and more visits from residents seeking assistance.

## Watershed Plans

In recent years, Minnesota counties have been moving toward a more regional approach to managing water resources with an approach referred to as One Watershed, One Plan.

This allows partners to collaborate more on water quality efforts and also establishes a framework for planning and zoning ef-

With those goals in mind, the commissioners approved two resolutions at the meeting. The first established planning boundaries for the Mississippi River - St. Cloud watershed and separates it from the Mississippi River - Sartell region. The second resolution approved a grant application for the St. Cloud planning area since 89% of Sherburne County falls within that jurisdiction.

## Parks

Parks Coordinator Gina Hugo was at the meeting to solicit input from the commissioners regarding the establishment of a Park **Dedication and Memorials** 

As the county continues to establish more park land, the issue of donations and memorials has been coming up on a more frequent basis.

Many other park systems have a similar policy in place, therefore Hugo was trying to be proactive in developing some parameters to help in the installation, maintenance, size, design and replacement of memorials (benches, etc.).

The policy would also cover larger types of donations, for instance if someone wanted to establish something more robust such as a picnic structure or play structure.

The board directed Hugo to come back in April with some specific recommendations in the selection and design of materials to keep it consistent within the theme for individual parks.

Another general consensus was for the policy to be prescriptive enough that staff could handle the vast majority of future decisions based on established procedures, thus not requiring commissioner approval for every donated park bench,

In other park related news, Public Works Director Andrew Witter brought forward the low bid for work to be completed in the Bridgeview Park.

JL Theis was the low bidder, although the amount of \$587,462 was nearly \$150,000 higher than the engineer's estimate. Witter stated that the funds are available, which includes a state grant for \$250,000. In addition, staff has worked with the contractor to reduce costs by \$40,000 already and more savings are being explored.

- on current bridge load restrictions within the county and learned that many wooden structures are now nearing the end of their life cycles and will need replacement or additional restrictions:
- Received the HHS Annual Report from Director Amanda Larson and learned of the department's efforts at helping residents achieve self-sufficiency;
- Heard of Public Health's plans to being the new mobile wellness van to a pair of Sherburne's food production businesses this week to conduct vaccination clinics.

# Gimme a Break! How to Find Ultra Late Ice Panfish!

Weed flats, gradual weedy breaks, and sluggish paths to deep water can all equal loads of crappies or bluegills during certain times of the fishing season. But now (throughout March and into April) one of the most obvious type of "edge" that can collect a ton of fish are some of the steepest breaks in the lake. Especially the steepest breaks that connect late winter panfish spots directly to the spawning grounds they will be using to feed the minute the ice melts and then of course actual spawning once the water temps gain some ground.

Right now, when I'm heading out onto the ice in search of big quantities of late ice panfish I'm looking for the perfect combination of deep water late winter haunts and steep breaks adjacent to the areas where

they will be spawning in 45-60 days from now! So to give a generic example--a shallow soft bottom spawning bay 1-6 ft. deep, cattails along the

on the bottom that sits

next to 25-45 feet of water



(or an obvious area where the crappies and bluegills spawn every Spring). The break (drop-off) that connects the two environments should roughly be plung-

The steeper the angle, the

more confined/condensed

the fish themselves. The fish are easy to locate as well using about any kind of electronics. Look for fish THROUGH the ice—do not drill any holes yet! These steep breaks tend to force many of the fish to suspend out over the deeper water while still remaining close to the break—and sometimes the fish are glued right to the break itself. When that happens I tend to prefer a transducer with a smaller degree of attack like a 9 degree transducer. By using a "skinny beam" you're not reading down the side of the whole break at once—this helps reduce "blind spots" and the fish will pop at ya much better. Pick a depth and walk along the break and check for fish about every 10-15ft by shooting through the ice using the

old water on the ice trick.



The schools will be tight, so if you don't check often enough you can easily walk right over a nice school of crappies or bluegills. Also, make sure there are not pods of fish suspended off the deep edge of the break over them as well. Once some fish are located, try to figure out the tolerance and size of the school by walking and checking around the initial found fish in a circle pattern. Use the original fish you found as the center pivot point. This will tell you how big the school is and exactly where the center of the school is.

Time to drill a few holes. Start by drilling holes just outside the perimeter of the school of fish—but around the schooling area. Drill the last few holes on top of the fish in the center of the school. The perimeter holes will be used as the school starts to possibly disperse due to noise and fishing activity. The perimeter holes can also tell you which way the

fish are moving by taking note of where the first and last fish are being caught. This is where it's handy to have 2-3 people with you. If you are alone, set up a few locators (electronics with "fish alarms") in the vacant holes—use them as electronic tip-ups. Set the alarm, wait for a beep, fish the hole. It's that simple. It's one reason to keep your "outdated" fishing sonar

We really don't need to get into presentation. I leave the minnows at home and use tiny ice jigs tipped with waxies or plastics. The fish are feeding and are usually not picky. Just keep it simple and small. Heavily schooled crappies or bluegills into the ultra-late ice period are typically aggressive due to the nutrients the newly formed eggs need. Lotsa Fish! Lotsa Fun!

"It was probably our best game of the year to compete with them. We're really proud of our girls. This game will get us ready for playoff basketball for

After Hopkins canceled a game with the Bulldogs a week ago, the much ballyhooed matchup finally

took place last Friday night in Becker, with the top ranked team in Class AAAA running away with a 85-58

Becker actually led 4-0 early, but then Hopkins went on a 31-2 run to put the game out of reach early.

"As a team we did a poor job meeting passes as we were a little on our heels," said Baird. "Nu Nu Agara scored 19 points on 8-for-10 shooting and had four steals. She was amazing and displayed why she's one of top recruits in country."

The play of Senior Courtney Nuest was a highlight for Becker, as she had 12 points, five rebounds and four steals.

'Courtney really had her second great game in a row," said Baird. "She just proved she was ready to

Baird also sang the praises of Megan Gamble, who had 14 points and five rebounds and battled well with Maya Nnaji (another top Hopkins recruit).

Although the Bulldogs trailed early, they played an even second half with the Royals, scoring 30 and giving up 31.

WHEREAS, pursuant to Minn. Stat.§§ 463.15, et. seq., the Sherburne County Board of Commissioners finds that the property located at 25457 167th Street NW, Big Lake, Minnesota, and identified with PID Nos. 35-409-1332, 35-409-1334, 35-409-1314 and 35-409-1316 (the "Property") is a hazardous property for the following reasons:

- The Property is owned by Joel Nohr, who passed away in 2013. The Property does not appear to have been disposed of by will and the County is unaware of any surviving spouse or children. The Property therefore appears to have passed to Joel Nohr's surviving parent, Leroy Nohr, pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 524.2-103(2). The County Auditor has been sending the tax statements for the Property to Leroy Nohr for several years.
- The property consists of four separate tax parcels. One of the parcels included a single family home and several dilapidated structures are also located on the property.
- Brian Nohr, Joel Nohr's brother, has been residing at the property.
- There have been solid waste, zoning and public health violations on the property for several years. County staff inspected the Property in 2020 and observed solid waste throughout much of the Property. Staff observed rotting food outside on the Property with flies and maggots and buckets of human waste outside on the Property. Staff could not locate a septic system tank on the property due to the amount of solid waste covering the ground.
- On or about December 30, 2020, a fire destroyed nearly all of the single family residence on the In January 2021, the Sherburne County Building Official inspected the Property and determined that
  - The Building Official found that:

  - Extensive fire damage to the entire structure. It appeared that no portion of the structure was The roof had collapsed on a majority of the house and the remaining portion of the roof trusses
  - were heavily charred. The remaining supporting walls have been compromised from the fire and are laterally unsup-

  - The electrical and plumbing systems have been destroyed by the fire. The site is unsecured creating an unsafe situation that is dangerous to human life.
- 9. The Building Official determined that the structure cannot be repaired or salvaged and therefore must be demolished.
  - 10. The property is a hazardous property as defined by Minn. Stat. § 463.15, subd. 3 based on the unsafe and unsanitary conditions on the property. Specifically, the remains of the burned structure are structurally unsafe and have not been removed or secured means that the structure is a public nuisance and threat to human life. "ASK A TROOPER" by Sgt. Jesse Grabow of the Minnesota State Patrol

**Question:** Is it legal to jump out of a moving vehicle? **Answer:** One of the more unusual questions I've been asked. A person in a moving motor vehicle must be wearing their seat belt and if you are wearing your seat belt properly, you would not be able to jump out of the vehicle.

Riding in a vehicle unbelted is extremely dangerous as it's your first line of defense in a crash. You might be the safest driver, but those around you could be conducting dangerous driving behaviors.

Unbelted motorists lost their lives at a high rate in 2020 with 102 unbelted motorists losing their lives compared with 73 in 2019. The 102 deaths were the most unbelted fatalities since 2014 (106).

#### Minnesota's Primary Seat Belt Law

Minnesota law states that drivers and passengers in all seating positions must be buckled up or seated in the correct child restraint. Officers will stop and ticket unbelted drivers or passengers. Seat belts must be worn correctly low and snug across the hips, and shoulder straps should never be tucked under an arm or behind the back.

Law enforcement will stop and ticket unbelted drivers or passengers — including those in the back. A seat belt violation can cost more than \$100.
